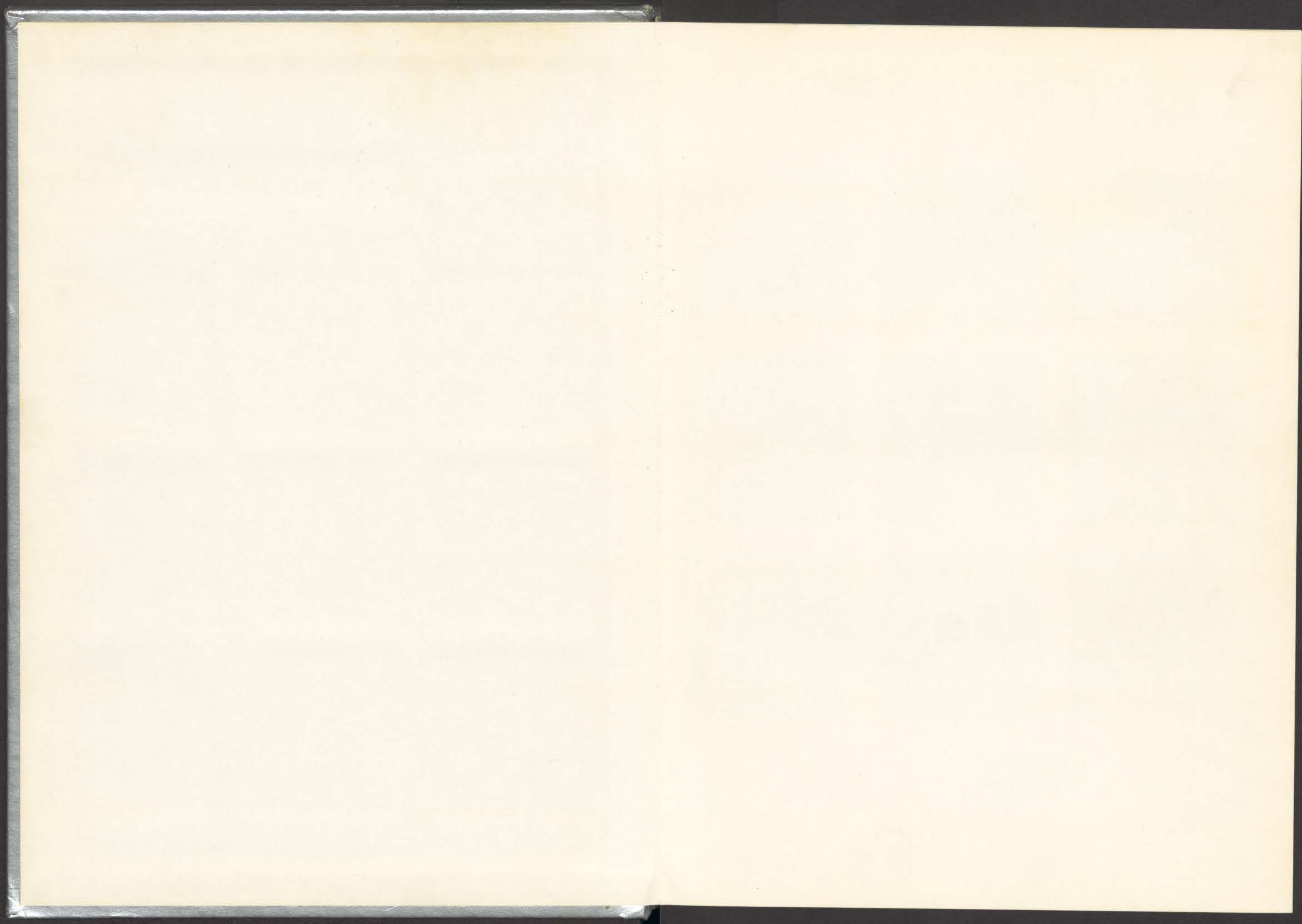

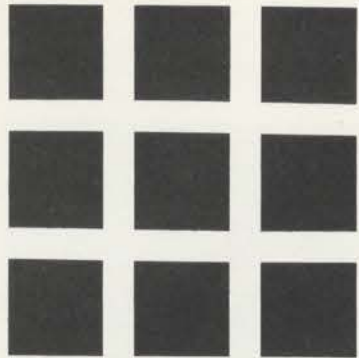

KEEPING IT TOGETHER



A slight morning breeze captures the hill in the void of early dawn. Beyond the stone wall where mortar has long vanished under the elements' harshness and beyond iron gates kept open by hinges frozen in rust, the gravel of the circular drive is settled and silent. Across the expanse of lawn, the groundhog surveys his domain, scampering from the flagpole to his rotten stump home. Brick, stone, wood, and glass, the age-old school welcomes the warmth of morning. It is the beginning of another day, one not unlike those thousands of days in the 150-odd years past. The campus awakes.

