sk graduates of Central Catholic, "Were you well prepared at CCHS for success in college?" Unquestionably, the reply you will receive is, "Yes, better than I ever thought. I'm well ahead of most of the students in knowledge and skills." For many CCHS graduates, this outstanding academic preparation for university studies includes the knowledge and the skills required for success in the 21st century world of business enterprise.

TV advertisements for large brokerage houses, cable news channels, the quick and ready access to information on the internet, the lure of the everexpanding applications of technology and the observed success of business leaders, inspire a significant number of enterprising Central Catholic students, today more than ever, to view the business world as a place where their talents and preparation hold professional promise and personal fulfillment.

The Central Catholic curriculum in Business and Technology studies has grown significantly over the last twenty years to meet students' educational and career interests and goals. At present, nearly 30% of CCHS juniors and seniors elect to enroll in one or more of the offerings of the Business and Technology Department as part of their college prep studies.

Central Catholic's present curriculum in Business and Technology is only faintly reminiscent of the days when students were limited to classes such as typing, mechanical drawing or business math. While Central Catholic's expansion in Business and Technology studies began in the 1980's with the addition of computer studies and accounting, the decade of the 1990's brought significant curricular enhancements which continue right through to the present – with more to come on the near horizon.

Business Studies: Then and Now

Course offerings in Business and Technology studies grew over the period of the 1990's to include Accounting II, Business Law, Marketing, Computer Applications, C++ Programming, A+ Certification and Web Page Design. In 2002, the school administration decided to elevate Business and Technology to the status of an academic department with its own chairperson. Jodi Linnehan Kriner, Central Catholic's Director of Technology, was named the department's chair, a position she deftly continues to hold today. Kriner has overseen the continued expansion of the Business and Technology curriculum with the introduction of Economics, Statistics, Management Information Systems, Visual Basic Programming and Web Development. The Business Department faculty has also expanded to include three full-time teachers: Charles Adamopoulos, Michael Staropoli and Donald Jalbert.

Each course in the Business and Technology Department requires students to become thoroughly familiar with and to apply 21st century hardware and software—most commonly used by colleges in training business majors. For example, accounting students make use of automated software to organize and manage data and reports. Marketing students can

use electronic surveys and databases and other resources to research new marketing methods. Business students use these same electronic resources to track the financial standing and future prospects of companies before participating in the annual Stock Market competition for high schools. In Economics and Statistics courses, students make frequent use of analytical and graphical software to understand the mathematical underpinnings of theories under study.

Recognizing the critical role technology plays in successful business enterprises in the 21st century, Central Catholic's curriculum and faculty insure students are introduced to the applicable technologies. This is true, not only in the Business and Technology course offerings, but across the school's entire program of studies. To accomplish this, Central Catholic has invested over \$350,000 in the last eight years to grow its technology resources and to keep these resources at the state-of-the-art.

Business and Technology Studies in 2011-2012

A major leap in the evolution of the Business and Technology Department will occur in the

"Raider Traders" – CCHS Students Learn the Workings of the Stock Market

Fostering knowledge and understanding of financial markets, Mr. Charles Adamopoulos, business studies faculty, requires students in his Marketing class to compete in the statewide "Stock Market Game" sponsored by the Securities Industry and Financial Markets Association (SIFMA).

Students are divided into teams of four and given a hypothetical \$100,000 to invest in an online portfolio. Adamopoulos requires students to research companies traded on the NYSE (New York Stock Exchange) and NASDAQ. On a weekly basis, students learn to research and evaluate past and current price/earnings ratios and other indicators. Student-teams must invest a virtual \$100.000 in a minimum of three companies at all times. Students are able to buy and sell stocks in their portfolio in weekly trading sessions over a period of 12 weeks. Investment earnings are tracked online by SIFMA who reports the final statewide standings of student-teams.

CCHS student-teams have been in the lead among the more than 900 student-teams in Massachusetts. CCHS teams have finished as high as 3rd & 5th in the "Stock Market Game" in the last five years. Looking for investment advice...TURN HERE!

