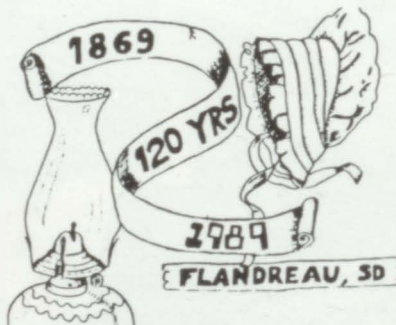


Students hang onto hundreds of balloons before they were sent off in the wind to other places. Each balloon had a message for its finder to come and celebrate our state's centennial.

Students used what little free time they had to do activities other than school work. They used their spare time to sleep, eat, goof around, and hang out . . . anything but detention.



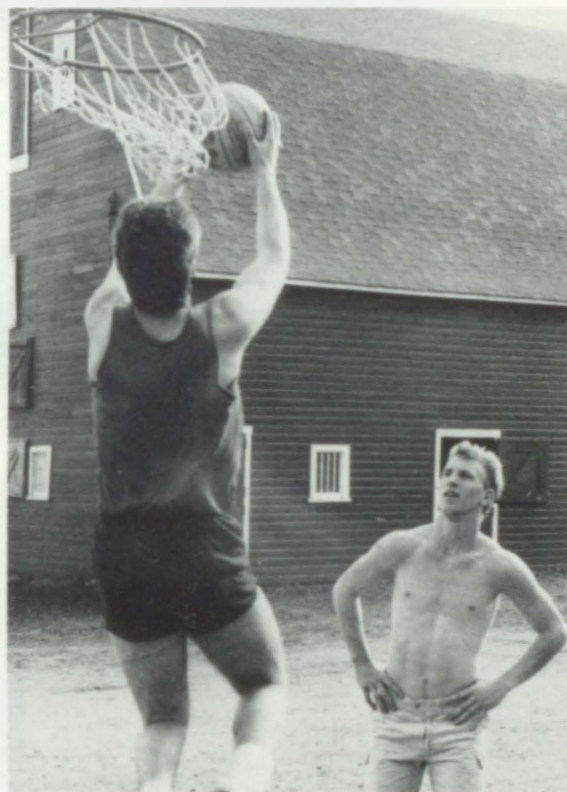

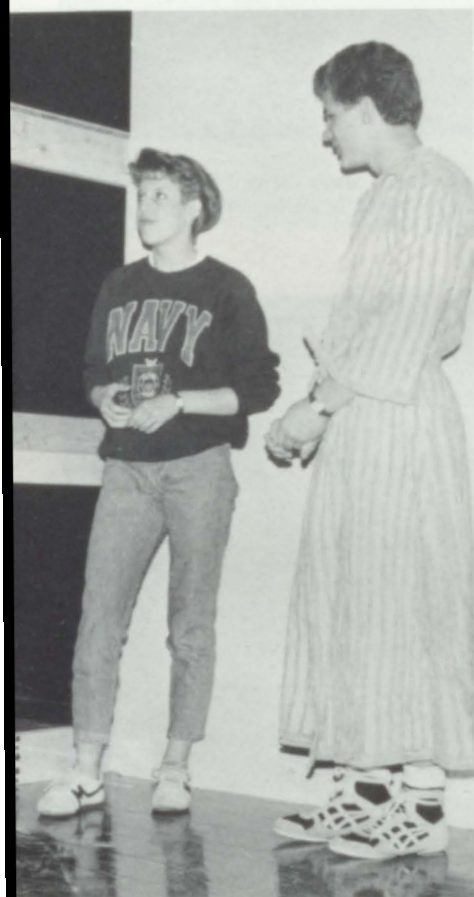

class voted on the theme "When I'm With You" and emerald green and silver for the colors. The week before prom was spent gathering