So do the students: In Virginia, the object at 6:48 a.m. is to stay on your side of the road. So what if you stayed up all night watching T.V.? So what if you ran out of the house in white shirt, navy blazer, and flannel pajama bottoms? You've gone beyond the point of no return. In Ronald McDonald-land, it is 7:22. The grill is by now just warming. The cashier sighs at the sight of the G'burg bus gang shuffling into its corner. In Frederick, the dim light of the digital clock reads 8:07. Everywhere they burrow themselves deeper under the warm blankets, cherishing the last moment of sleep.

From all directions they arrive: Some are brought by mom or dad,

motoring easily through the gates, and carefully deposited by the back steps with a load of books, a bag lunch, and a goodbye-see-you-at-2:40 kiss. Others defy the speed of light, hurtling down the drive, spraying gravel, and bottoming out the family car in the massive potholes of the back parking lot. In this carefully balanced ecosystem of cans, wrappers, radios, scattered books, gym bags, and cigarette butts, a rare breed of inhabitants — seniors, juniors, daring faculty, smoochers — thrive, lovingly guarding their environment. Soon enough, though, the harmonious mixture of heavy metal, pop, and punk gives way to a different beat.

Lockers slam, books are dropped, and voices call out, "What's first?" "What do we have?" "Did'ja do the homework?" "What homework?!" Freshmen stampede the reference room; sophomores converge on the library, talking over open books; juniors, like hobbits, huddle around their two precious chairs squeezed into their L-shaped corridor; and seniors, at the last possible moment, scramble up from the back parking lot. Before the morning bells ring, all teachers and most students have wound their way up the well-worn stairs to the floor above, the heart of the mansion, where phones unceasingly ring, xerox and ditto machines spew out a day's worth of tests and quizzes, Mr. Coffee perks, and a stream of students flows around Mrs. McNaughton's desk and spills into Father Ron's office with absence notes and life's problems.

The countdown begins:

WARNING BELL: No one flinches; not a muscle is moved in

effort to rise for class.

FIRST PERIOD BELL: People stretch, yawn, gather books, and saunter to class. Meanwhile, the G'burg bus bounces down a country road. No accidents, no detours, no mechanical problems, just late. Back at school, the only sound that reverberates above the other noises is the faculty refrain, "Where's the bus?" The atmosphere is subdued; guaranteed are almost forty-five more minutes of serenity as students and even a few teacher's wake to a day of chalk dust, assignments, excuses, and the anticipation of last period.

HOMEROOM: Marking the arrival of the usual latecomers and a bit earlier the G'burg bus, is morning "intermission" where moderators have the dreaded task of reading the announcements and where students finish conversations begun earlier, compare homework, sleep, are summoned to Mr. Hoffman's office, and ask such probing questions as "What's for lunch?" "Can I go to the bathroom/locker/back parking lot/office/call my mother?" or "Have the announcements been read?"

MORE BELLS: At first glance, second and third periods seem only to stand in the way of lunch. Yet, it is in classes that minds are challenged, ideas tested, and values shaped.

PERIOD FOUR: More classes come, including gym. The locker rooms fill with people in different stages of undress and distress. For the girls, white T-shirts, notebooks, quizzes, personal fitness charts, and laps occupy their thoughts. With great reluctance, they pull on the gym uniforms and, wearing untied sneakers, move upstairs to

participate in "the sport of the day." Jumping over heaps of button-down shirts and shoes discarded in great haste, the boys quickly march up the stairs and onto the court, a battalion in green and white ready to play. Half-court basketball is fine for most, but for the really game, riding the empty ball rack provides its own thrills. For those in gym study, THE rule of the game is "Study or else take gym."