The Road to Success Has No Shortcuts

Snow started falling late one morning on a cold January day, prompting a young man and his friend to start planning what they hoped would be an undetected escape from school. Their final class was a study period – no one would miss them. A quick trip to their lockers at the change of class, out a side door to the parking lot, a key in the ignition, and off they would go.

In the parking lot, the tires were spinning but the car wasn't moving. "Just gun it, gun it... let's get out of here!" he told his friend.

"You've got to be kidding! Look, he's up there... in the window."

Mr. William Cowie '59, the Dean of Students (aka the Dean of Discipline) stood perched in his office overlooking the parking lot, curling his index finger out the window.

With this gesture, Joseph Faro '87 screamed to his friend Dan Berard '87, "We're dead!"

Little did Faro know at the time that this was not an end but a beginning. Mr. Cowie's words resonate with him even today. "The only one you are fooling or cheating is yourself. There are no shortcuts in life if you want to be successful." This wouldn't be the first or last time Faro had the benefit of such a lesson.

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Lessons from an Immigrant Family: the Road to Opportunity

At an early age, Joseph Faro saw firsthand the benefits of hard work. He bore witness to the steadfast labors of his father and mother as they strived to build a new life in America after arriving from Sicily in the mid-1950's. After a few years working in the textile mills, his father Joseph opened a small bakery in Methuen. As business grew, the bakery moved to Prospect Street in Lawrence and later to Winter Street in Haverhill. Faro worked alongside his father in the bakery, learning the food business close-up. He felt the power of his father's vision, witnessed the sacrifices he made and the passion he brought to everything made in the bakery. As the family grew, the Faros moved from Newbury and Common Street in Lawrence to Prospect Hill.

With long hours, years of hard work and a vision for the possible, that small bakery continues to thrive in Lawrence as Joseph's MultiGrains Bakery, serving commercial and retail customers across the New England area. Faro's mother, Rose, always saw education as the road to opportunity for her family and exemplified that for her children. She graduated from St. Mary High School in 1961 and earned a scholarship to Emmanuel College, later returning to her alma mater to teach science.

Lessons of Passion and Purpose at CCHS

Faro's parents recognized that he was innately bright but that his boundless energy needed discipline and focus. Their answer: Central Catholic High School.

"I entered Central Catholic kicking and screaming, but I came out excited about learning," says Faro. "My parents knew I was too busy with friends, looking to try everything a teenager can do for fun. I needed to reset my personal speedometer, and they knew it."

From his first days in class, he was strongly influenced by his teachers. "I will never forget the passion and intensity of every English lesson taught by Mr. Licare, Mr. Rich's oft-repeated encouragement to focus on your goals in life, Mr. McCue's impressive historical knowledge sprinkled with levity, and Mr. Adamopoulos' affection for each student. You could tell immediately that our teachers loved what they did. They had a clear purpose and goals that they worked unfailingly to reach. They demonstrated that this is the secret of a fulfilling life. Every teacher took a personal interest in you and believed in your potential even if you didn't see it."


During a recent return to his alma mater, Faro marveled that Central Catholic continues to immerse its students in a culture of genuine personal achievement and core Christian values. "The belief in your potential to succeed at anything you can envision, the hard work it takes to get there, and the understanding that you never achieve anything without the support of others, is still present at CCHS and even stronger today."

A Plan for the Future

After graduating from Central Catholic, Faro enrolled in the Whittemore School of Business & Economics at the University of New Hampshire, where he earned his B.S. in business and finance in 1991. The values he learned at CCHS combined with the experience in his father's bakery sparked an interest in an entrepreneurial studies course. As part of the course, Faro developed a business plan for "Joseph's Gourmet Pasta & Sauces," entering it into the university's Holloway Prize competition. The business plan earned him second place, propelling him to move forward.


At age 21, Faro approached 15 local banks

one by one, seeking \$1 million in financing. Each bank declined until the 15th was impressed more by his passion than by his plan. Faro admits he had no idea how to make artisan-style pasta, but he knew he had the drive to learn.