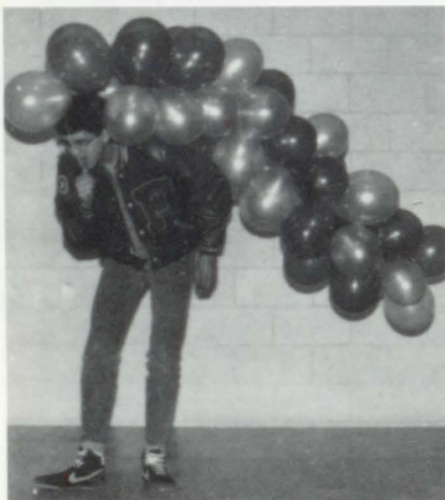
supplies, hanging streamers and blowing up balloons in preparation for the big night.

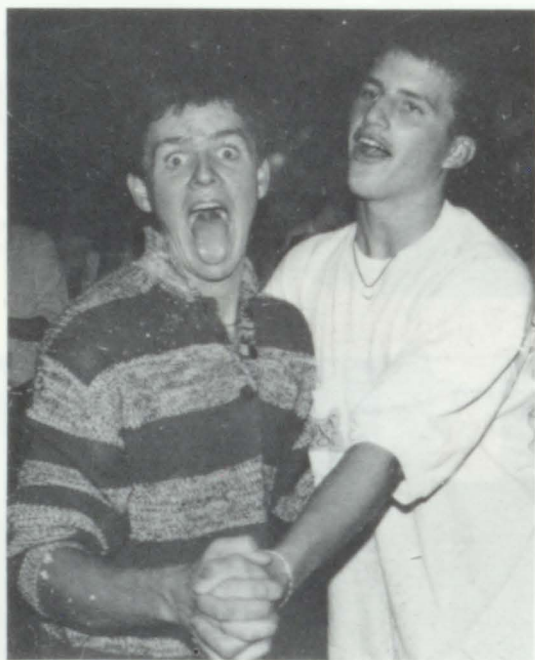


Every Little Step

The Fliers weren't expected to do well this year, but they sure proved people wrong. Last year's underclassmen led the team to the quarterfinal playoff game and became this year's 7-3 team. "This year we took a reasonably unknown group of football players and came up with a

championship team. What could this be attributed to? Desire, heart, and the tradition of Flier football," was Coach Jim McGlone's response to this year's season. Flandreau concluded the 1988 season with 3021 total yards while holding their opponents to only 1842 total yards. Steve May

led in rushing and scoring with 1038 yards and 100 points. Akamu Barboza topped the tackle statistics with 101 tackles. Quarterback Kevin Zwart passed for 843 yards while Brian Johnson was on the receiving end for 259 yards.

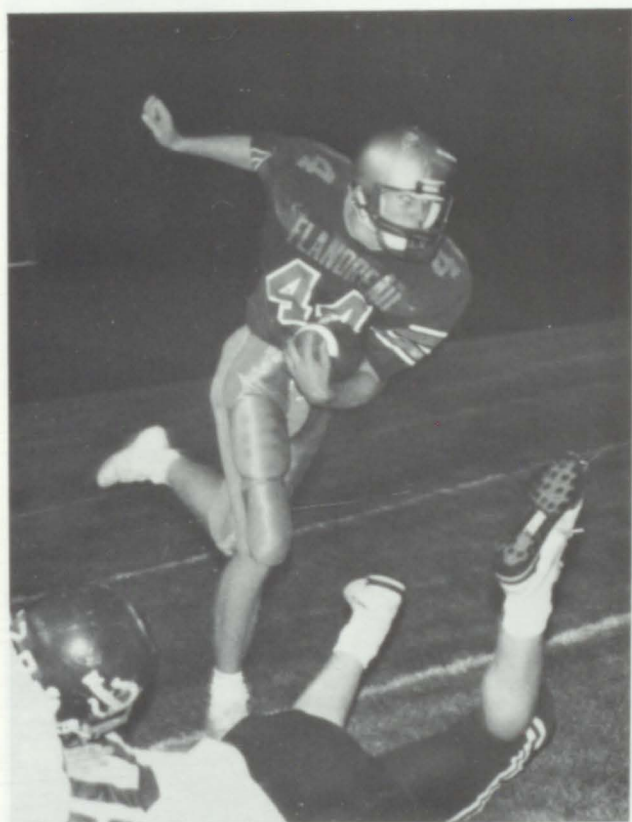

There were 13 weights instead of 12, eliminating the 98 pound class. The new classes are 103,

