Dr. Margo Heinert has only been our principal for one year and she has already made so many positive changes for our school. She really looks out for her students and wants the best for them. "This has been a wonderful experience for me and my only hope is that the students and staff have received as much support and guidance from me as they have given me," said Dr. Heinert.

Our principal has pushed to get block scheduling set in place, however it won't be implemented next year, but possbily sometime in the future. "The reason I like it is because it gives more time in the day for students to work a particular class so more labs or hands-on activities can be provided. The classes are 85-90 minutes long and students only take four per semester. This gives students fewer classes to work on throughout the semester so they can spend more time studying those four classes and hopefully do better. The next semester they take four more classes so students get eight credits per year and can graduate with 32 credits—which many of them could be dual credit classes and can go towards their college coursework. Block scheduling also allows for in-class time to work on an assignment and allows students to finish a course in one semester which sometimes relieves some of the boredom of having the same class all year long, so hopefully it will keep students more interested," said Dr. Heinert.

Another change she wanted to see was having the school offer more elective courses. Dr. Heinert spoke with the teachers and found out other topics they would like to teach. There are over ten new elective courses being offered for next school year. "In talking with some of students, they seemed to be interested in new courses so I hope they'll take advantage of it," said Dr. Heinert.

As her year comes to a close, she is excited for the seniors to graduate! "I'm looking forward to graduation and am grateful for being such a small part of these students' lives as they approach this milestone," said Dr. Heinert. "I have thoroughly enjoyed this entire year: one of the best in my 44 years as an educator. I have been extremely impressed with the students here: their kindness, great senses of humor, and willingness to be good students."


Senior Xavier Pavlis has been in band since the fifth grade. "I joined band because I wanted to express my creativity through sound," said Xavier.





She gets about 10 feet from the goat and rushes off the left side of the horse. She runs as fast as possible to the goat, picks it up and puts it on its side. She grabs the legs of the goat, ties them together with the string and puts her hands in the air when she's finished. And that's just another day in rodeo.

Jaycie Pulscher has been doing rodeo since she was 13 years old. Her father got her into rodeo after her younger brother joined. There are a lot of different parents who help out all year long.

Parents help organize the High School Rodeo that is held here in town and help their own kid improve. A parent who has helped Jaycie out a lot is Kelly Kontz. "Kelly Kontz helps me personally with goat tying. She helps me with my positioning when I get off my horse and the positioning of my legs when I flank the goat," said Jaycie. Practice is essential to compete in the four different rodeos of the season. Jaycie, as well as the other rodeo team members, practice on their own time. In the winter, she comes to town to practice, but she also has an

All the rodeo team members are required to pay a \$20 membership fee at the beginning of the season, as well as fees to compete in each event. However, they can also win money at each rodeo depending on how many competitors there are.

However, for Jaycie, money is never the ultimate goal. "The toughest thing for me would be knowing that I have a lot of pressure on me to do well so I can reach my goal, which is to make it to State High School Rodeo. Competing in rodeo is the most challenging thing when the best goat tiers or ropers have gotten bad time and you have a lot of pressure on yourself to do really well so you can end up placing in the top four to make it to State," said Jaycie.

















"Be an athlete!"








"We had many changes coming into the 2016 volleyball season. We had coaching changes, position changes, as well as defensive and offensive changes. With these changes came new roles for everyone.




"As a new coach, I came in with unknown expectations of what could come out of the season. As the JV and C team coach, my expectations were MORE then exceeded. Our girls worked really hard




900 line ups. 900 deep breaths. 900 swings. 900 chances at greatness and that coveted hole-in-one shot.




they have high spirits. The people in theatre all share the same emotions, especially on performance night when we can't shake the nerves out," said Tomi.