LUNCH: In the midst of Miss Piggy pin-ups, aqua trays slide across the stainless steel counter to be filled with such memorable menu items as something-on-a-stick, surfburgers, jello with a fork, hash browns, tomato soup, jungle juice, and ham and cheese. It is commonplace to be bumped on the head by a tray as its owner stumbles over the legs of chairs to

the spot a friend is saving. Given only twenty-five minutes, eating lunch, using the bathroom, doing three periods of homework, and meeting with friends are Missions Impossible.

MORE BELLS: During periods five and six, students are finally fully awake. Through concentration and participation, seriousness and humor, subjects are explored, questions answered, and homework assigned.

PERIOD SEVEN: 2:10 — the last one, this is it, worn out by the day ... **2:20** — tolerating teachers, tolerating each other ... **2:30** — breathless anticipation, eyes glued to the clock, books ready to be packed instantly.

2:40 (GIVE OR TAKE FIVE MINUTES): Stampede of deck shoes;

invasion of the locker room and the library; piling on the bus, lowering windows to wave goodbye to friends; an assault on the back parking lot. Uniforms off and radios on, students head out, leaving behind a trail of dust. For those left, there are tutoring, meetings (all at the same time, and one must attend), practices, or pink-slip parties in PH-105 (by invitation only, of course).

After the athletes have packed their sweaty sweats and departed, after the coaches have locked up, and after Father Ron has turned out the last light, just one remnant remains to record life on this now dark and quiet campus — a forgotten navy Izod thrown over a rickety black bench.

It's all part of keeping it together.

