We even travel abroad to the Dominican Republic to restore water delivery to villages.

BRIDGET SHAHEEN '64SM

Executive Director (Ret.), Lazarus House

One of Bridget Shaheen's first memories of serving others took place in her own family home as a child. Her father served as Director of Public Safety in the City of Lawrence for over ten years, and when he had to leave for an emergency such as a fire, Bridget's mother would make coffee and ask the children to start collecting gloves around the house, because the people who were displaced would need them.

"I grew up in an environment that encouraged helping others," said Bridget. "My family's house was always open to people who had nowhere to go — we never had an empty house — and my parent's commitment to serving others stayed with me. Since elementary school, I can recall having a passion to help the materially poor. I admired that these individuals had no pretense about them — they have nothing to give you but themselves."

Now many years later and after a recent retirement (June 2019) as Executive Director of Lazarus House, the organization to which Bridget dedicated her life's passion, continues to expand after she set the wheels in motion and kept them moving for almost four decades.

Bridget's commitment to serving the City of Lawrence officially began in college, when she and many other aspiring teachers in the area joined a program to teach English to adult immigrants at Holy Rosary Church.

"I was brand new to teaching, I wasn't bilingual and I had all non-English speaking students," said Bridget. "There were no blackboards or supplies, but we somehow made it work!"

The seed that would become Lazarus House was planted in 1981, when Brother Thomas Petite (co-founder of Lazarus House) returned from serving in India where he worked directly with

Mother Theresa who encouraged him to help those in need in his own community. This concept is described by Bridget as "not stepping over Jesus at home, to get to Jesus outside."

From finding a primary location to finalizing mission, goals and the population being served, it took almost two years to plan Lazarus House (1981-83).

"When Lazarus House opened in 1983 on Holly Street in Lawrence, we had five beds, a volunteer cook, and one guest - it just grew from there!" said Bridget. The organization now consists of nine buildings including a soup kitchen, a grocery store-style food pantry, a shelter, transitional housing, three thrift stores, career path training and ESL education.

From the beginning, Lazarus House was (and still is) an emergency shelter first and foremost, where the homeless can get a bed, as well as food, clothes, toiletries, and school supplies. The organization serves upwards of 1,000 families a week and distributes 12 tons of food in that time.

"We are always looking at all aspects of poverty so we can offer the proper tools for people to move out of their situation and help them become active members of society," said Bridget. "We always aim to give a 'hand up' to those who need assistance."





Central Catholic and Lazarus House share a special connection – CCHS students, faculty and staff volunteer regularly at the organization and donation drives through the school often benefit Lazarus House. Bridget believes that when high school students spend time at Lazarus House, they can't help but be impacted.

"Spending time with the people at Lazarus House and interacting with them face-to-face will break all stereotypes of how people envision poverty. Students develop their own understanding that these are good, hardworking, courageous people who don't have access to basic needs. It's heart-wrenching, and that experience stays with you and makes you more compassionate."

Another connection CCHS shares with Bridget is the act of embracing religious faith and letting it lead to powerful life experiences. "Miracles happen all the time at Lazarus House! I dare anyone to spend quality time at Lazarus House and not see a miracle happen."

Now enjoying a much deserved retirement, Bridget is cherishing quality time with her family, specifically her five grandchildren. "I'm going to focus on hearing what God has in mind for me."

I periodically look back on my career and realize that God put these experiences in my life for a reason.

An old proverb states "Give a man a fish, and you feed him for a day; show him how to catch fish, and you feed him for a lifetime."

Juan Bonilla '91 believes – and practices – giving those in need a "hand up" by showing individuals how to improve their lives on a variety of levels through knowledge and life tools. As the Deputy Director and long-time employee of Lawrence Community Works (LCW), his entire profession is based on helping others to "feed for a lifetime."



Juan's passion for teaching others how to better their lives is derived from his own personal experience. At the age of nine, he came to Lawrence from Puerto Rico with his mother. "My mother was strong and persistent. She worked long hours to make sure we had what we needed," said Juan.