Faro spent months in the kitchen on trial and error – thousands of hours developing recipes for pasta of all kinds, gathering advice and eventually the approval of chefs at hotels and restaurants in Boston. He realized that to succeed on a profitable and practical scale, he had to automate the artisan process. After nearly 50 trips to Italy and hundreds of hours with engineers, Faro was able to develop what no other company had done before: an automated process for making top-quality, genuine artisan pasta so unique

that no other company could duplicate it.

He employed 10 research and development chefs just to develop new product lines and began selling Joseph's Gourmet Pasta & Sauces to major restaurant chains (including Bertucci's, Carrabba's Italian



Grill, Legal Seafoods, and Olive Garden), country clubs, wholesale clubs and hotels. The old-world flavor and high quality of Faro's product line set the standard in the marketplace. Business grew exponentially with over one million pounds of pasta produced and sold weekly from his Haverhill plant.

Joseph's Gourmet Pasta & Sauces soon became one of the largest gourmet pasta companies in the world.

A Legacy of Family, a Vision for Community

The values Faro learned as part of a close-knit immigrant family continue to inspire his vision for the future. Family is at the center of his heart and vision. Faro met his future wife, Samantha, when she came to his father's bakery to buy a birthday cake. Married in 1995, they have three growing children, Joe, Max and Olivia. His desire to give his family the same loving presence his parents

provided for him led Faro to the difficult decision to sell his company to Nestle in 2006. It was about priorities. "The key to life's true happiness, is balance," says Faro.

With his family as a focal point, Faro's new and exciting business and community vision has begun to emerge, one that he hopes his children will one day bring into full realization. He purchased seven properties at the intersection of Main Street and Route 28 in Salem, NH on which he hopes to create a pedestrian friendly downtown business development. The new development will consist of a family of artisan Italian businesses and facilities to give people a realistic glimpse of artisan Italy. "Salem has never had a downtown, and this development is the start of that."

Faro has transformed a large building into *Tuscan Kitchen*, an Italian restaurant and bistro that opened in November 2010 and features a varied fare of gourmet Italian dishes, pastas, breads and other dishes. "Everything we do, we make it ourselves to the point that we make it in front of you – everything is cooked and baked in open kitchens." The restaurant has opened to a multitude of rave reviews.

Faro's plans go beyond *Tuscan Kitchen* to include *Tuscan Market*, a store selling the foods and wines found at the restaurant and an online marketplace called TuscanMarket.com. Plans also include an outdoor park, *Tuscan Villa*, envisioned as a spot for outdoor weddings, food and wine festivals, or just relaxing

under trellises and kiosks in a beautifully landscaped setting.

As he considers every dream or vision he has had in life to this point, Faro attributes his success to the lessons he learned from his family and from his years at Central Catholic. "Success in the business world and in one's personal life depends on the quality of the human experience. When you pour your heart and soul into the people you love and the work you love, that is the definition of success."



A Gift and a Promise

The 13 year-old girl was more than a little frightened as she prepared for her first day of school in America. She took a little comfort in knowing that some of her public school classes in Lawrence would be taught in Spanish, her native language. The day before school was to begin, the young girl's father presented her with a gift, a dictionary. "You will need this in school every day. Don't worry, I'll help you study. Just do your best." With these words, Lynelia Raposo '00 discovered her father's decision to bypass her placement in bilingual classes in favor of classes taught fully in English.



Though born in Methuen, Lynelia Raposo's family moved to Puerto Rico when she was three, and she attended elementary and middle school there, where her father, Carlos, ran a bodega. Her mother, Lydia, emphasized the importance of education to her two daughters and went back to school herself as an example to them.

from Dad. In search of greater opportunities for their children, Carlos and Lydia decided to return to America, as Lynelia prepared to enter eighth grade. The family settled into an apartment on Water Street and Carlos opened a bodega on Jackson Street in Lawrence. With very limited English and armed with a new dictionary, Lynelia Raposo ventured forth anxiously on an uncharted path.

The support of her family and the Boys and Girls Club of Lawrence – along with her dictionary – gave her hope as she struggled in school over those first months. By the middle of the year, her grades were improving steadily. Still unsure of her abilities, it took the encouragement of her parents and Steve Kelley '64 of the Lawrence Boys and Girls Club to get her to apply to CCHS.