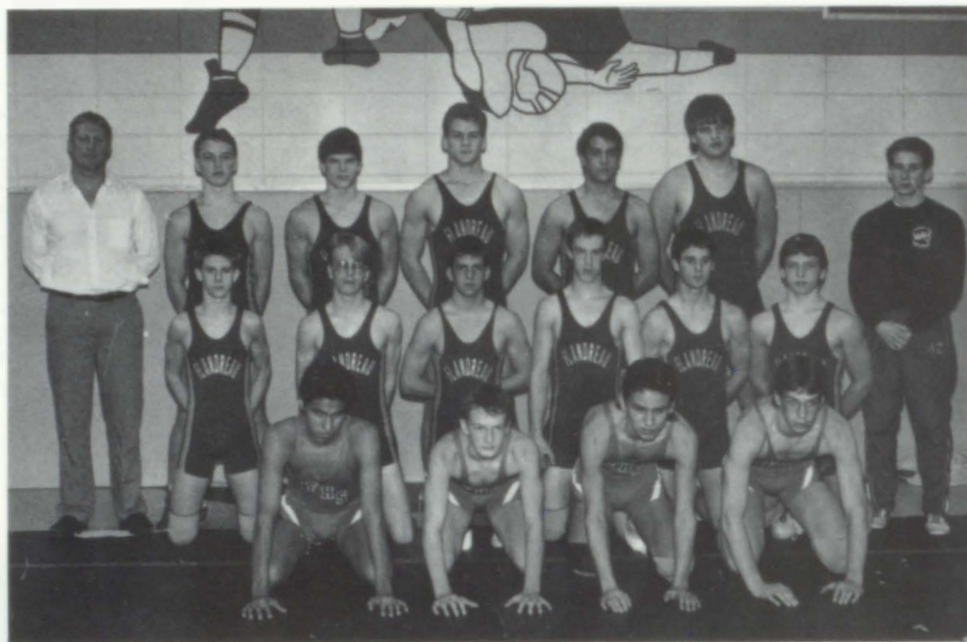
112, 119, 125, 130, 135, 140,

Flandreau hosted the invitational and conference tournaments. The wrestlers also participated in many tournaments during the season. Five members advanced to the

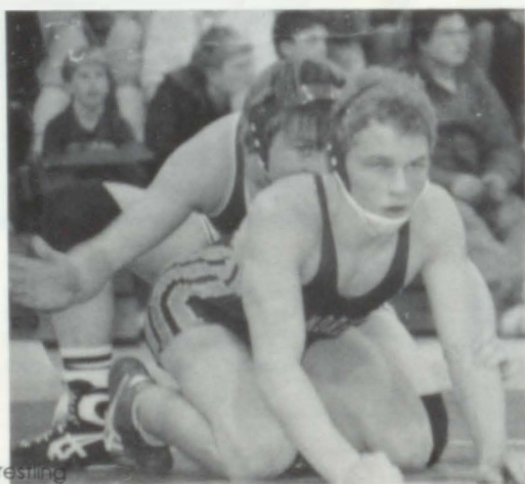
Regions in Dell Rapids-Jarrold Lee, Kevin Krantz, Donny Peters, Rob Delaney and Steve May.

Rob, Jarrod and Steve advanced to State. Rob placed 4th at the State Tournament which was in Sioux Falls.

