



How elective academics provide new opportunities for everyone.





The 2017 Rodeo Team posed together outside the corral to kick off another season.




Life isn't always about horses, ropes, and rodeos, but it should be.



Imagine arguments, laughter, stress, anxiety, growth and happiness all in one class. "When a person is in band, they are part of a group that can travel through eight years of school together. During that time, so many memories are made that concern that group of people, that too is like a second family. By the time a aroup of band students are seniors, they will hopefully look back on [it] fondly. These memories bond them together, like a musical family that has grown up together," said director Patrick Weight. Even though the memories are very fond in the moment, the person telling the story makes it even better. "One of my favorite moments was getting everyone's reaction when they found out that we had taken first place!" said Mr. Weight referring to the DSU parade. But senior Josh Henderson remembers things a bit differently. He fondly remembers, "when Andrew and I stole the snare drum and bass drums at Hobo Days," said Josh. 












New beginnings can't come without some goodbyes.
