





Some changes took place this year for Flier Speech and Drama. Jeremy Haugen was the new Oral Interp and One-Act Play advisor, Mary Beth Sutton and Ben Barondeau were two additional All-School Play directors, and this year three seniors (Josh Barse, Melissa Heinemann, and Sarah Keating) wrote and directed a very successful One-Act Play.

Oral Interpretation had a very successful year. Not only did the Reader's Theatre group earn a state superior rating, two other Oral Interpretators were selected as individual alternates. Everybody on the team had a noteworthy year.

Both of the One-Act Plays (A Cold Day in Hell and Southern Hospitality) turned out to be well acted comedies with Southern Hospitality receiving a state superior rating. It took six of the thirteen individual awards at Regions and six actors (Nicole Smith Owen Parsley, Zac Lacey, Shenoa Quick, Sarah Keating, and Aaron Lacey) received Outstanding State Performer awards.

The All-School Play was a reproduction of the musical *Guys N' Dolls*. It involved well over sixty Flandreau Flier students to produce and
































