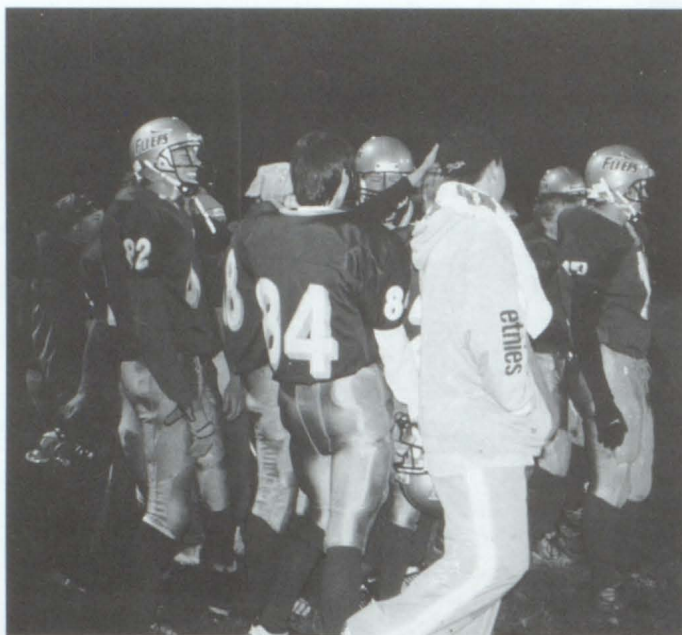

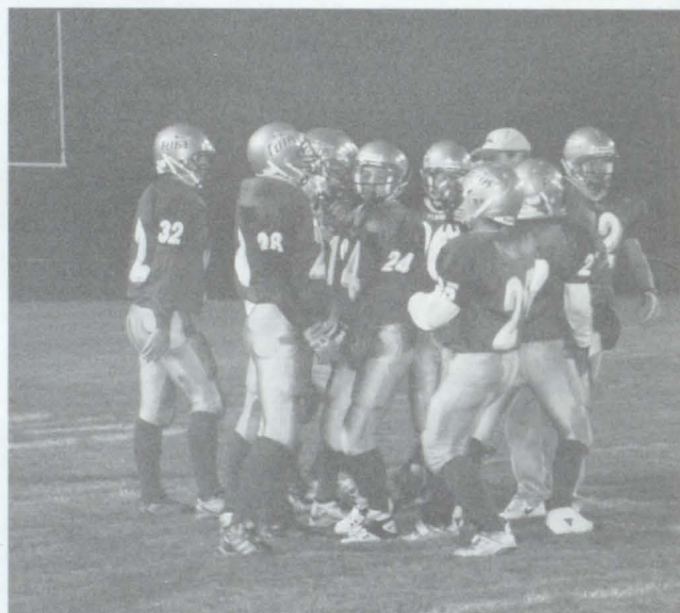

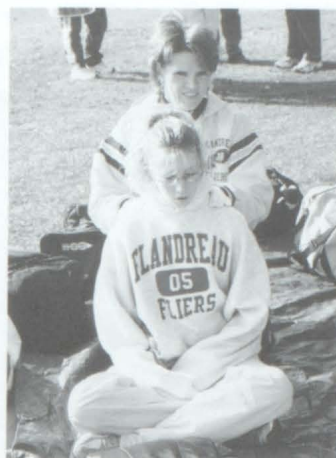

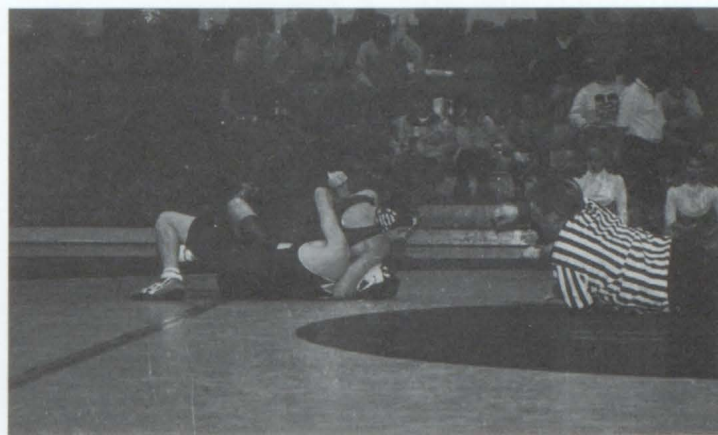

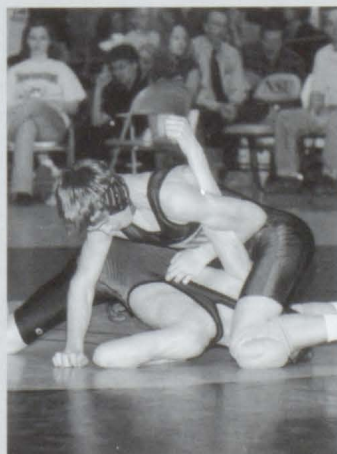

wrestling squad couldn't have asked for a much better season with