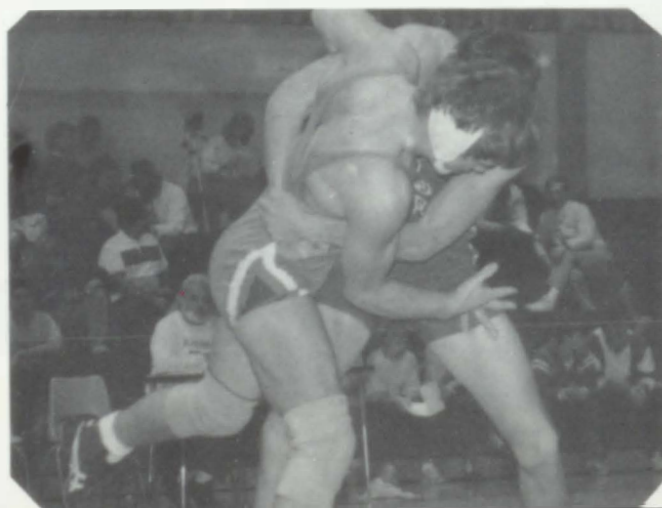


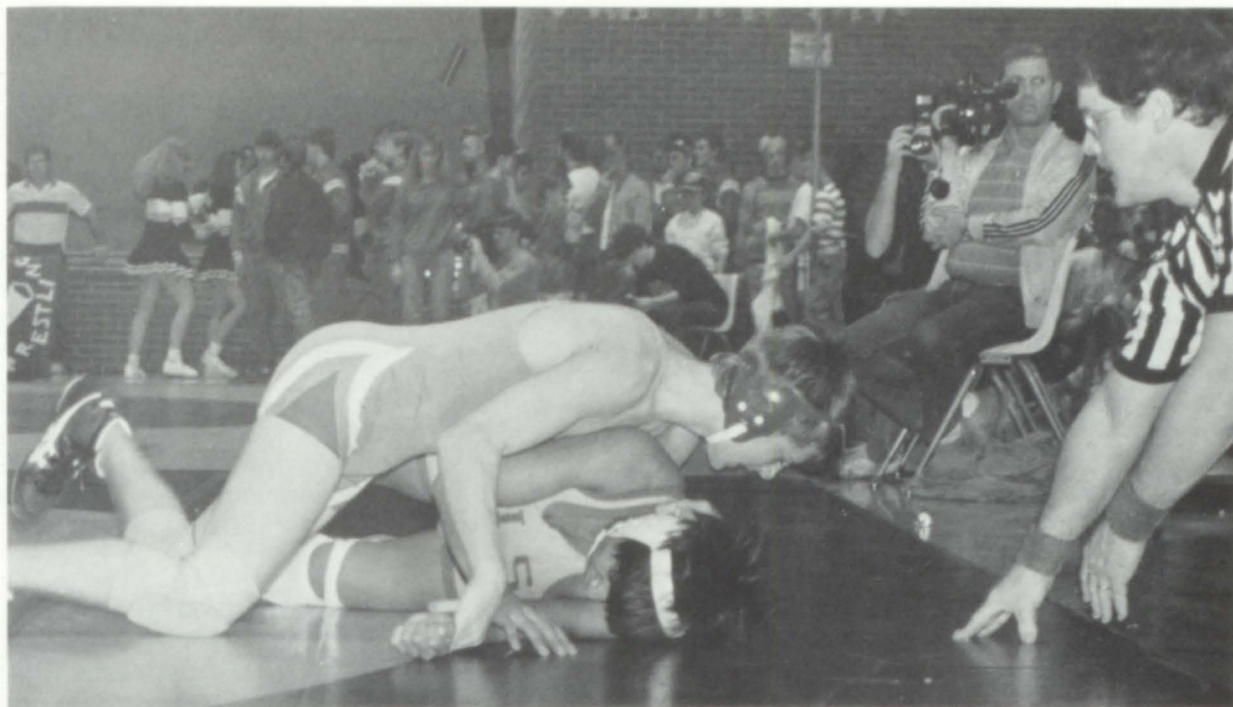

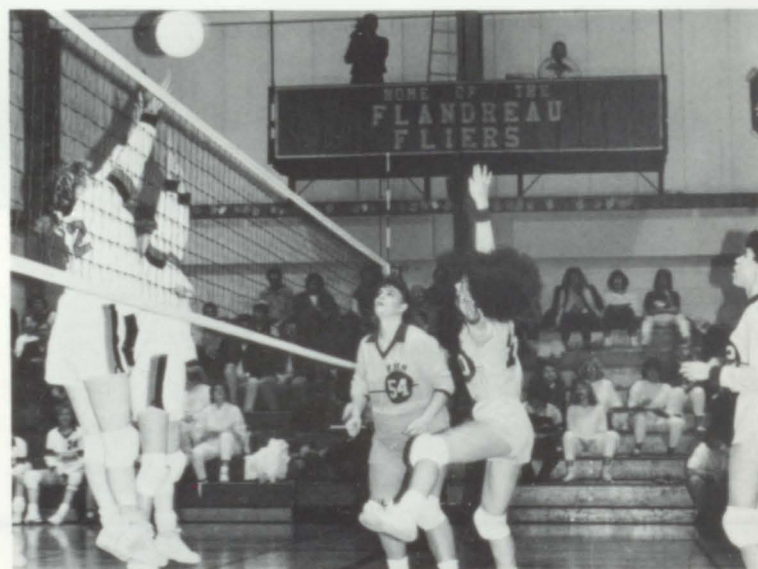

