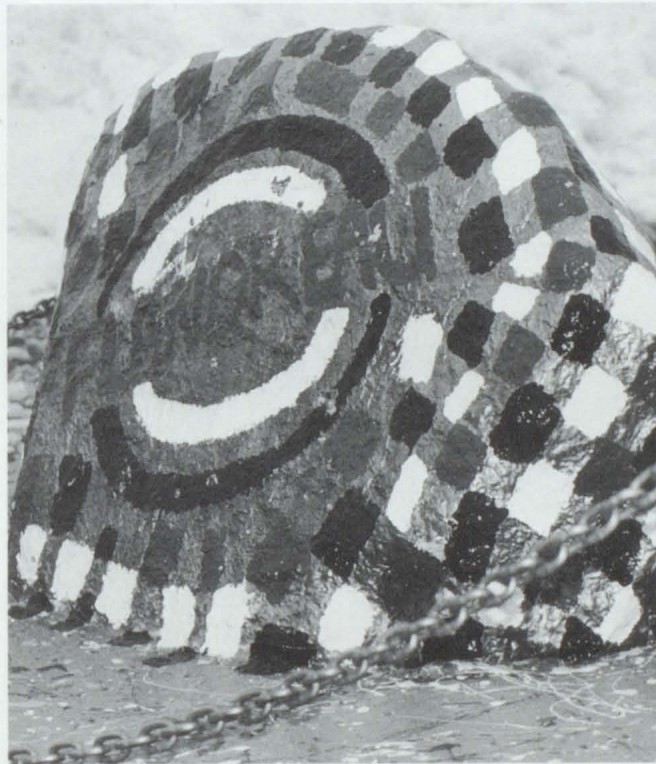

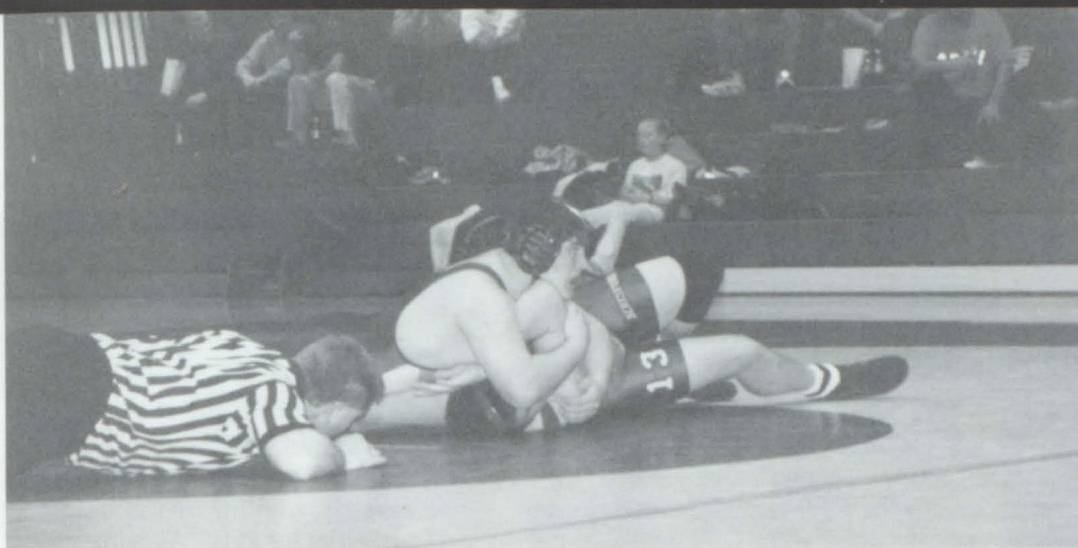

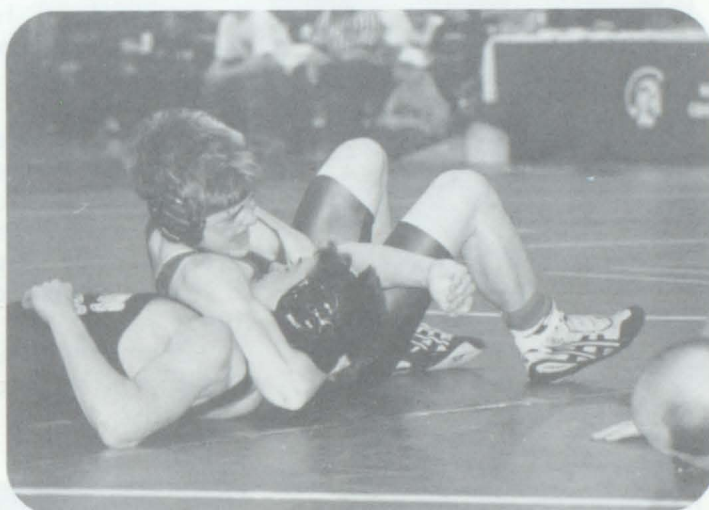

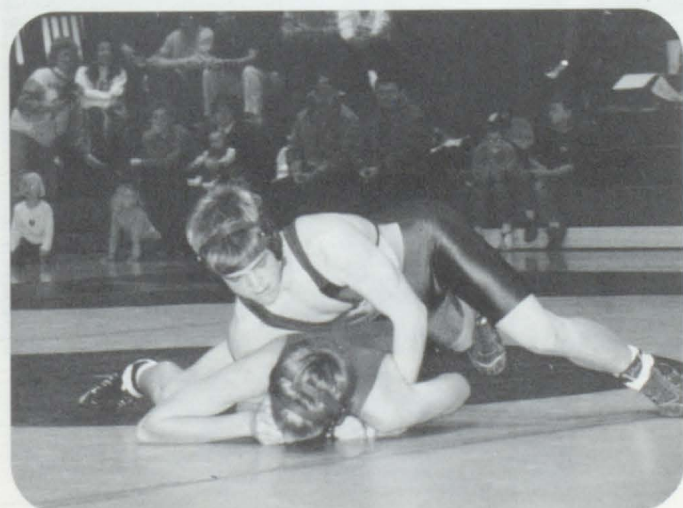

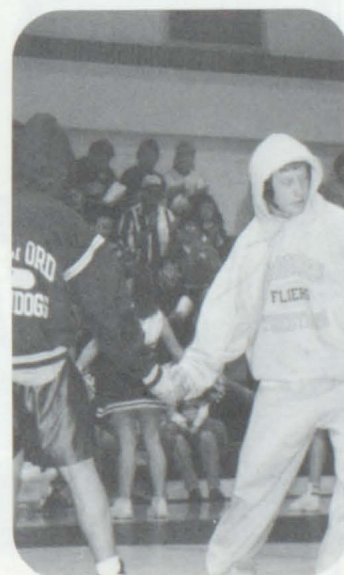

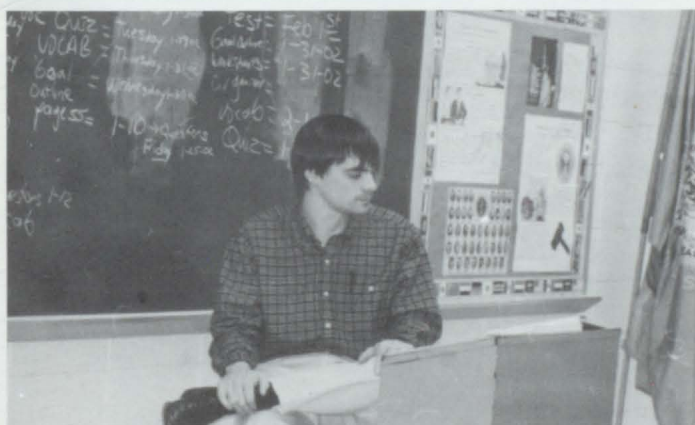

