Dear Alumni and Friends of Central Catholic High School,

Not long before his death, Robert E. Lee – arguably the most beloved military leader in American history – claimed that his one regret was having pursued a military education. At first blush, this statement from a graduate and erstwhile superintendent of West Point seems shocking. It is less so when understood from the perspective of his final years, during which he served as President of Washington College (later renamed Washington & Lee University in his honor), a renowned southern liberal arts college. Lee's statement is not intended to repudiate his service to country. Rather it expresses his acquired and profound appreciation for the humanizing effects of the intellectual life and the disciplined study of the arts and sciences.

When I was a young Brother, a former Central Catholic principal (from our School's early years) told me of a local educational leader who once proposed to him that Central Catholic transform itself into a school for technical training. The Brother was indignant at the suggestion, but not out of disdain for vocational education. Like General Lee, he was passionate about academic life; he believed unequivocally that the intellectual formation of our students was foundational to Central Catholic's mission. He understood that a rigorous liberal arts curriculum not only prepares students for university studies, it opens to them the world of ideas, develops their curiosity and skills for inquiry, sharpens their critical capacities, teaches the arts of self-expression and respectful discourse within a community of scholars, expands their horizons, and introduces them to new realms of joy. Generations of CCHS leaders and faculty have been guided by that same vision.

Academic excellence is our theme for this issue of the *Emblem*. The lives of *Thomas H. Vanderspurt '63*, a fellow at the United Technologies Research Center, and Professor *James J. Marino '87* of Cleveland State University are portraits of scholarly achievement. In the following pages they share inspiring recollections of how Central Catholic influenced their personal intellectual formation. I know you will be impressed and proud of Samantha (Bozek) Brunhaver '03 as you read about her preparation for a distinguished career among the next generation of scientists. You will also meet 10 stars within the glimmering galaxy of our class of 2010.

or evidence, one needs to look no further than the success of our most recent graduates, the Class of 2010, and our many alumni, several of whom are profiled in this magazine, including *Thomas H. Vanderspurt* '63, whose research team is developing an energetically efficient, catalytic process to convert wood and other biomass into sustainable jet fuel; and *James J. Marino* '87, a college professor whose book on William Shakespeare is due out this December.

Virtually 100% of our graduates move on to college annually. Members of the Class of 2010 are currently studying at some of the finest universities in the nation and the world, including Harvard University, Brown University, the University of Notre Dame, Boston College... and the list goes on. The success of our students on AP Exams far outpaces the national standards (93% of students who take these college level, College Board accredited classes pass the exams). An Innovative and Caring Faculty

Members of the CCHS faculty are renowned for their knowledge and passion. They are highly invested in the long-term success of their students. Central Catholic students are engaged and challenged by extraordinary teachers on a daily basis. Teachers are a driving force in defining the educational experience. The success of many of the initiatives started by the English Department and Chair Karen E. Moynihan '69SM has been featured in regional and national publications, serving as models and inspiration for teachers across the region and country. The initiatives include the Summer Reading Program, the Authors in the Classroom Series, and a Visual Literacy Program (supported by new holdings in the library). One of her articles, "A Collectibles **Project: Engaging Students in**

This innovation and passion for excellence spreads across subjects and disciplines.

Science teacher Andrew P. Nikonchuk '98 employs a collaborative, college-based skills and readiness approach that utilizes digital portfolios, technology-based research, study groups, and peer editing; and science teacher Robert T. Benedetto '89 was one of just three high school teachers recognized by the National **Science Teachers Association** with the 2009 Vernier Technology Award for his innovative use of data-collection technology within the science program for experiments and data analysis. His work is just one example of how teachers are helping students achieve a better understanding of technology and the subject material.

The use of technology at Central Catholic has become a cornerstone of the educational experience, transforming learning and teaching across disciplines and subject areas, integrating Web 2.0 and 21st Century Skills into the class-room and daily lives of students.

FUELING THE FUTURE Patenting a Catalyst for Success

Fifty Years of Fun with Science

As a junior at Central Catholic, *Thomas H. Vanderspurt '63* developed a science fair project based on the destructive distillation of wood in his backyard. Essentially, he captured the product of burning wood using soldered copper tubing and a five gallon kerosene can. "The total cost of the project was virtually nil - all scrap materials except for the copper tubing."

Nearly five decades later, he's continuing to experiment with the byproducts of wood, albeit on a much higher level. His research team is developing an energetically efficient, catalytic process to convert wood and other biomass into sustainable jet fuel for United Technologies (the parent company of Pratt & Whitney Engines and Sikorsky Helicopters).