great coaches, super fan support, and talented wrestlers.

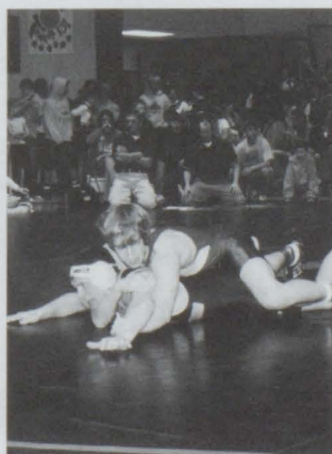

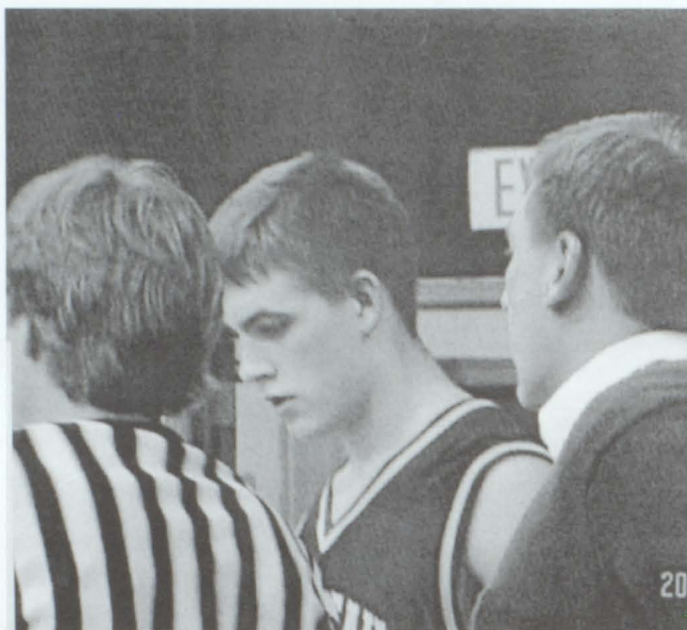

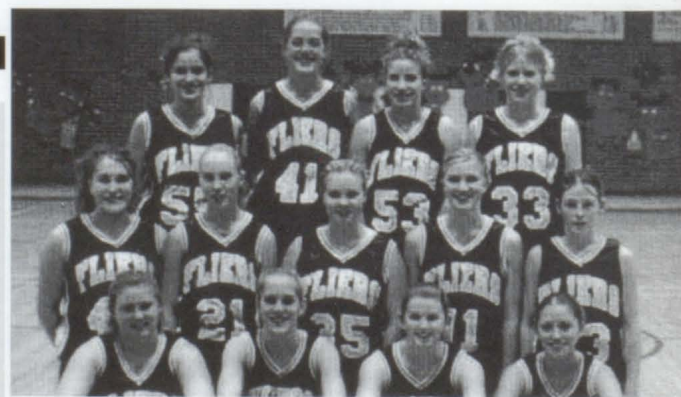

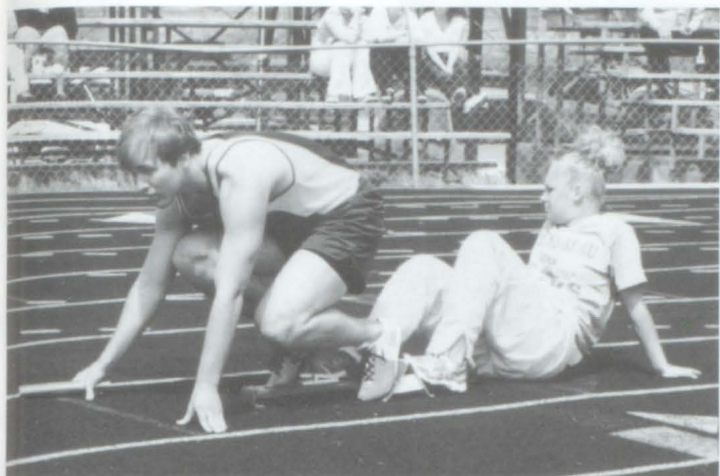

right on target, but our very own "MAC" wasn't.