Since then, he has relied upon his mother's endurance as a model to improve his own life. He attended the Boys and Girls Club of Lawrence, which became a true a sanctuary for him – it is also where he learned about the concept of community service and helped others for the first time. "I received great support and mentorship from the Club and they helped get me on the right track." The Club also pointed him in the direction of Central Catholic, where he attended on a Montagne Scholarship, and ultimately excelled in academics and athletics.

Juan started volunteering at Lawrence Community Works teaching financial courses, showing participants how to save money. He also encountered a unique program where LCW matched a participant's savings (\$1,200 over two years), as long as the funds are used for home ownership or higher education.

His first official position at LCW was as a first-time home buyer counselor, where he advised people financially and led classes and counseling sessions to help people own a home. Due to the rapid growth of the program, Juan happily inherited more responsibility and with that, the title of Coordinator.

In 2006, inundated with requests for assistance due to the foreclosure crisis, Juan was able to serve in an advocate role and during his tenure, LCW opened a home ownership center, increased ongoing education, provided landlord classes, condo training, and foreclosure prevention. He eventually became Director of Asset Building for LCW where he initiated English classes, and savings and loan programs.

Juan became Deputy Director of Lawrence Community Works in 2013 and throughout his time at LCW, he is sure of one thing - community is key. "It's extremely important that people don't feel alone. I realize that I need to be part of the process, helping people to change systemic barriers."

A passion for system change is what drives Juan's passion for community service. "My work is all about helping people get out of their cycle of unfortunate situations and helping them make progress over time. I teach those seeking assistance how to commit to their own dreams and goals and how to develop financial resilience. This process happens through partnerships and relationships with folks to make our city a better place, to bring people together — it truly changes lives."

ALEXANDER MORAN '10

Preventing the Spread of HIV and Tuberculosis Overseas

Since graduating from CCHS in 2010,
Alexander Moran '10 has spent a large portion of his time overseas - specifically in Southeast Asia and Southern Africa - educating select populations on the prevention of HIV and Tuberculosis. Currently a Senior Program Officer for Monitoring and Evaluation at University Research Company (supported by USAID, and The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation), his passion for sharing health knowledge abroad started while participating in community service projects at Central Catholic.

While serving meals at Cor Unum Meal Center in Lawrence, Alex discovered first-hand the privilege he has been afforded most of his life. As an undergraduate at George Washington University, Alex took his passion for service and combined it with his interest in public health by developing a maternal health intervention in Butare, Rwanda. "This experience offered my first hands-on international public health experience and served to highlight the true, unavoidable discrepancy in access to safe, compassionate healthcare in lower-income countries such as Rwanda, when compared to the United States."



Alex didn't stop there — while earning his Master of Science in Public Health Degree from Johns Hopkins University, he became a certified HIV tester and counselor for the State of Maryland and worked at an HIV clinic geared towards stigmatized populations. "Making a connection with clients and being able to put someone at ease during an arguably stressful interaction is something I really value and continue to take with me in my current work."

Today, Alex travels to parts of Asia and Africa several times a year, sharing his knowledge and compassion through every visit. "I think we all have a responsibility to contribute to our communities, whether local physical communities, social communities or the larger world stage. We owe it to ourselves and to those around us to build each other up as much as possible."

Now entering his 12th year leading trips for Project Rebuild on behalf of CCHS, Andy has given of his time to lesser known impoverished spots in the United States such as Newburg, New York— where he continues to bring students to work on housing repairs for those in need.

"Service is something that once you start, you want to continue," said Andy. "Sometimes it's hard to see progress which can get emotional, but I am able to see changes made over the years. The students who come to Newburg for a week don't necessarily get to see the finished product, but they learn that even just completing one hardwood floor can make a big difference."

Student volunteers on Andy's watch receive the full-service experience by rotating through all available jobs which include assisting at a soup kitchen and meeting with the family for whom they're building.

"We want our students to make time to get to know the homeowners – making actual human connections, not just working."