In the interceding 48 years, Thomas became a leading expert in the field of catalysis, a scientific frontier of great practical importance. "Much of what we use in everyday life comes out of catalytic processes, including gasoline and polymers. It's a fascinating field," Thomas notes. "While we understand catalysis a lot better today than we used to, there's still a great deal to learn."

Tom has made significant contributions to the understanding of this field, as evidenced by 50 issued US patents, 31 published patent applications, numerous foreign patents, and 21 publications – all as part of his over 50 years of fun with science.

Scientific Curiosity and Inquiry

Growing up on Tower Hill, Tom conducted many experiments in his backyard and basement, where he mixed his own gunpowder.

He was a WBZ science contestant as an eighth grader, further evidence of his early love of science.

"Central Catholic had a good science program, which was very important to me," he states. Tom took the entrance exam and scored high enough to be placed in the advanced classes. As a result, he had the same classmates for four years, friends who helped to "spur him on," including *M. Wayne Salo '63*, who lived just a block away and has gone on to become the chief psychiatrist at the University of California/ Davis.

Tom's scientific curiosity and passion were fueled by his teachers,



particularly *Bro. Peter Leonard*, FMS, the junior year chemistry teacher. "He was wildly knowledgeable about all kinds of topics, and passionate about chemistry," states Tom. "He brought the subject to life. Bro. Peter had a story, no matter the topic, whether it was about sulfuric acid and the periodic table or a vignette on this, that, or the other thing. He was instrumental in focusing my career on chemistry."

"That same year, young *Warren W. Hayes '54* was notable in his enthusiasm, his teaching, and for recommending that his students all read the *Sunday New York Times*," adds Tom. "I've spent a fair amount of time writing proposals, and whatever English and writing skills I have can be traced back to the Brothers and Warren Hayes."


For his previously mentioned project on the chemistry of the

destructive distillation of wood, Tom credits Bro. Peter and his freshman year science teacher, *Bro. Paul Celestine, FMS*, who encouraged Tom to participate in the science fair as a freshman. As a result, Tom participated all four years. He also went to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) science fair and the Archdiocesan science fair. "It was somewhat of a boondoggle," laughs Tom, "a way to get out of classes for a day."

Bro. Peter permitted and encouraged after-school science experiments in the lab, although Tom's experiments certainly weren't limited to that locale. Tom recalls "running across the freeway that is now route 213 with *George A. Hart '63*, backpacks full of supplies to blow things up in a stalled housing development on a bulldozed dirt road that ran through the woods." They lowered a good sized charge down an old well. The end result: "a tower of water, leaves, and other debris shooting hundreds of feet in the air above tall trees."

"It's amazing we weren't killed," adds Tom, who served as president of the Science Club and was also a member of JETS (the Junior Engineering and Technology Society). All in the pursuit of scientific discovery.

Higher Education

Tom received scholarship offers from MIT, Worcester Polytechnic Institute, and the Lowell Technological Institute (present day UMass Lowell). Anticipating the need to work through college because of a health issue in his family, Tom decided to attend school close to home at Lowell Tech. He majored in chemistry, and one of his professors set him up with a research area in one corner of a lab, allowing him to experiment with platinum and catalysis, which would become his life's work.

After Lowell Tech, Tom attended graduate school at Princeton, where he studied and worked with the leading researchers in his field, including his doctoral advisor, renowned scientist John Turkevich, a pioneer in the use of catalysts who worked on the Manhattan Project and laid the groundwork for the widespread use of unleaded fuel.


"Princeton was a great experience," notes Tom. "My classmates were just plain geniuses – in advanced mathematics, cosmology, philosophy. The dinner table conversation was very esoteric." His Princeton experience was also notable because it was during this time that he met his future wife of 39 years (and counting): Maureen Rose Kennedy.

A Distinguished Career

After Princeton, Tom embarked on a distinguished career in research, including six years (and several scientific advances) as a research chemist at Celanese Research Co. and 20 years at Exxon Research and Engineering Co., where he served as section head and technical leader on numerous corporate research projects.

"Exxon was an interesting experience, particularly in terms of commercializing something on a large scale," notes Tom. "We went from working with a quarter teaspoon of powder to filling a container 25 feet across and over 100 feet high." His work for Exxon involved a three year stint in Baytown, Texas, and trips to Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and Paris.