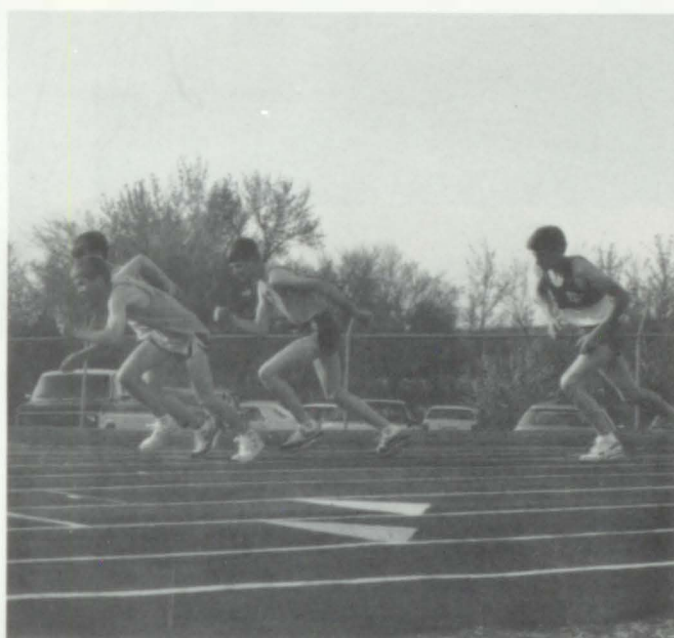


Striding For Success

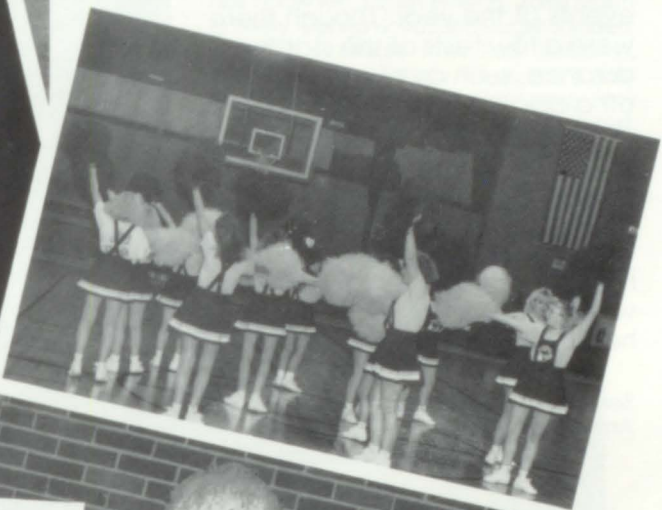

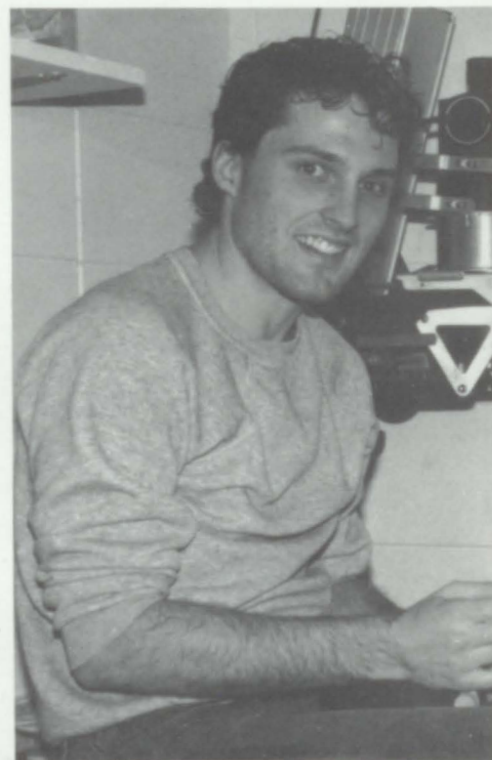