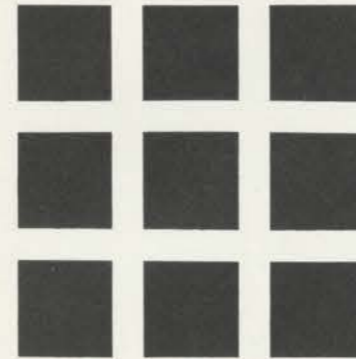

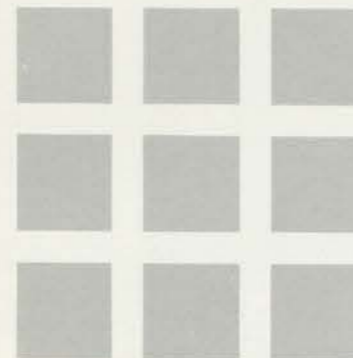

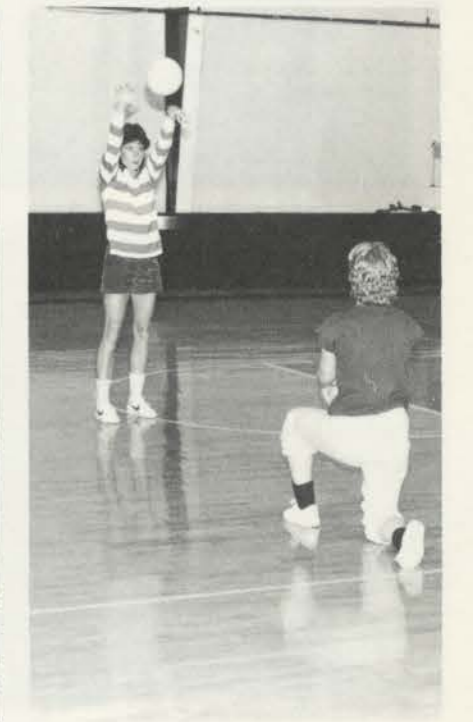

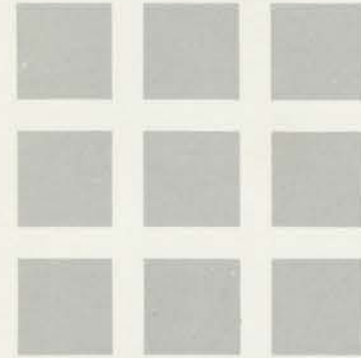

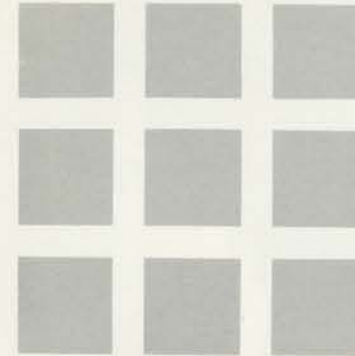

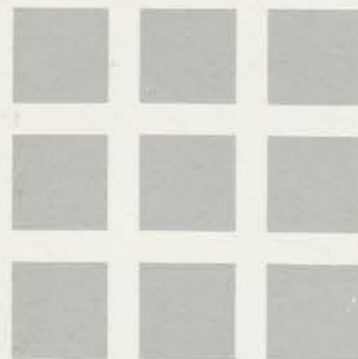

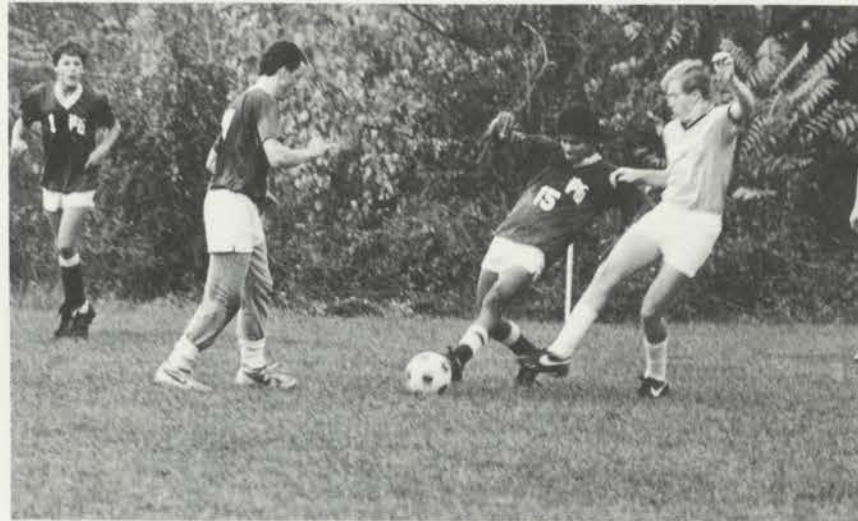
say, "Well, what can we do?"

