MESSAGE TO GRADUATES GIVEN AT COMMENCEMENT 2008

Each graduate you see before you has completed a prescribed curriculum, which has placed him or her as a candidate for graduation. The modern word *curriculum* has its roots in, of course, Latin and means the action of running, a course of action, or a race—usually in a chariot. So, when the Apostle Paul admonishes us in the Book of Hebrews to "lay aside every encumbrance and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of faith," he is alluding to more than a mere physical contest. His image is a metaphor for life. Each graduate before you today reflects that image. Each has persevered through twelve plus years of academic, athletic, artistic, and social curriculum to arrive on stage this afternoon.

As a former English teacher, I used to end each class with the following question: "So what?" This is often the most difficult question for students and for each of us to answer. It is in this simple question, though, that we find the depths of Truth revealed and we begin to see education as more than a practical exercise.

So, graduates, I ask you, "So what?" You have spent the better part of your waking lives to this point in classrooms, and we are about to hand you a piece of paper which will allow you to matriculate from The Bear Creek School into college and life.

So what? You've learned how to solve for "x," you memorized Sonnet 18, you relived the Battle of Hastings, and you learned never to lick the spoon after a chemistry lab. You've made friends, won titles, acted in plays, and spent late nights talking on the phone while cramming for tests.

So what? You completed your senior projects, scored well on your APs, sent transcripts around the country, took your last Upper School final, and received awards and accolades. But what does it all mean?

Last night at An Evening of Honors, Michael Hester mentioned a quote by John F. Kennedy which begins to answer the question. It reads, "As we express our gratitude, we must never forget that the highest appreciation is not to utter words, but to live by them." Graduates, as your parents, your teachers, and I can attest, living

by words is harder than learning them. Christ told his disciples to live by a simple phrase which has proven to be the most difficult commandment in human history, "Be holy as I am holy."

So, I am afraid, in the end, the Christian classical education you have received at The Bear Creek School was never intended to be an end in itself, even as this ceremony is not called a finale, but a commencement. It is a means to a greater end. Aristotle believed the purpose of reason was to produce virtue, Plato thought education produced a "well-ordered soul," and St. Paul challenged the Roman church to "be transformed by the renewing of the mind." Similarly, John Milton wrote, "The end then of learning is to repair the ruins of our first parents by regaining to know God aright, and out of that knowledge to love Him, to imitate Him, to be like Him, as we may the nearest by possessing our souls of true virtue, which being united to the heavenly grace of faith makes up the highest perfection."

So the answer to "So what?" is, after all, what you might have expected. The race you have just completed was intended to change not only **what you know;** it was intended to **transform who you are.** The goal of all this learning was to guide you on your journey to becoming the individual God intends and to prepare you to make a contribution in the world, no matter how great or how small, by inclining your desires to love Truth, to create beauty and to demonstrate goodness to a watching world.

As we say farewell to the Class of 2008, we do not say goodbye, but welcome. Welcome to the beginning of a new race, a new course, a new curriculum through which the Lord will teach you an appreciation of the good life – a life well lived by glorifying God and enjoying Him forever.



GRADUATION HONORS

WASHINGTON STATE HONORS AWARD

Each year, the state of Washington recognizes the top 10% of graduating seniors statewide with the Washington State Honors Award. Thirty-one Bear Creek seniors (60% of the class) received this recognition. Bear Creek's high representation in this honor is a testament to the hard work of our students, the incredible quality of our teachers, and the dedication and support of families to the learning endeavor.

COMCAST LEADERS AND ACHIEVERS AWARD

The Comcast Leaders and Achievers Award is an honor and financial scholarship given to students who exemplify academic success and engagement in their communities. The highly competitive award is open to all students who choose to pursue it, and Bear Creek is happy to support the application of any student who does so. We had one student approach us this year about supporting his application for this scholarship—not surprisingly to us, he was one of the winners selected by Comcast.

To those students who visit the library or the front desk, it should come as no surprise that Comcast saw **Jesse Wetter** as "involved in his community."

NCAA DIVISION I SCHOLARSHIPS

The athletic program at Bear Creek gives students the opportunity to develop character, allows us to share our mission with other schools and the local community, and gives our institution unrivaled media exposure. The entire athletic program has enjoyed a two-year run of state appearances and championships, as well as dozens of league and district level accomplishments, while being stocked full of athletes from the Class of 2008.

Two students are going on to compete at the "major conference" level of NCAA Division I as full scholarship athletes. **Cara Linnenkohl** and **Kimi Pohlman**, both of whom lent their remarkable talents to the Bear Creek athletic program, are moving on to test themselves at a new level of competition. Cara will spend the next four years rowing for the University of Virginia. Kimi will jump across the lake to play softball for the University of Washington.