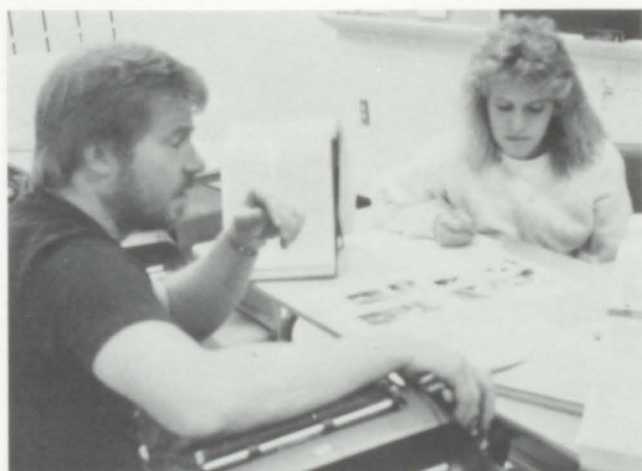

FHS "Co-Pilot" Takes Off

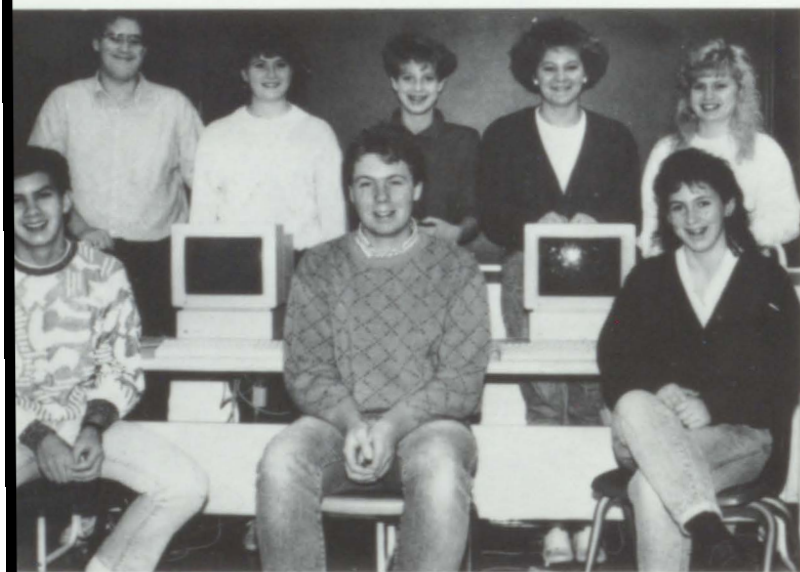