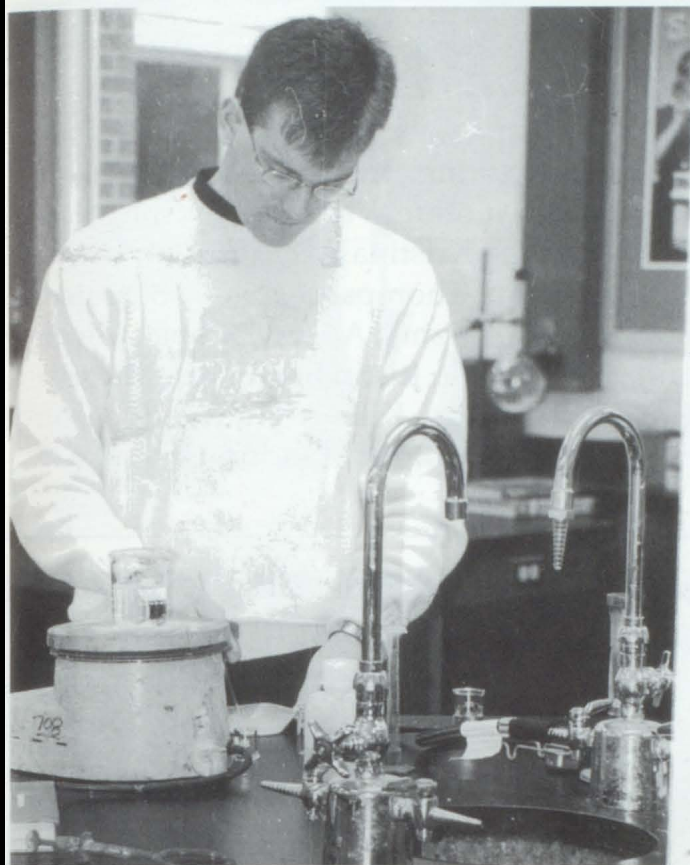

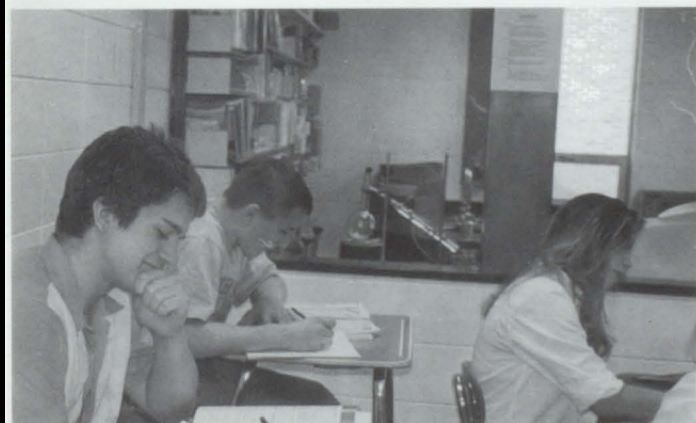

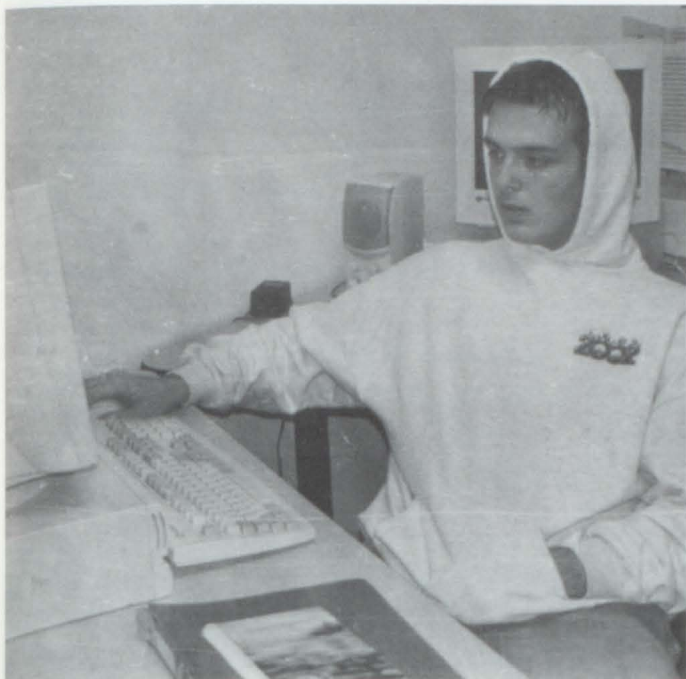

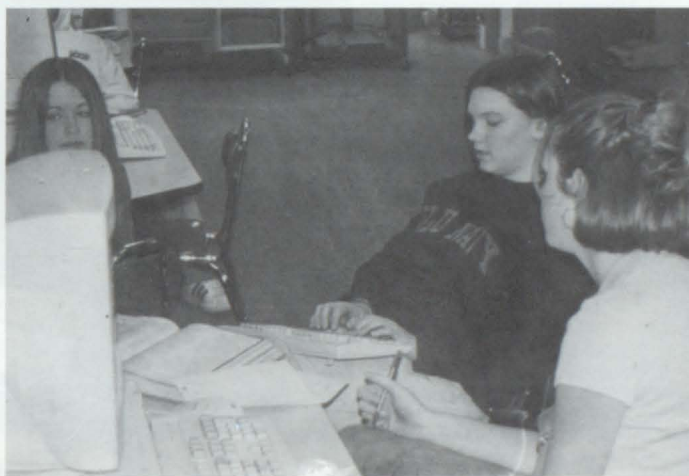

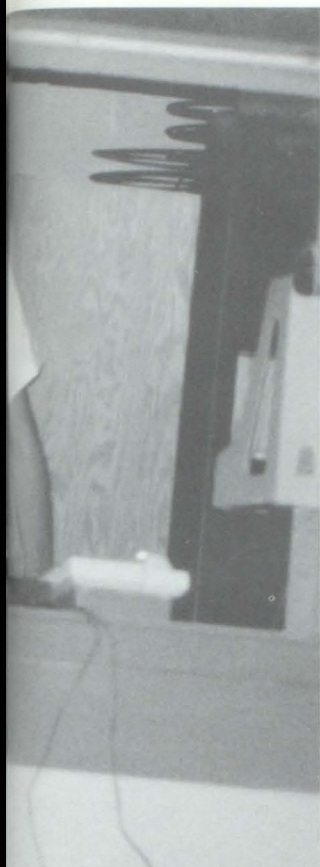

Captains Benjamin Franklin Pierce (Max Schuchard) and Duke Forest (Darin Dahlmeier) ruffle a few feathers with their unconventional ideas and methods. The play also has many other intertwining plot lines ranging from dead cats in footballers to suicidal dentists. The comic high point came from "The Bonwit Sisters" (Alison Ramsdell, Nicole Smith, and Miriam Warner) in a "tap dance" routine. The hard work from the actors and the stage crew payed off when final performances were completed. Whether the audience was watching the cast escape Death or patch up injured Koreans, there was always entertainment to be found.