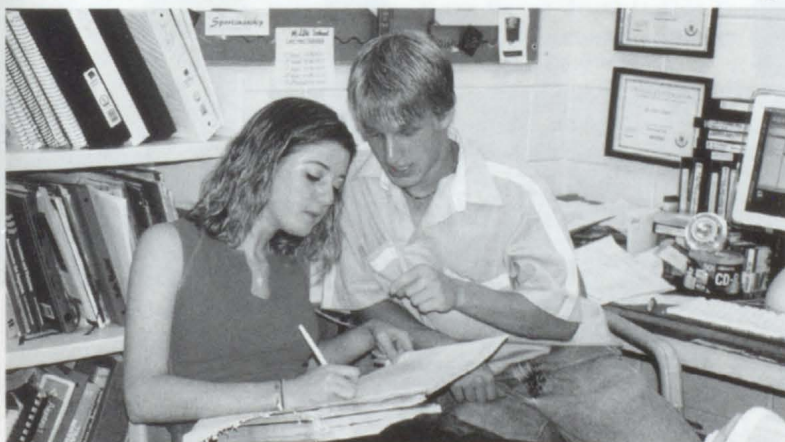

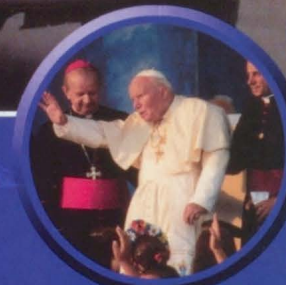

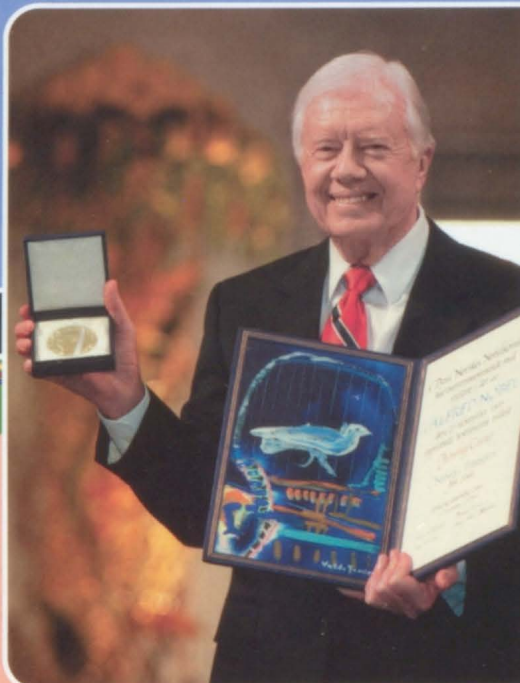

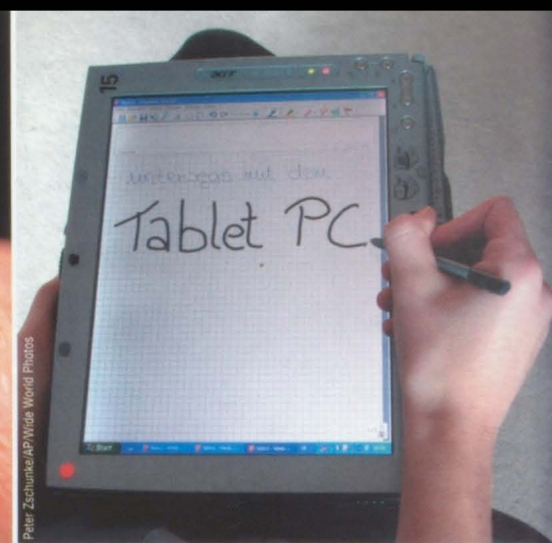