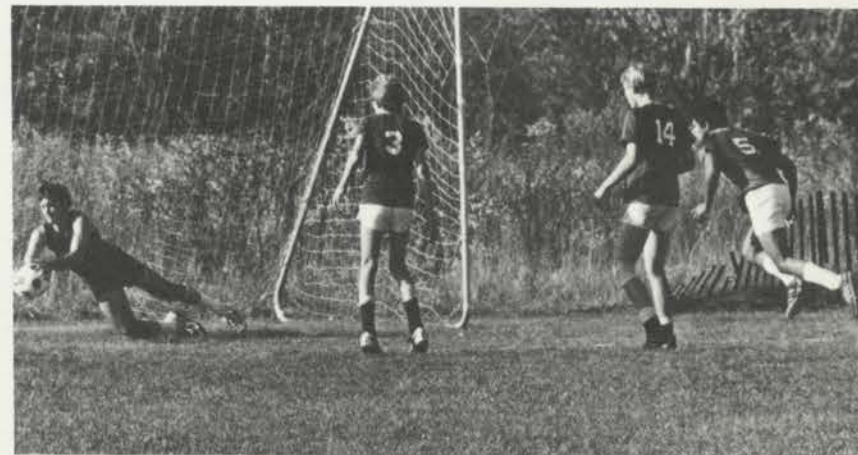

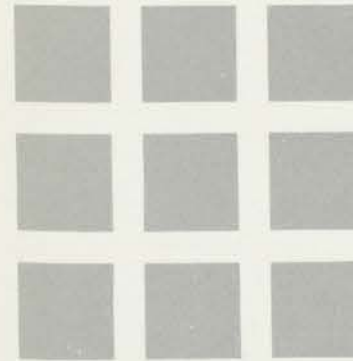

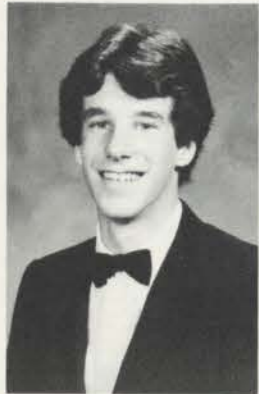

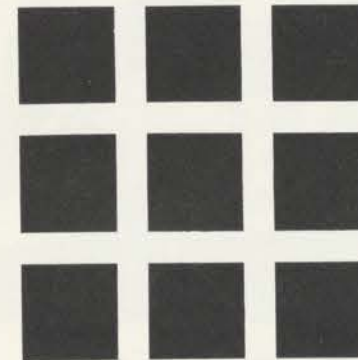

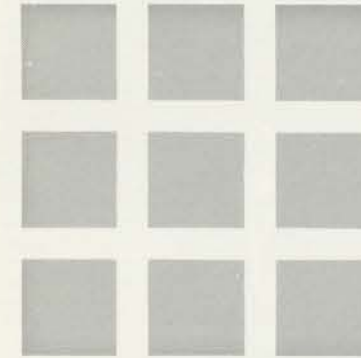

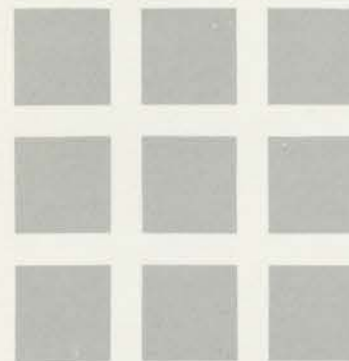

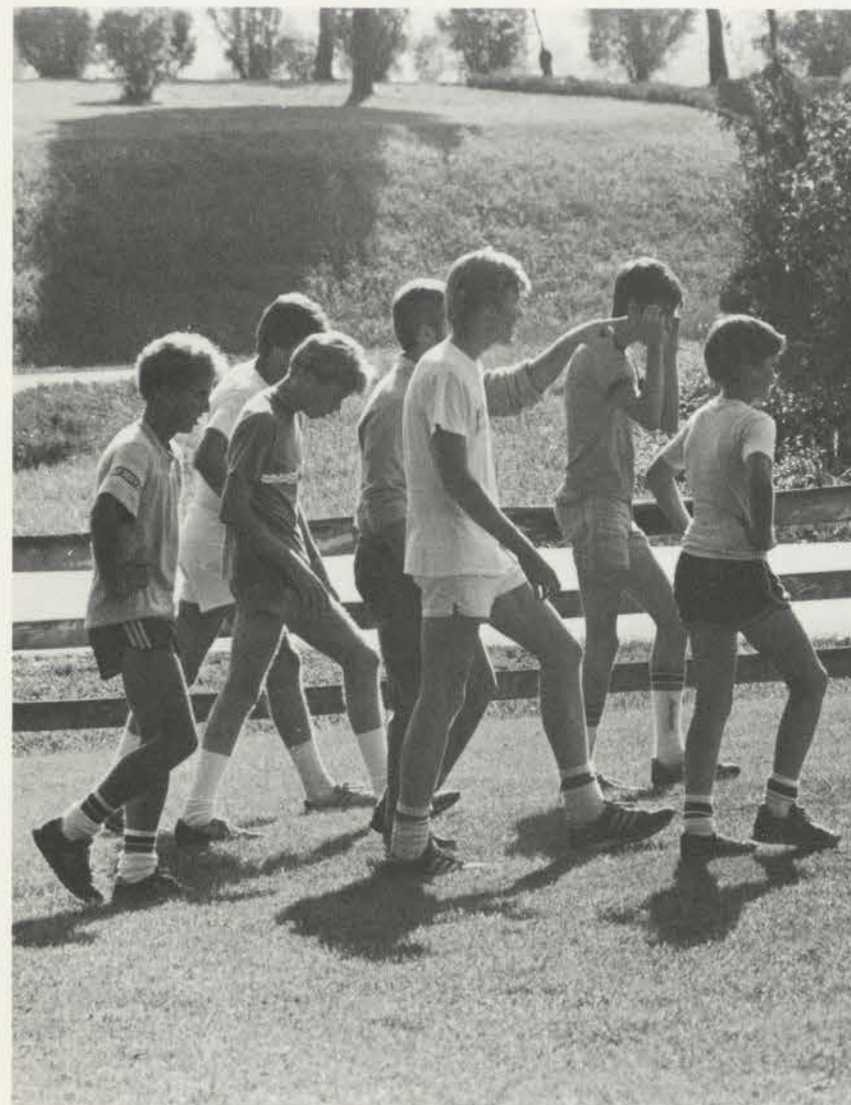
