Gender Identity


Gender identity reflects one's innermost concept of self as male, female, both, or neither; in essence, the term describes how one perceives and refers to oneself.

One's gender identity is selfassigned and need not match the sex assigned at birth.



Gender Expression

Gender expression describes the ways in which people externally communicate their gender identity to others through behavior, clothing, haircut, voice, and other forms of presentation.



Gender Expansive

Gender expansive is an umbrella term used for individuals that broaden commonly held definitions of gender. These individuals blur the lines between the stereotypical male and female categories and move beyond the binary definition of gender.

Transgender Individuals

A Transgender Male was assigned the female sex at birth but identifies and lives as male. This does not depend on anatomy.


A Transgender Female was assigned the male sex at birth but identifies and lives as female. This does not depend on anatomy.




Gender Expansive and Non-Binary

Non-binary, gender expansive individuals identify as neither exclusively male nor exclusively female.

Some terms you may have heard: genderqueer, gender non-conforming, agender, demiboy, demigirl

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The Gender Audit and Stereotype Threat

Stereotype Threat: when people are or feel at risk of conforming to stereotypes about their identity, their performance suffers





The Gender Audit and Stereotype Threat

Four Preconditions for Stereotype Threat

The task is difficult	The actor believes that others believe the stereotype
The actor cares about and believes they're good at the task	The identity the stereotype is about is made salient



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The Gender Audit and Cisgender Students

- Reducing the saliency of gender on campus helps everyone!
- Many feel uncomfortable in gendered spaces for a variety of reasons
- Many benefit from increased privacy



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Student Life

- <u>Dress Code</u>: everyday, special events, sports teams, musical ensembles
- <u>Student Organizations</u>: sports teams, affinity groups, musical ensembles, dorms, "gender balance"
- Off-Campus Programs: hotel stays, home stays, travel to states and countries with little acceptance



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Facilities

- <u>Bathrooms</u>: single user restrooms; enhanced privacy in multi-user spaces
- Locker rooms: enhanced privacy
- <u>Dormitories</u>: housing students; visitation policies
