STITCH OF LIFE: COLLABORATION WORKSHOPS

Shared making experiences helps us to connect, to listen and talk, value and exchange experiences. The identity tags, which echo gift or travel labels also play with the idea of 'labelling'. Our aim is to create a collective sense of belonging and collective understanding.

We invite you to create your own personal statement tag and add this to the banner installation SEEN/UNSEEN. The words, imagery, poems, or statements you create should be messages about hope and belonging, identity, differences, respect and equality.

These spaces provide opportunity to meet people you may not usually come into contact with across the wider College community, to share your experiences with identity, and to learn about how others experience it.

The art of sewing, a craft that is often seen as a domestic female role is an age-old process embedded in every community, culture, and country. Fine stitching and embroidery is often adopted by the finest fashion houses whilst carrying the controversy of sweat shop industries.

Sewing and making can be a time when often (but not always) the women in a community come together to create, talk, and share. It can be a time to listen and be heard.

I AM LIBRARY

The Human Library is an international organization and movement that first started in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 2000. It aims to address people's prejudices by helping them to talk to those they would not normally meet. The organisation uses a library analogy of lending people rather than books. During the month of February we are going to create our own version of this: the I AM Library. An overview of visiting speakers, OAs, and DC staff will be available to be 'borrowed' for discussion and sharing parts of their life experiences and stories. SIR NICK PARTRIDGE - THINKING ABOUT... IT'S A SIN TUESDAY 8 FEBRUARY, 5PM - ZOOM

In 1985, Nick joined the AIDS charity, the Terrence Higgins Trust (THT), as its first member of staff and stepped down as its Chief Executive at the end of 2013. During that time, the Terrence Higgins Trust grew to become the largest community-based HIV/AIDS and sexual health organisation in the UK. In 2013, THT directly supported over 100,000 people, employed 350 staff and mobilised more than 15,000 members. For over 35 years, Sir Nick has been a high-profile media commentator on HIV prevention, testing and treatment, as well as campaigning for greater public support for people living with HIV and confronting the stigma and discrimination so many still face.



Sir Nick shares: The recent Channel 4 drama It's a Sin followed a group of young gay men who moved to London in 1981. They became friends and lovers, but the fast-developing HIV/AIDS crisis soon upended their lives, as it did mine.


After volunteering at London Gay Switchboard, I joined the Terrence Higgins Trust in 1985, where I worked for the next three tumultuous decades.

I'll describe how the LGBTQ+ community and our allies responded to AIDS fear, prejudice, pain and loss with compassion and commitment, paving the way for the development of highly effective drug treatments and transforming social attitudes to sex and sexuality in the UK.

Instead, this 90-page book challenged me to reconnect with my culture and my sense of self. In this book, Shafak challenges her readers to tell their stories so that they can listen to the stories of others. She encourages us to embrace our multiple cultures and belongings, so we do not engage in the cancel culture social media has facilitated. One of my biggest takeaways from this text is it's okay to feel despondent to the world around you, so we can continue to talk and learn from each other. **Ms Milton**



CELEBRATION OF LUNAR NEW YEAR

Lunar New Year is a time-honoured festival celebrated by multiple countries in Asia, and it is increasingly popular in some Western countries.

More than 1.5 billion people celebrate Lunar New Year each year with colourful traditions and activities to welcome a new year and wish for luck and prosperity. It has different names in different countries, for example, in Vietnam, Lunar New Year is known as Tet; in Korean, it is called Seollal.

This year Lunar New Year falls on Tuesday, 1 February. This date varies from year to year as it's based on the lunar calendar which always falls between 21 and 51 days behind the international calendar for new year.

We are excited to share the diverse and wider ranging traditions of Lunar new year and have a range of talks, workshops and events happening during DC IAM.

ART AND DT

Drawing inspiration from Clare Twomey's PRODUCING PRODUCTION in the Tate Exchange that drew the public into a conversation about how they connect to their everyday ideas of production, labour, value and exchange. The shared making of 12 large fabric banners transformed the space into the place for dialogues around their ideas of Production. The hung fabric banners held words collectively drawn from a year's activity in Tate Exchange around ideas and dialogues of production. Through the shared public labour, words were added to the banners by the public over two days to form a lasting record of their collective understanding of production in 2018.