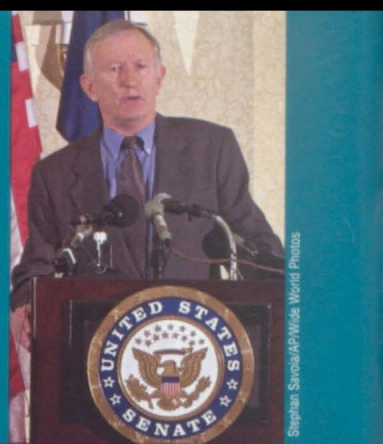

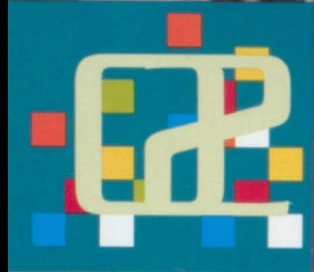

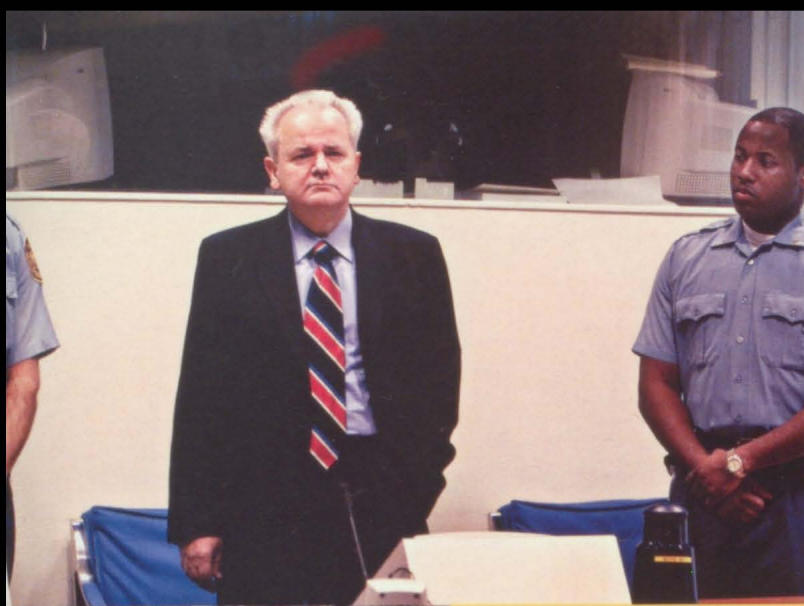

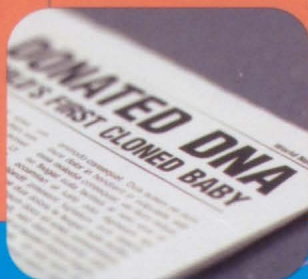

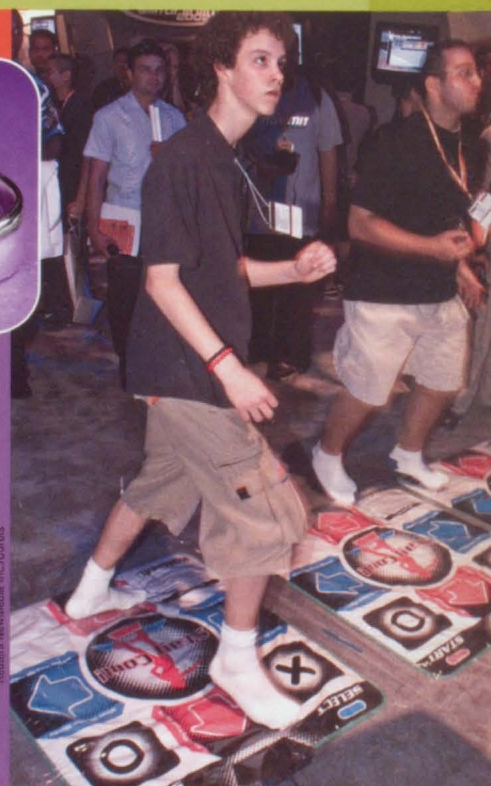

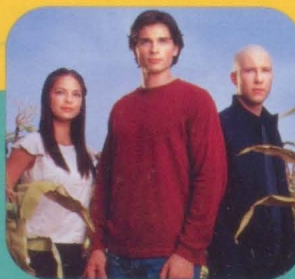

