



For not dressing up during the homecoming week, Mr. Rick Weber is being punished by spinning around the bat with his face in a pie.














Below, Paul Welbig, Craig Tjeerdsma and Kevin Reker give music all different kinds of sounds during the band skit.







The girl's team won the All-Nations meet and posted five second place finishes. Both teams qualified for state. The girl's team was led by Bridget Hinricher. She won the region meet and placed third at three meets. Her best time was at Dell Rapids when she ran a 12:38. She placed 11th at the state meet.

Able to boast seven firsts, Danny Cecil had quite a successful season. Coach Randy Weller says, "We had a strong season and I'm proud of the team for the effort."






Slow Start, Strong Finish


Finishing with a 4-5 win, loss record, the Flier football team won three of the six conference games played. In non-conference action, the team had one win in two games. Although the team fell short in many statistics, the boys led in first downs. Travis Schipper led in rushing with 617 yards and Dave Leraas received the ball 21 times for 307 yards. Quarterback Shaw Loiseau threw the ball 132 times for 626 yards with 54 passes completed. On defensive play, Loiseau snared four interceptions. Dave Leraas did the punting and kickoffs. He had a total of 1328 yards in punts and 1274 yards in kickoffs. Leraas was also the kickoff returns leader (13 for 218 yards) and the punt return leader (14 for 103 yards). Craig Tjeerdsma pulled down the most tackles, 61 followed closely by Jon Le-Brun, 56; Dave Leraas, 56 and Jon LeBrun, 55.

Senior Jesse Doyle sums up his high school football career with these words, "It was a great pleasure to play football in Flandreau. There is a lot of great talent coming up and Flandreau is going to be tough."




Challenging Yet Rewarding






On Top Of The Action




Above left, Duane Rice grabs a hold of his opponent and anticipates his next move.









Another long distance runner is Danny Cecil who captured either a first or second at all meets entered. Good job, Danny!




Divots-Dimples-Determination

FHA Has Fun Year!




Two Students Place at Region

This year in One Act, there were three different plays. The first one was "Crossin' the Line." It made its way to Region competition at Au-










Mrs. Karen Thaler's 2nd year at FHS was no less busy than her first. From one-act plays to literature, oral interp, and journalism, she is always busy.

Many graduates gathered in the lunchroom before graduation to say last good byes.






