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Too Good for Violence

Brentwood's Fully Remote Elementary Students Facilitate Dialogue on Accountability and Reachable Goals

Fully remote second grade students at Southwest Elementary School in Brentwood have opened up a conversation aimed at dealing with difficult emotions and stopping senseless violence. Taking part in Too Good for Violence's *A Peaceable Place*—a universal, violence prevention and character education program—Southwest Elementary students are engaging in critical dialogue at the most important time.

Through myriad interactive activities, the second graders learned new strategies to improve their listening skills and acquire tools for handling anger and frustration. Spearheaded by Ms. Milagros De La Concha (and her puppet Wagner), the fully remote students collaborated virtually for a scavenger hunt to find classmates who respond to their emotions in a healthy way, use I-messages to help Wagner communicate assertively, and pinpoint strategies to reinforce their active listening skills. Along the way, students honed their social and anger management skills to understand one another better, resolve conflict peacefully and teach Wagner how to treat others with kindness. At the conclusion of the scavenger hunt, Brentwood's second grade students earned certificates of completion and participated in an activity to make their puppets.

BRENTWOOD STUDENTS THINK LIKE SCIENTISTS







Teachers in Brentwood are challenging students to incorporate the Science and Engineering Practices (SEPS) into their learning with the implementation of the new Elevate Science program in grades K-8. Students are making sense of the world around them through phenomena-based activities and explorations. In each topic of study in the Elevate Science program, students are introduced to someone working in the STEM field, such as a game designer, architect, ecologist, toy engineer, or boat builder; in this way, Brentwood students will encounter dozens of STEM careers for their own consideration over time. Students are encountering problem-based activities and quests to figure out solutions as they master the new Next Generation Learning Standards.

New York State P-12 Science Learning Standards call for a new way to learn. Elevate Science empowers students to become more self-directed, curious, and accountable. During the pandemic, the new instructional model blended both print and digital learning into dynamic student-centered experiences. Students learned to connect ideas, use evidence, and demonstrate their understandings of key concepts and skills. Three-dimensional learning requires students to make connections between Crosscutting Concepts (CCCs), Disciplinary Core Ideas (DCIs) and Science and Engineering Practices (SEPs). The new science program was adopted in grades K,1,2 and 6 in 2018-19, grades 3,5,7 in 2019-20 and grades 4 and 8 are in full implementation this school year. Our students are collecting data from measurements, keeping track of procedures, recording observations about the results of their experiments, and learning how to explain whether the observations support their predictions.

SCIENCE LIVES AT OAK PARK!

At Oak Park Elementary, the science curriculum has never been more exciting. Students demonstrated their understanding of various science and engineering skills with the following projects:

- Students from Mr. Melgar's fifth grade class learned about the layers of earth and then created a model earth.
- Students from Ms. Krumholz's class designed and built igloos with marshmallows and toothpicks.
- Students from Ms. Crowe's second grade class designed and built water dams with pop sticks.
- On the first day with snow, Ms. Amodemo's first grade students went outside to catch a snowflake, use a magnifying glass and make observations.
- Ms. Caramico's and Ms. Ermert's classes learned about arctic animals. They learned that blubber keeps polar bears and penguins warm in the cold climate.
