





Record Ends Even

Football players had an up and down season. They faced a tough conference, but worked it out and came up with an even year. The Fliers finished with a 4-2 conference record. In nonconference action, the team finished 0-2 ending up 4-4 overall. Some positive statistics in 1991 were recorded. Senior Abet Garcia led in pass receiving with 345 yards for an average of 34.5 yards. Quarterback Ryan Johnston passed the ball 126 times, completing 40 passes for a total of 662 yards. Kern Madsen, a foreign exchange student

from Denmark, did the punting and kicking for the team. He punted 25 times for 814 yards and had 27 kickoffs for 1130 yards. On kick off returns. Santee Penney grabbed 8 for 149 yards. Punt returns were done by Scott Hinricher, 8 for 61 and Bisson had 10 for 73. The tackling was done by S. Hinricher getting 79 unassisted tackles. The majority of the scoring was done by S. Hinricher (6 touchdowns) and Garcia (5 touchdowns). Madsen also kicked 1 field goal and 13 extra points.





Season Ends...


The 1991-92 Flier Boys Basketball season ended just short of a chance at a district championship. They ended with a loss against the Madison Bulldogs in the first round of districts. Although the season fell short, they ended it with a winning record of 11 wins and 9 losses. The team was led by four seniors, Jon LeBrun, Abet Garcia. Jesse Nester and Ryan Oswald. LeBrun led the team with 410 points with an average of 21.6 points per game. LeBrun also led in total rebounds with 195. John Porisch, junior, was second high scorer and rebounder with 349 and 144 respectively. Abet Garcia led in steals with 35 and in assists with 104. The team will lose four strong players, but will have several varsity players back next year.








Ryan Johnston tries to break this trap that Elk Point tried to use against the Flier offense.



























FFA-Know Your Dirt




Profits In Carnations




One Act Plays Steal The Show