KEEPING IT ON COURSE

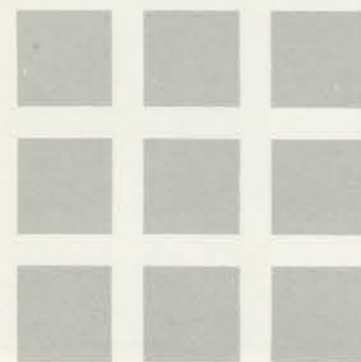

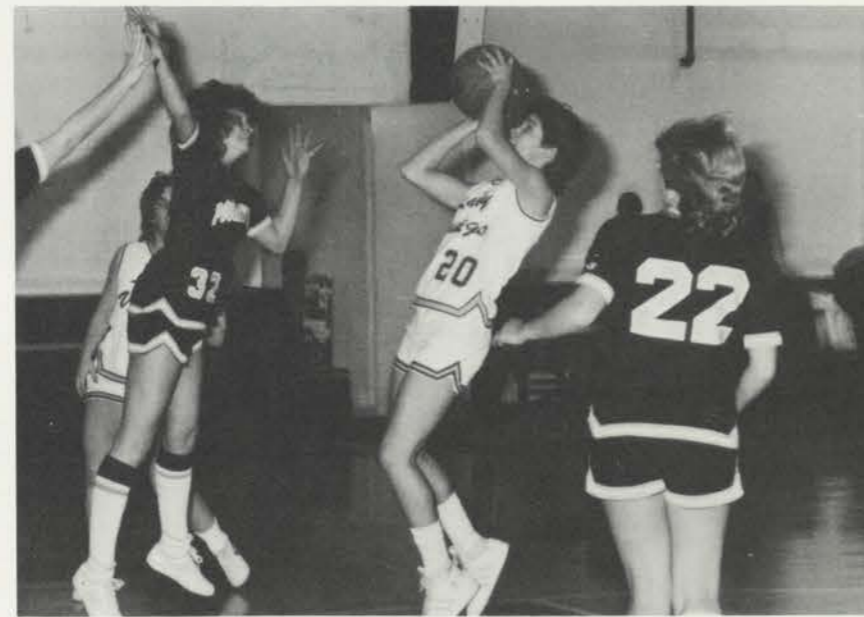

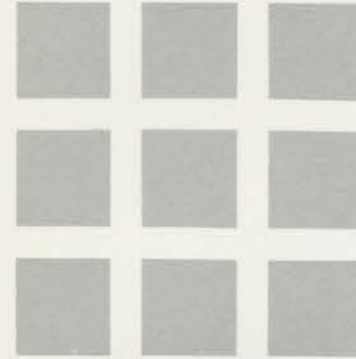

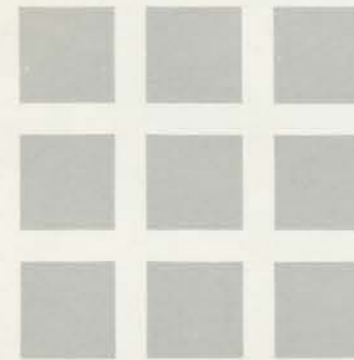

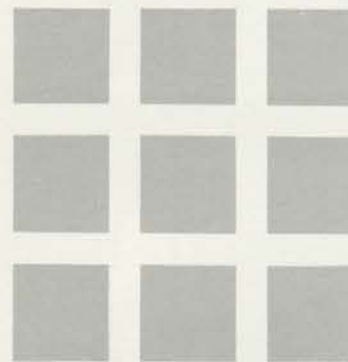

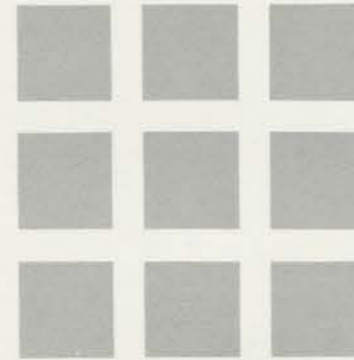