NATIONAL MERIT SCHOLARSHIP COMPETITION

Perhaps no single large award program is more recognizable and prestigious than the National Merit Scholarship competition. Certainly, no other award program causes as much stress and consternation among Bear Creek's competitive population. Based on PSAT scores from a test taken in the fall of the junior year, the National Merit Scholarship competition takes the top 3% of test takers and begins a competitive process that ends with a very small number – fewer than 1% nationally – of participants being named as Finalists.

The Class of 2008 continued a tradition at the Bear Creek School – to take well over our "share" of National Merit Awards.



AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE

WHY GIVE AWARDS?

Why give awards? Isn't it elitist and undemocratic? Don't we run the risk of simply inflating the egos of the recipients while at the same time making those who don't receive awards feel inferior? Well, the purpose of giving awards is not to create some form of two tier society within school-the haves and the have nots. We give awards for three good reasons: Firstly, the recognition of good work is endorsed in the Scriptures, from the writings of Solomon (Proverbs 14:23), to those of Paul (Ephesians 4:28, I Timothy 5:18 for example), both of whom make the connection between hard work and reward. In other words, there's a Biblical model for why we do what we do.

Secondly, we hope to encourage and motivate good work among all students by demonstrating that such work is not overlooked or taken for granted. At Bear Creek, we hold the bar high and we recognize those who have achieved at the highest level as a way of inspiring all the

students to be the best they can be.

Thirdly, and perhaps most importantly, we hope to draw attention to the high quality of our students' work and character, to the glory of God and to the honor of their parents. In this sense, the award also recognizes the devoted mother and father who have invested time, energy, love and, yes, finances, into the upbringing of their child. When we give awards, we are acknowledging the important role of the parents (and other mentor figures, including teachers, of course) in shaping the lives of the students.

Above all, though, we are honoring God, our Creator. Scripture reminds us that whatever we do, we should do for the glory of God (1 Corinthians 10:31). He has made us and endowed us with talent and I believe He is most pleased and glorified when we take that talent and use it to the fullest. Eric Liddell (Olympic athlete and missionary whose story was told in the movie *Chariots of Fire*) is quoted as saying, "I believe God made me for a purpose - for China. But He also made me fast! And when I run, I feel His pleasure. To give that up would be to hold Him in contempt; to win is to honor Him."

The Augustine Award recognizes a sophomore who displays outstanding rhetorical skills for Christ and His Kingdom.

Fearful of the popularity of rhetoric amongst Greeks and Romans, several Church fathers during the fourth century labeled rhetoric a pagan art. In contrast, Augustine adamantly argued against this in Book IV of On Christian Doctrine stating, "For since through the art of rhetoric both truth and falsehood are pleaded, who would be so bold as to say that against falsehood, truth as regards to its own defenders ought to stand unarmed." Augustine's beliefs are confirmed throughout the Scriptures and specifically in 1 Peter 3:15a, "But in your hearts set apart Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone

who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have."

It is in this spirit that the Bear Creek faculty recognizes a student who seeks to be armed with a ready defense for the Gospel and the interpretation of the Scriptures. The recipient should demonstrate the ability to integrate a Christian perspective across disciplines and to advocate his or her Christian thinking in a persuasive and appropriate manner. The recipient of the Augustine Award should be both a firm and fiery orator who is a soldier for Christ, and also possess a gentle, calm, discerning spirit of peace.

LOWER SCHOOL HONORS

ACCELERATED READER

At the close of each academic year, The Bear Creek School Libraries acknowledge Lower School students for their participation in the Accelerated Reader (AR) program during the school year. AR points are awarded to students after they have taken a test that validates their understanding of the content of the book they have read. Students in Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd grades receive a certificate for earning at least 10 AR points. Students in 3rd and 4th grades receive a certificate for earning at least 25 points, and students in 5th and 6th grades receive a certificate for earning at least 50 AR points. Each year, we mention an amazing AR statistic...the total number of words read by our Lower School K-6 students. This year's total is 243,654,619!

All students who reach 300 points or more, receive the honor of belonging to the 300, 400, or 500+ Point Club. Each student in these clubs receives a book donated in their name to The Bear Creek School Libraries. All students who reach the 500+ Point Club level, also have their name engraved on our AR 500+ Club Perpetual Plaque. This plaque is on alternate display in the Valley Campus Library and the Ida Lairson Library throughout the school year.

Each year, one graduating 6th grade student is awarded a special "Lamp of Knowledge" award. It is given to the 6th grader who earned the greatest number of cumulative AR points during his or her years at Bear Creek. This year's award went to Megan McRae, who earned 1,873.2 points in her years at Bear Creek.

SUPER SLEUTH

Super Sleuth is a game played in the library which utilizes research skills. It enables students to grow in their ability to find information, analyze it, and discover the answer to each week's clues. The game is played for 34 weeks and requires the commitment to play before and after school and during recess.