In addition to Project Rebuild, Andy also participates in "Beyond Sunday Missions" – a community service group he founded eight years ago. This service work brings him and student volunteers to Mexico, Maine, which has a 97% poverty rate with mostly elderly residents in need of home repairs. In his limited remaining spare time, Andy has led high school summer and winter retreat camps for over two decades in Alton Bay, New Hampshire.

Andy's daughters Samantha 'II and Mackenzie '13, were both very involved in community service at CCHS, throughout college, and now continue to serve in their professional years.

When I first started serving, it took time for me to realize that it's not just about getting the job done, it's about meeting the families and learning their stories.

"POVERTY, POLICY AND JUSTICE"

Course Explores All Angles of Poverty



When students in Mrs. Diana Chase's Social Justice course expressed interest in learning more about poverty, she responded by designing "Poverty, Policy and Justice" - a course with a curriculum that dissects the inner workings of poverty from all angles.

Now in its 10th year, students delve deep into the concepts of domestic poverty, working poor, homelessness and Global poverty. Students explore the underlying cause of poverty and how to address this issue through a Christian lens.

The entire class collaborates to develop a strategy to assist those in poverty such as a sock drive for the Lazarus House, collecting school supplies for children, or gathering coats for the homeless. Students plan and execute these projects, working face-to-face with local organizations and those they serve, while gaining invaluable hands-on experience and interacting with populations they typically would not encounter.

LAZARUS HOUSE: CCHS Serves it Up

Approximately once a month, members of the CCHS administration, faculty and staff volunteer to prepare and serve a meal at Lazarus House – located right around the corner from the CCHS campus. The food provided is purchased, cooked and served by the volunteers with the support of the Lazarus House kitchen supplies.

COMMUNITY SERVICE REFLECTION

Raider Nation Opens Hearts and Doors to Community in Response to Merrimack Valley Tragedy



The Central Catholic family quickly banded together as a support system for the community after Andover, North Andover and parts of Lawrence were rocked by unexpected gas-related explosions and fires over a year ago on September 13, 2018. Dozens of homes were completely destroyed, an 18-year-old man lost his life, and several were injured – thousands of residents were required to leave their homes. Now over a year later, the impacted communities are thriving, but are still rebounding from this unfortunate event.

"This unexpected tragedy impacted so many families – many of which are affiliated with Central Catholic in some way," said CCHS President Christopher F. Sullivan '8I. "As a Catholic institution in the Marist tradition, our first thought was "How can we help?" and we offered as much assistance as possible."

CCHS acted quickly in a variety of ways:

- Directly following the September 13 incident, Central Catholic offered campus as an
 emergency shelter space, and on September 15, the campus was used as a shelter managed
 by Groundwork Lawrence and Lazarus House, with support from the American Red Cross.
 Over 80 beds, food, toiletries, the use of showers, clothing even games for children were
 provided for the more than 25 displaced individuals finding refuge at CCHS.
- A web site was created www.centralcatholic.net/updates to inform the CCHS community and beyond of the state of affairs of the campus. Most importantly, two forms were created and posted on the site one for families to request assistance, and another form for those who were offering assistance. Due to the availability of the forms, several families in need were identified and over 250 members of the Raider family offered support in various forms.
- Many members of the Raider community volunteered their time including the Girls Varsity and Junior Varsity Soccer Teams who were practicing on the field and relocated to the gym to help transport materials to Lazarus House.
- Students participating in Walk 2018 asked that a portion of the proceeds go to a special fund which supports members of the CCHS family after a tragedy.

When Rebekah was in the seventh grade, she had her first community service experience through an organization called Aaron's Presents, which gives children an opportunity to envision and accomplish a project that benefits others, while they gain valuable leadership and project management skills in the process. Since then, Rebekah's passion for serving has gone full bloom!

"My first community service project was organized by myself and a few of my friends, and we bought and delivered food and supplies for a large group of homeless individuals who were living under a bridge in Lawrence at the time," said Rebekah.

