






#### Social-Emotional Wellness





#### Four More California Distinguished Schools

Stanford and Stephens middle schools, California Academy of Math and Science (CAMS) and Sato Academy are the latest to earn the California Distinguished School Award for exceptional gains in student achievement. Since 1986, 44 LBUSD schools have received the prestigious honor from the California Department of Education.



#### **Best Public Schools in California**

CAMS clinched the top spot as the No.1 best public high school in California on Niche.com's 2024 Best High Schools list.



Keller Middle School won the All-Sports Award for having the best middle school sports program in the district. Keller won city championships in flag football, girls' track and girls' soccer.

Lakewood High School girls' basketball and boys' soccer were CIF finalists.

CAMS won its first-ever CIF girls' tennis championship.

CAMS ranked as the No. 5 best high school in California and No. 39 nationally out of 18,000 public high schools. Sato Academy ranked No. 191 in the nation and McBride High School ranked No. 132 in California.



#### Linked Learning Certification

11 LBUSD high school pathways earned gold or silver certifications from the Linked Learning Alliance for demonstrating key components of specialized academic and career learning experiences.



The boys' track team at Poly High School and the girls' track team at Wilson High School won CIF State championships. Wilson has now earned consecutive state championships.

Millikan High School's Jason Parra won the state championship in boys' cross country. Wilson High School's Samantha Hamilton earned a CIF title in the 500m freestyle in girls swimming.
