









McGlone ends his career here at 152-126-2. "I will miss coaching but there comes a time and place in everyone's life when they have to give up something very dear to them," said Tiger.










Other than Headrick, five wrestlers advanced from Districts to Regions.





The year ended with a disappointing losses to Madison and Sioux Valley in District 4A play.









Burshiem captured the play-off hole while Jewett finished third.












English III was combined with American History for projects while



# Something useful









## From 1967 to 1998.


After 34 years of coaching, 31 of which were at his alma mater FHS, Mr. Jim "Tiger" McGlone decided to throw in the towel.

As a high school football player at Flandreau, Tiger played offensive center and defensive linebacker for four years. In 1957, he left Flandreau as a graduating senior and went on to graduate from Northern State in 1962.

This brought him to his first coaching job at Plankinton where he was for two seasons before moving on to Elk Point for one year. Soon, he was drawn home by the royal purple and old gold colors to become head football coach. His passion for those colors kept him here for 31 years. He finished with a record of 152-126-2.

While here, he coached over 1,500 football players. He also spent 15 of his earlier years as the wrestling coach and then his final 15 years as the golf coach. The road to the state football championship game only took one of Tiger's teams there as they took second in 1987. A final tribute to him was the 1998 boys golf team winning the State B championship in May.



## A well-travelled road . . .


Many memories and friends are made and kept throughout the four years of travelling on the High School road.