Her Central Catholic Experience

"Getting accepted to Central Catholic was the first major achievement of my life, I was so proud, but really scared, too," recalls Raposo. "Central Catholic's teachers were extremely encouraging and never gave up on me, even though I was struggling to understand spoken English and to write English properly. They were welcoming and approachable when I needed help and non-judgmental of my background and obstacles. As a result, I never gave up."

"One of my many outstanding English teachers, Mr. (Joseph) Welch '90, remained after school with me to work on my English vocabulary and writing dayafter-day. His teaching methods, breaking the class

into teams for vocabulary and spelling competitions motivated me to study harder in English." In addition, Welch's method for teaching expository writing called for students to read and criticize each other's essays in order to improve clarity and correctness of expression. "I learned how to write at a high level and also the value of teamwork in an academic endeavor from Mr. Welch."

Raposo's confidence grew along with each up-tick in her GPA. Her growing confidence led her to run for class office and to join the outdoor track team, where she qualified for the Massachusetts all-state meet in the discus. "The secret of Central Catholic's success is that students are taught to believe that achievement must be their common goal, and that collectively as well as individually, we can be a powerful force for good in our life and the lives of others."

On to College

After graduating in 2000, Raposo enrolled in the Isenberg School of Management at UMASS – Amherst, confident that she would succeed. "Knowing I had

overcome obstacles in my path and made it through CCHS, I knew I could do anything," says Raposo.

Raposo excelled from the start of her first semester, attributing a large part of her early success to the organizational skills she learned at CCHS, even admitting she depended on the CCHS Academic Planner she brought to keep her on track. She was invited to be a part of INROADS at UMASS, a mentoring and internship program that placed high-achieving, first-generation college, business undergrads with Fortune 500 companies.

She double-majored in Marketing and Spanish, spending the fall of 2002 studying at the Universidad de Seville in Spain. Through the INROADS program, she completed internships in sales and marketing with several national food chains. "I grew up in a bodega, so sales and distribution felt natural to me."

Entering the Marketplace Upon graduation from UMASS

in 2004, Raposo was offered positions with Stop & Shop and Kraft Foods, ultimately choosing Kraft, a Fortune 100 company, for its emphasis on team building, a skill Raposo had well-developed.

Raposo thought her days of filling shelves in the bodega were in the past until starting at Kraft. She found herself stocking shelves and displays in supermarkets as part of Kraft's philosophy that leadership and management must know its products from the ground up. Raposo advanced quickly - after a couple of months she was promoted to Retail Customer Manager and was planning Kraft's product merchandising in 29 food categories for five stores. Her efforts improved sales by 4% to \$1.7 million and merchandising space by 26% over the prior year. She was named the "Sales Representative of the Year" for the Central Mass. region.

She was promoted again in 2006 to Retail Merchandising Manager, supervising, training and managing 32 employees within New

England. Her "team approach" for New England replaced the former state-by-state paradigm and led to increased sales, cost reductions, and more highly motivated sales teams. These results brought deserving praise from Kraft's corporate officers.

Her upward climb continued in 2007 when she was named to Customer Category Manager and given responsibility for a yearly trade budget of nearly \$5 million for advertising and merchandising of eight Kraft food categories for 174 Hannaford's and 103 Sweet Bay markets. Again the results were rapid and impressive – she increased product line revenues by as much as 53% and oversaw a 10% increase in revenue in her food categories by negotiating merchandising agreements and developing programs to minimize out-of-stock occurrences.

Recognition of Raposo's success went beyond Kraft Foods Corporation to ALPFA (Association of Latino Professionals in Finance and Accounting). ALPFA offered her a scholarship to attend Bentley University in Waltham, to obtain her MBA, which she completed in 2009. Despite her hectic work demands, Raposo wanted to get the MBA so she could prove to her own children one day "that you can do anything you set your mind to."