Rebecca and the group brought items to those in need, and spent time with them engaging in conversation and trying to understand their reality. "I felt so happy knowing that the little thing we did for them brought so much happiness into their lives."

My whole life has been filled with community service and always trying to give back to others.



After that enlightening experience, Rebekah started seeking out and accomplishing additional service opportunities including helping at food banks, and organizing clothes for shelters. When Rebekah came to Central Catholic, she started helping out in Campus Ministry on a regular basis.

"I decided to give a little bit of my time and volunteer for the Mexico, Maine trip where we took a week to rebuild or renew houses for those in need. It was a great experience for me, because it showed how I should not take anything for granted and always be grateful for everything I have in life."

ELVIN ROSA '21Community Service All-Star

Elvin has generously completed over 150 hours of community service for CCHS (far beyond the 24 hours of service required for graduation) through a multitude of programs. "Community service is one of the most important things in my life. I feel empty without community service, but with it I feel full."

Marist Mentors - a program created in 2010 by then students Michelle Abou Raad '12 and Anya Housianitis '13 to serve the children of Lawrence — is near and dear to Elvin's heart since he attended the program as an adolescent. "This program changed my life! I spend a lot of time at the Lawrence Boys and Girls Club, a place where I've been a member since the age of seven. I've grown up and witnessed how much kids in the City of Lawrence struggle with many things, such as poverty, homework, and fitting in. Now, I am one of the leaders of the program and I am a successful mentor."

Elvin also dedicates his time to Kids 2 Camp — an activity-focused program that serves 15 to 30-year-olds with special needs. "I have some special needs family members, but this camp was very eye opening — every participant touched my heart. I didn't think they were going to act the same way I acted, but they danced hard, screamed, and had a good time just like me!"

He also volunteers for **Sunday Swim**, a program that helps kids with special needs learn how to swim. "I am a swimmer and I really enjoy helping these kids get comfortable in the water, and explore the sport and art of swimming."



Whenever I feel like I have no meaning, I think back to all of my community service acts and it makes me realize what an impact I have made on so many lives. Knowing you have made an impact on someone else's life - well that's the true meaning of life in my opinion.



CCHS STUDENTS BRING ALMA MATER TO A LOYAL FAN OF RAIDER NATION

The late **Thomas McCarthy**, 95, was a resident at the Mary Immaculate Nursing and Restorative Center in Lawrence – just a few blocks from Central Catholic High School, a place that was near and dear to his heart. Thomas was a particularly big fan of the CCHS Alma Mater, so seven generous students brought the song to his door at Mary Immaculate.

In a display of true Marist intentions, the students visited with him and excitedly linked arms around each other and sang the Alma Mater for Thomas, as he happily sang along while wearing his CCHS shirt and baseball cap. "It was very thoughtful of the students to come

visit with all they have going on," said Thomas. "They deserve a lot of gratitude and I am very grateful."

The student participants were incredibly moved by the experience and appreciated the opportunity to put a smile on his face. "My heart felt so overjoyed while we were singing for Thomas!" said Elina Khoury '21. "There is just something so wonderful about knowing

you are doing something to make others happy. As a Marist school, Central Catholic strives to help the least favored, and through this experience, I finally understood how important that is to others."

Thomas was a student at CCHS in 1937 and though he didn't complete his time at Central Catholic, he recalled CCHS being "a very warm and welcoming place to be." Thomas' son Dennis McCarthy '70, who was with his father while the students sang, is a Central Catholic graduate and former member of the CCHS Board of Directors. Dennis has three daughters who also graduated from CCHS: Allison (McCarthy) Carvalho '04; Meredith McCarthy '05; and Paige (McCarthy) Petroni '10.

"While a student at Central Catholic, my father's favorite teacher was Br. Linus in Religion class back in 1937, and he loved to play baseball," said Dennis. "Over the past 40 years, he has enjoyed attending CCHS basketball and football games and is a true Raider fan. I want to thank these dedicated students for making him feel so special and part of the CCHS family!"

