As we step into this loving month, let us remember the


words of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., **"The time is always right to do what is right."** Let's let kindness be what is right at Linda Vista.

Learning is fun in Kindergarten! We are expanding our center rotations to twice a week





FREE EDUCATION

Section 5 of Article IX of the State of California Constitution guarantees students a "free public education.

The State Supreme Court concluded in the 1984 case of Hartzell v. Connell, "that all educational activi-ties carried on by public school districts, extracurricular as well as curricular, must be without cost to the students who participate in such activities." This same ruling found that "mandatory fees for participating in such extra-curricular activities as drama, music, and athletic competition were illegal under the State In such extra-current at a classroom, school site, and district competition were megal under the state constitution." Furthermore, they also rejected the argument that "fees could be charged so long as the district waived fees for students who were financially unable to pay." Recent proposed legislation in-cludes reimbursement with interest for any illegally collected fees as well as a district sanction. "Donations are accepted at a classroom, school site, and district level.



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