Family

Central Catholic has played a role not only in her professional success, but in Raposo's family life. In 2006, she married Mario Reves '97. Mario has worked for Price-WaterhouseCoopers and is now an auditor for a regional health services company. They met at Central Catholic and reconnected at UMASS where, as fortune would have it, Mario was a resident assistant in Lynelia's dormitory and helped her adjust to the demands of college life. They began dating and the relationship deepened into love and their marriage. In 2007, they were blessed with their first child, Sebastian

A Difficult Decision

The birth of their son led Raposo-Reyes to a personal and professional crossroads. "I remembered the amazing childhood I had, the pride my parents had standing by my side at my every achievement as I grew up, and I wanted that for my son, Sebastian."

She informed Kraft of her thoughts of stepping away for a time and she was told by head-quarters that Kraft had specific plans in mind for a bright future for her. This made the decision all the more difficult.

In October 2010, she left the corporate world, putting her

professional career plans on hold in order to spend time at home with her son. Her decision has given her the opportunity to pursue some of her other passions as well.

Lynelia has played an active role at CCHS, serving as a speaker for the Fulfilling the Promise Scholarship Program. She is a mentor for the INROADS students at UMASS, and she serves on the Board of Directors at the Boys and Girls Club of Lawrence.

Regardless of whether it's as a high-powered business executive, a loving mother and wife, or an inspiring role model and mentor, Raposo-Reyes is making an impact on the world. "I know the definition of a successful life. I don't need a dictionary anymore."

An 'Aha!' Moment

Christmas was quickly approaching, and the father was coming up empty in the search for his daughter's desired special gift, a Strawberry Shortcake doll that was the year's hottest item and flying off the shelves. He feared that his daughter was going to be disappointed.


The magic of Christmas intervened when he took a business trip to Cleveland, coincidentally the home of American Greetings, the doll's merchandiser. He left Cleveland with not just the sought-after doll in hand, but with an idea that would help shape his future and the future of his company, Stride Rite. A top executive at the shoe company, Mark Cocozza '66 thought, "Why not design and market a 'Strawberry Shortcake' sneaker for children, one that could even smell like strawberries?"

In the first six months, Stride Rite sold 1 million pairs of 'Strawberry Shortcake' sneakers.

Cocozza attributes his phenomenal success over 35 years in the shoe industry to his thorough, "ground-level and up" experience combined with the ability to identify and capitalize on opportunities with confidence.

First Steps

Mark Cocozza '66 grew up in an eighttenement house on Elm Street in Lawrence, as the middle child of Gus and Dorothy Cocozza's three children. Extended family and relatives filled each tenement on the street lined mostly with families of Italian descent. When he graduated from Holy Rosary School, his parents wanted him in a Catholic environment and saw Central Catholic as the best place to prepare him for college.





Cocozza came to Central Catholic with a different motivation: a love of basketball. "To play on a Central Catholic basketball team with my friends, Joe Janco, John Bresnahan, and Jim Dziadosz was my goal in life." After a few months, his English teacher and freshmen basketball coach; Bro. John O'Connell, FMS, pulled the young Cocozza aside, clearly disappointed with his misplaced priorities.

"Bro. John was very emphatic with me one day after class, saying that despite my love of the sport, basketball was not the most important thing in my life," states Cocozza. "If I wanted the chance to play, I'd have to prove to him that I had studied my class lessons first. I never forgot that conversation. It became the basis for spurring me on in my education and in my life. If CCHS didn't push me, it's likely I would have taken a job after graduation and skipped college entirely."

Instead, he enrolled in the liberal arts-mathematics program at Northern Essex Community College, graduating with an Associate's Degree and planning to become a teacher. "My CCHS teachers, Mr. Louis Gosselin and Bro. Edward Michael, FMS, made the study of math very enjoyable, so being a math teacher seemed like a good direction at the time."

But in 1968, the Vietnam War had escalated, and though his older brother Gus enlisted in the Army Reserves, his parents talked Mark out of this plan. After a short stint at Northeastern University, Cocozza transferred to Lowell Technological Institute (present day, UMASS– Lowell), majoring in business administration and finance.