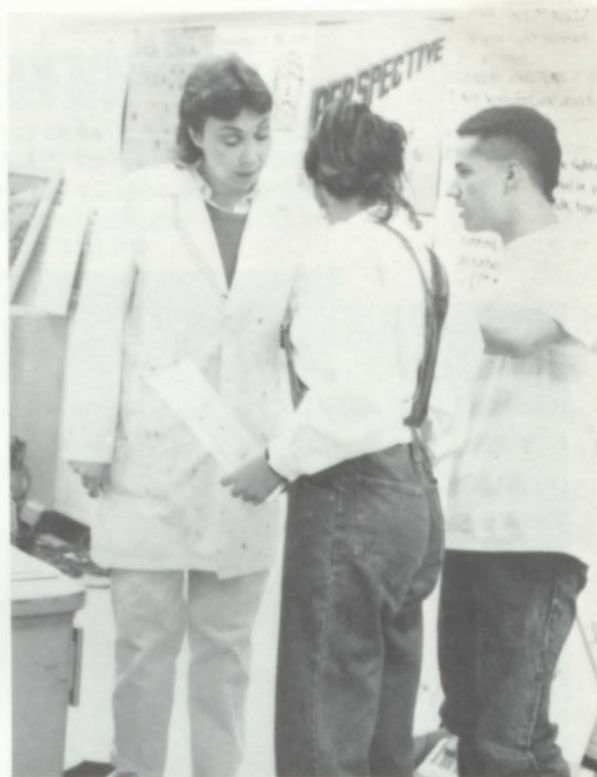

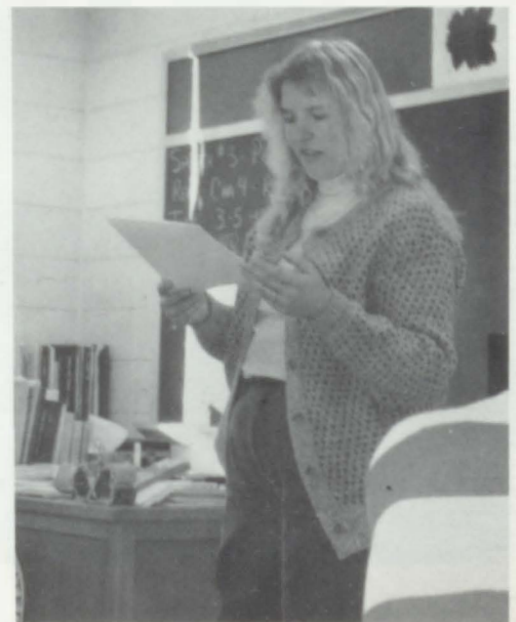

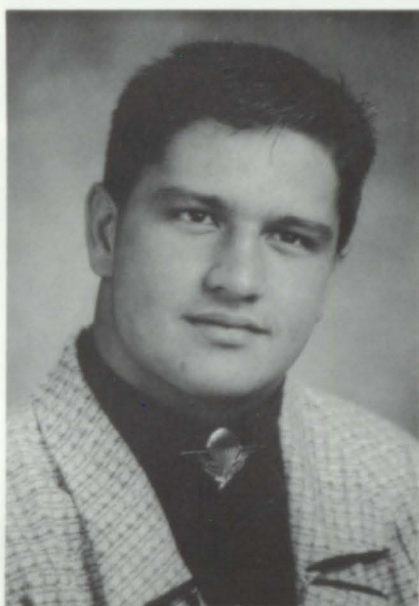
Senior Splash!