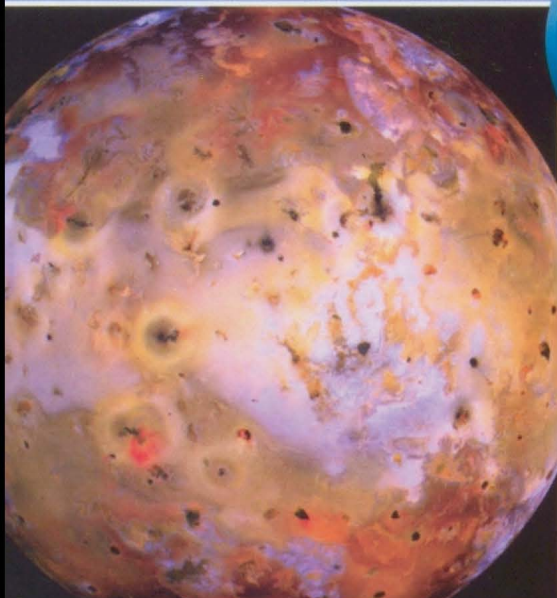

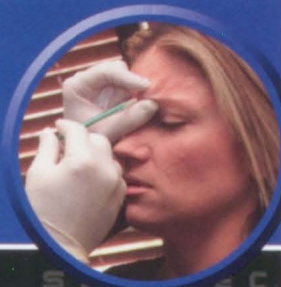

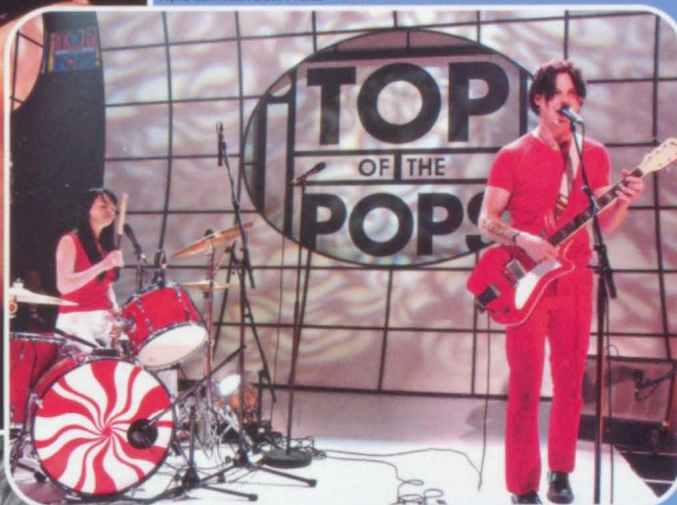

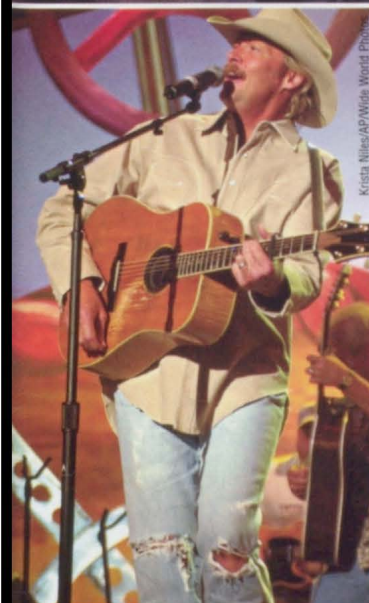

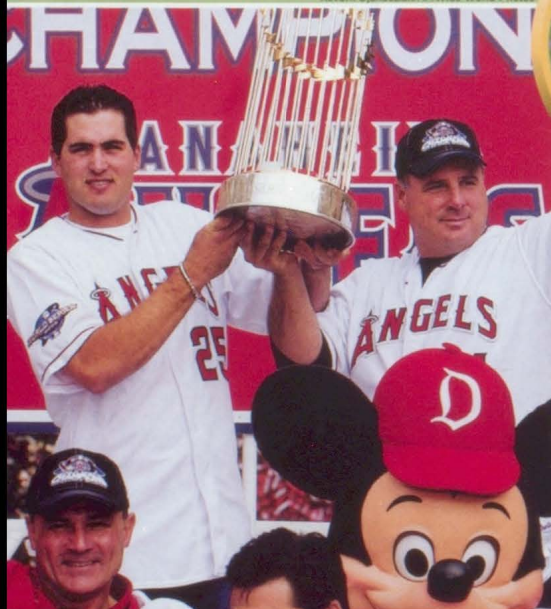