His love of math and his experience at a part-time job steered this change of direction. During high school and college, he worked part-time and over the summer for Stride Rite Corp on Franklin Street in Lawrence, where his father worked in the shoe warehouse. "I became a much better student in college. I had developed good work habits in my part-time job, remembered the lessons of CCHS, and saw the opportunities that an education presents after experiencing the day-to-day life in a shoe factory."

Hitting His Stride

Stride Rite, whose brand was centered in quality children's shoes, offered Cocozza a full-time job after his graduation from Lowell Tech in 1971 and provided opportunities for additional management training, which he eagerly accepted.

"When you get an opportunity in life, you must be prepared to seize it and give it your best." While working full-time at Stride Rite, he earned his MBA at Suffolk University at night. Cocozza steadily advanced through a variety of positions, relying on his knowledge of the shoe industry at the lower levels of production and building on the higher levels of design, marketing and merchandising. The Chief Executive of Stride Rite, a Harvard University graduate and a strong believer in case studies as a strategic tool, assigned Cocozza to bring Stride Rite's potential marketing strategies to the Harvard Business School for study and feedback.

"Just as Nike was becoming a top seller," says Cocozza, "we asked the Harvard Business School students if Stride Rite should move into the sneaker business? The advice was a resounding, NO! Do what you do best." Stride Rite followed the advice. Rather than manufacturing sneakers, Stride Rite entered the sneaker market by acquiring the sneaker company Keds. "I assimilated very good business instincts from the CEO, and learned the benefits of growing a company through mergers and acquisitions." Over time, he became vice president of marketing at Stride Rite. After successes with Strawberry Shortcake and Star Wars sneakers (Cocozza visited with George Lucas to obtain a license), he became Corporate VP of Merchandising. Stride Rite continued to grow through acquisitions of quality brands such as Herman's Survivors and Sperry Topsider, becoming president of the latter. His personal experiences of the industry from the ground on up and his seizing every educational opportunity gave him a confidence to take on a riskier path.

Breaking Away from the Pack

While Cocozza could have remained at Stride Rite and would likely have assumed the position of CEO eventually, he took a risk and accepted the operational leadership of a small shoe company, Maxwell Shoes. Age 38 at the time, he was challenged by the owner and CEO to grow the company.

Believing he had the necessary skills and the vision of a business model unique to the industry, Cocozza took the leap. "Truthfully, I knew if I did not succeed, I was young enough to start over somewhere else in the industry." Once again, he lived by his mantra that "when preparation meets opportunity, seize it."

Cocozza realized that the shoe industry could not thrive in the US if it was fundamentally based in manufacturing. Competition from foreign brands was already deflating the US shoe business. For the shoe industry to thrive in the US, fixed costs of production had to be scaled back with production occurring overseas. For Maxwell Shoe, a discount company with \$10 million in sales largely from selling close-out lines of shoes, growth would lie in effective marketing, smart merchandising and sales, and most important of all, successful acquisitions of shoe lines that would increase Maxwell's appeal to a broader consumer footwear market.

With savvy negotiating skills he learned from Maxwell's founder and CEO, Maxwell Blum, Cocozza navigated Maxwell Shoe through a series of successful acquisitions: the Sam & Libby shoe line, the Dockers for Women line, the Anne Klein shoe line and the Joan and David salon brand.

In 1994, Maxwell's success led to Cocozza's decision to take Maxwell Shoe public, and he worked assiduously at convincing analysts and the public, with the help of Bear Stearns, that investing in Maxwell Shoe would be profitable on the basis of sales growth from \$10 million to over \$150 million.

As a result, Cocozza engineered a successful public offering and became Chairman and CEO of Maxwell Shoe. In 1998, he led a second public offering of Maxwell stock. Maxwell's success garnered strong interest by the CEO of Jones-New York Apparel Company, a \$3 billion company. In 2004, the CEO of Jones-New York, wanting to own Maxwell's successful Anne Klein line, called Cocozza and asked if Maxwell Shoe was for sale. The answer was no. Cocozza felt the offer was too low and he and his Maxwell team had worked too hard to let the company go. Despite being promised the CEO position at Jones Footwear Group, the answer was still "no" because he continued to view the offer as undervalued. After an arduous, and at times rancorous negotiation, the Jones-New York CEO called Cocozza and offered \$300 million for Maxwell Shoe. The modest company he led with originally \$10 million in sales was now valued at \$300 million! Says Cocozza, "I had learned early on in my business career that the most important element in business dealings is leverage, and I had what Jones wanted badly – so the leverage was with Maxwell, and the price was met."


