




he Fliers' season was filled with mixed









As the night went on and I finally was able to be alone with my thoughts, I started to realize that the letdown resulted from a fear that all that hard work and energy would go to waste on some college degree that I might not have really wanted to have pursued. It wasn't enough to use the knowledge I had gained on academics, but to make these past 13 years truly worthy, it would be necessary to use all that knowledge in all that I do in my life. Becoming a nuclear physicist would no doubt prove to people the hard worker I was, but to use all my knowledge would require me to use my compassion for others, my sense of responsibility, my understanding of flow and rhythm, and even my ability to think comprehensively. Such use of wisdom and knowledge serves society in such a way that waste and disappointment could never be. I hope that you all, my fellow classmates, will also discover the worthiness of these past 13 years. It is sad to leave, but it will be great to finally use all that we have learned to make this world a little better. "Know that although in the eternal scheme of things you are small, you are also unique and irreplaceable, as are all your fellow humans everywhere in the world." - Kaylen James, Editor