PAINT NIGHT AT FIDELITY HOUSE

A group of Central Catholic students volunteered their time and got messy at paint night! Students were paired with individuals who have intellectual and/or developmental disabilities, assisting them with planning out their art and offering direction and support. This activity wasn't led by instructors, but instead was a free paint where participants were able to utilize their own personal artistic talents with the assistance of student-volunteers and direct care staff.

The event was offered through Fidelity House – a non-profit organization in Lawrence that offers family support services, in-home services, residential options and more to those with intellectual and developmental disabilities.



Central Catholic sophomore Brianna Hasbany '22 enjoyed helping the artists bring their pieces to life. "I enjoy working with people to help make them feel happy, welcome, and to help them have fun. I wanted to be able to put a smile on their faces. I feel it is important to volunteer for events like this, because we are so blessed with what we have, and it is good to give back to other people who may need support."

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC SERVICE TRIP

During the 2019 February vacation, over 30 Central Catholic students lived the CCHS mission by serving the "least favored" as they traveled to the Dominican Republic to help build aqueducts, assist with childcare and medical clinics, and improve water systems for those in need.

The students were separated into three groups: one stayed at the mission house in Las Matas de Farfan working with missionary sisters to help care for children; the second group trekked into the mountains and built aqueducts and assisted with medical clinics; and the third group worked on a non-functional water system at a school named La Aventura.



Recent CCHS graduate Jack Larcome '19 was part of the team tasked with repairing a water system. "Our job was to put in a new system so that the village school can get water once again. Before we arrived, they were using a truck to transport water to the school, which was getting quite expensive. Over five days, we had found a new water source and ran just under three miles of tubing across rugged, steep terrain. We were successful in completing the aqueduct, and they now have a good source and flow of water." Jack's brother Samuel Larcome '20, a CCHS senior, also attended the trip.

The service trip — which consistently has a large group of volunteers from CCHS every year - was offered through St. Matthew's Church (Windham, NH).



STUDENTS SUPPORT ATHLETES AT SPECIAL FIELD GAMES

More than 100 Central Catholic students volunteered to help athletes aged eight to 70 with special needs work through a series of outdoor challenges during the 38th Annual Special Field Games at the Haverhill campus of Northern Essex Community College.

Sponsored by the Service Club of Andover and the Massachusetts Knights of Columbus, CCHS student volunteers coached the athletes through a variety of activities including 25, 50, 100 and 300 yard runs; frisbee and tennis ball toss, soccer ball kick; and for wheelchair bound athletes, there was the turtle pull and 25-yard race. The volunteers also assisted with set up, lunch and clean up, and they led the athletes in the most popular line dances.

Abigail Bolduc '21 assisted athlete David Tweedie throughout the day as he completed the activities. "It was a very positive and up lifting experience," said Abigail. "I chose to do this event because it sounded like a whole lot of fun and it was! -



Also being one-on-one with an athlete made it easy to connect with them and just have a day of fun. I think my favorite part of this whole experience was the positivity being shared throughout and also the fact that everyone got a trophy and a medal at the end."

Earline Tweedie, Director of Campus Ministry at Central Catholic, is mother to David Tweedie, a participating athlete who looks forward to this event all year long.

"For many of the athletes, my son included, this day ranks with Christmas Day," said Earline. "The attention, care and smiles shared with them brighten their day, months and year. This is an incredible experience for everyone involved."

CHRISTMAS PROJECT BRINGS GIFTS TO 48 FAMILIES

The Christmas Project is a time-honored, entirely student operated initiative with a goal of providing Christmas gifts to 48 of the 'least favored' families in the local community.

In an effort to raise funds for the project, student leaders work alongside Campus Ministry to identify a representative from each of the 48 homerooms at CCHS, each of which are assigned one family. After three collection days and a successful school-wide raffle, the money raised by each homeroom is used to purchase gifts for their specific sponsored family, and delivered the week before Christmas in collaboration with Catholic Charities. Any additional donations are used to purchase coats, gloves and mittens for Lazarus House, which are hand-delivered by Central Catholic faculty and students.