A two-year "non-compete" clause in the sale of Maxwell gave Cocozza time to assess the future. During this non-compete period, he returned to Stride Rite as a member of the Board of Directors. In 2006, with the help of several of his top Maxwell executives, Cocozza founded Modern Shoe Company in Readville, MA, which sells full lines of men's and women's footwear in the wholesale and retail markets. In August 2010, Cocozza sold his ownership in the company but is consulting as acting CEO during an ongoing CEO search process.

Putting His Feet Up... For Now

Today, Mark Cocozza '66 and his wife, Susan, live alternately in Florida and Boston. He credits his personal and business success to his family's lessons and values and his educational roots at CCHS and in the Merrimack Valley.

"I have been very fortunate in my business and personal life. The ultimate satisfaction in life is to help those that have not been as fortunate as we have been, which is why we established the Cocozza Family Scholarship at Central Catholic and why my family has made commitments to Lawrence General Hospital, Children's Hospital Boston, and the Merrimack Valley Hospice House in Haverhill."

Cocozza is thankful that he took Bro. John's early advice, and Central Catholic and the Merrimack Valley are thankful that he has kept his feet on the ground and put his "best foot forward" for students and citizens in need.



AN EXTRAORDINARY LEADER IN CATHOLIC EDUCATION

Reverend George F. Riley, OSA, a '53 graduate of Central Catholic High School, was honored recently at a 75th birthday party at the Princeton Club in New York City. More than 100 family members and friends turned out to recognize the accomplishments of a man who arguably is one of the most gifted, world-wide leaders in Catholic education. Fr. Riley holds a Doctorate from Catholic University and has been honored with many national awards over the years for his inspired university leadership, among them "Man of the Year" by the New Jersey Chapter of B'nai B'rith, the Heisman Trophy Foundation, the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick and the Italian Press Club.

During his 50 years in the Augustinian priesthood, serving under eight presidents of Villanova, Fr. George Riley, OSA '53 has authored many manuscripts and articles on religious topics, taught ethics and contemporary religion at Villanova University, and was Villanova's first liaison to the Peace Corps. Fr. Riley was named Vice President for University Relations in 1972 and has led two highly successful major capital campaigns at Villanova. Without Fr. Riley's talents and dedication, Villanova would not be the prestigious national university that it has become today.

Attorney Dan Gibson, graduate of the Villanova Law School, of the firm, Gibson & Behman, recalls that "Father Riley has proved to be a wonderful mentor and a great friend. His contributions to Villanova University, Merrimack College and the Order of St. Augustine have been without equal."

Wounded Marine Cpl. Todd Nicely 26, became a symbol of determination and courage after losing both arms and legs when he stepped on an improvised explosive device in Afghanistan last March. He is believed to be only the second quadruple amputee to survive the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Marine could have bled to death after being badly wounded by a roadside bomb. But Lance Cpl. Sean J. Harrigan, responded quickly, providing lifesaving first aid before getting Nicely on a medical helicopter. "Despite the large amount of blood flowing out of all extremities and the extreme pain that his squad leader was in, Lance Corporal Harrigan found a way to apply tourniquets on all four of the Marine's amputated limbs," according to a military report commending Harrigan for "heroic achievement. By remaining calm under an extremely chaotic situation, he single-handedly saved the life of his squad leader... all the while ignoring the significant secondary enemy threat to himself," the report noted. For his own part, Harrigan remains humble about his lifesaving heroics. So far, he has shunned any publicity about the events of March 26. He didn't even tell his parents, Mark and Sheryle Harrigan of Andover. For his actions, Harrigan received the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal as well as a handwritten thank you letter from four-star General and then commander of the International Security Assistance Force in Afghanistan, Stanley A. McChrystal.