As Exxon was merging with Mobil in 2000, Tom was presented with a new opportunity at United **Technologies Research Center** (UTRC). "They needed a catalysis expert to restart their catalyst program – a dream job that allowed me to concentrate on science and technology without worrying as much about budgets and other minutiae." At UTRC, Tom's been leading the research on fuel processing technology for fuel cells. Fuel cells are not quite ready for prime time, partially because hydrogen, derived from natural gas is their preferred fuel. Tom and his team are working on converting biomass, including



agricultural waste and wood, into hydrogen in a highly efficient, environmentally friendly process. It's his junior year science project 'on steroids,' or more accurately, on hydrogen.

The Future

Tom is currently making plans to retire, though he will continue to consult. He and his wife Maureen are relocating to their summer home at the Jersey Shore. They will be near their oldest daughter, who is a third grade teacher, and their two grandsons. Another daughter, after receiving a Ph.D at Harvard, is pursuing an MD degree. Their third daughter is a crew coach in Connecticut.

Thomas Vanderspurt has turned a love of chemistry (and a junior year science project) into a fulfilling 40 year career that has made significant contributions to science, the economy, and society, all while having a blast in the process.

Samantha has worked on projects for numerous companies, including A.W. Chesterton (troubleshooting industrial pumps), Boston Scientific (product testing for the vascular surgery department; product design and FDA validation for the endoscopy department), Gillette (engineering intern; cost/value improvement project), and Nissan (environmental improvements to a manufacturing process).



Samantha is currently conducting research on how engineering graduates bring their undergraduate education to bear on their jobs and future career plans.

Like many alumni, *Samantha (Bozek) Brunhaver '03* and *Thomas H. Vanderspurt '63* are using the education and the lessons they learned at Central Catholic (and beyond) to succeed in the field of science while making a positive impact on the world.

In 2010, 130 students took one or more of the 12 college level, College Board certified AP courses offered by Central Catholic. Forty of these students took science exams, with 92.5% earning passing scores (three and higher out of a possible five) and 32.5% earning the highest score of five. In addition, 23 students took the AP Calculus exam (AB), with 100% passing and 65% earning the highest score of 5.

Of course, Jim's experiences at Central Catholic extended beyond the classroom. He served on the newspaper staff and as vice president of the Theatre Guild. "I learned to love theater and performance through the Theatre Guild. I couldn't sing, but director and English teacher *Karen E. Moynihan* '69SM thought I was funny, or that I could be funny in certain situations, and she gave me the role of a cop in the musical *Guys & Dolls.* There was a free Saturday matinee performance for senior citizens, and when I delivered my line, 'Tell Nathan Detroit I'm lookin' for him,' a man in the audience replied, 'Ooh, a tough guy, huh?' I couldn't believe it - I was getting heckled by a senior citizen."

His Love of Shakespeare


"I was reading Shakespeare on my own at a young age, but my classroom experience reading *Othello* in Karen Moynihan's class prepared me well for my classes at Harvard the next fall, where we spent half a semester on *Othello*. Lots of people would say that Shakespeare 'just' wrote popular entertainment. But Shakespeare doesn't treat popular entertainment as 'just' anything. He presumes people are basically intelligent, that the reader, the viewer, the popular audience is not stupid or gullible. Plus, he's really, really funny."

"My love of theater and Shakespeare stands up today – there's a direct line from who I was then, at 15, to who

I am today. Central Catholic is the cornerstone of everything that I've done since high school."

A Distinguished Career

Jim's ultimate goal: to become a writer and a professor. His original plan was to go straight through to his doctorate, but he took a few detours along the way – teaching high school for a couple of years and getting his MFA in creative writing from UMass before going on to Stanford University, where he studied with some of the leading experts in his chosen field: Renaissance literature. He also taught full-time at Stanford for a year before becoming a professor at Cleveland State University, a university and a city he deeply appreciates for its world class art museum, symphony orchestra, and great restaurants.

The Future

Jim is on top of the world (which, for him especially, is a stage). This past August, he was tenured and promoted to associate professor, and his book is coming out in December. But in the words of Shakespeare (or, more specifically, Antonio in *The Tempest*), "what's past is prologue."

Jim's in the process of lining up his next book on Renaissance literature, and he enjoys teaching his students at Cleveland State University, students and a university that are committed to educational opportunity -— the same commitment to educational opportunity that Jim learned from his teachers and experiences at Central Catholic.



His hard work on the field and in the classroom paved the way for acceptance and a full scholarship to Brown University. "I never thought I'd have a chance to go to an Ivy League school or play football like this. I have Central Catholic to thank for that."