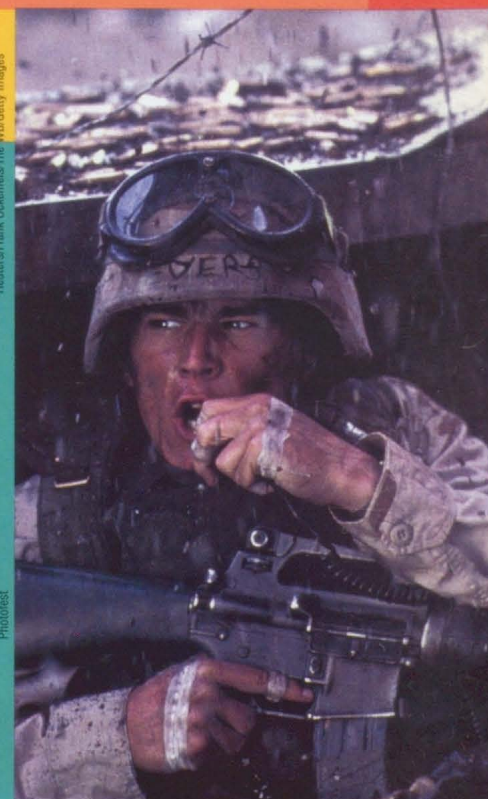

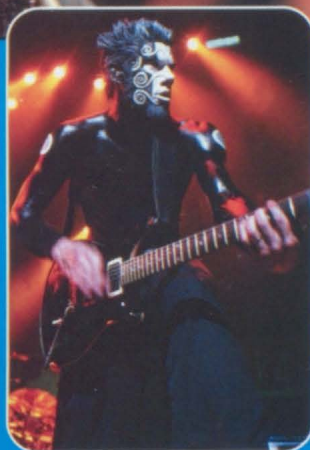

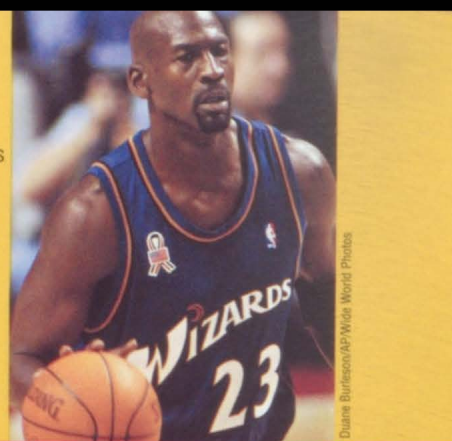

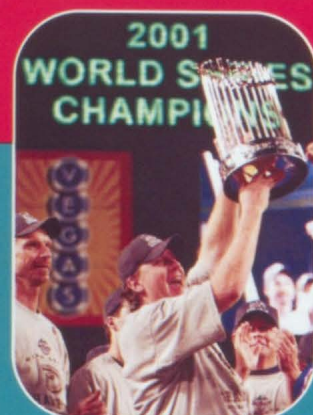

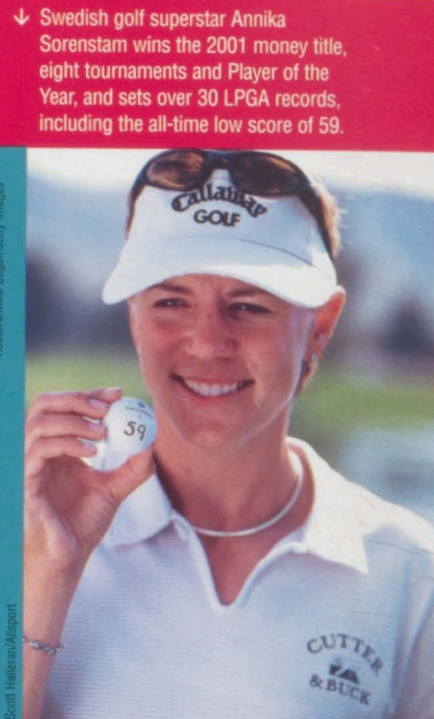

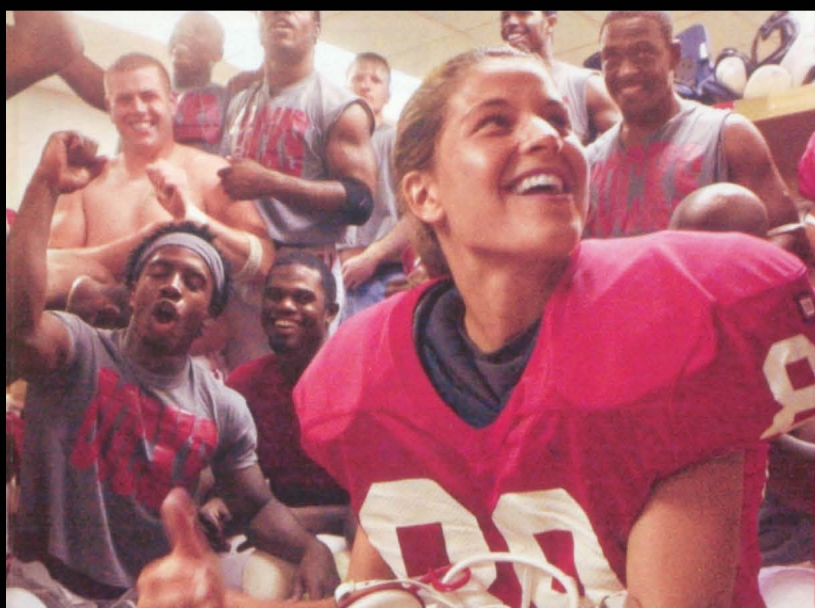
