

Looking Back On The Year

Election for President of the United States only comes every four years, but they seem to begin at least two years ahead of the day. By the time the names got on the ballot, there were three; Pres. George Bush, republican; Governor of Arkansas, Bill Clinton, Democrat; and Billionaire Ross Perot, Independent. Americans chose Mr. Clinton over the others halting the chance for four more years of Republicans in the White House and ending the Republicans 12 year stretch of control. Mr. Perot kept the race lively with his snappy comments and questions.

At the school, the students and faculty were saddened when one of the cooks, Grace Albers, was killed in a car accident on April 14, 1993.

The "Rodney King Beatings" trial is over, for the time being. The four police officers in Los Angeles who were video taped beating black motorist King, were again on trial — two years afterwards — for the beatings. This time two were found guilty, two acquitted.

The African country of Somalia is threatened with starvation and a civil war. Relief effort was sent by the United Nations and aided by United States Marines.

April 19, 1993 was the day that the plane South Dakota Governor George Mickelson was on, crashed near Dubuque, IA killing all eight passengers on board. The plane appeared to have engine problems or possibly propeller trouble. Lt. Governor, Walter Dale Miller, was sworn in as our 29th Governor the next afternoon. Also with Mickelson were two top state officials in economics and energy, three Sioux Falls businessmen and two state pilots.

Another tragedy that happened earlier the very same day, was the death of 82 members of the religious organization, the Branch Davidians, near Waco, TX. They had been holed up in a compound with their leader, David Koresh, for 51 days. Among those who died were 17 children. The FBI had tried to tear gas the members out from one building to the next, but the organization set fire to the whole compound and reduced it to ashes in just one hour. The all weather track celebrated 20 years of use and Flandreau played host to the prelims to the State A Track meet on May 28 and 29.




Saying Goodbye Is Hard To Do




One More Step To Climb





Two Down . . . Two To Go













Cool Fall Keeps Scores Cool

After a 14-0 opening day victory before their own home crowd, the Fliers expected more than a 1-6 season. But after a 7-6 loss to Canton, the Fliers candle burnt out. From there they suffered a slump in which they were held scoreless for nine straight quarters over a period of three games. In the individual statistics Shane Bisson led with 19 pass receivings for 364 yards and led in kickoff returns with a total of 11 for 90 yards. Ryan Johnston passed the ball 163 times, completing 59 passes for a total of 772 yards. John Porisch punted 27 times for 796 yards and he had a total of 47 tackles. Duane Rice pulled down the most tackles with 50. Bisson grabbed 3 interceptions and Rob DeClerk led in rushing with 103 yards.
















Boys Take Second In State








Actors Give Message











Graduation Day ...






