IPM statement

It is the goal of Lodi Unified School District to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to: *(Example: Focus on long-term pest prevention)*

- 1) Manage pests that may occur on school sites to prevent interference with the learning environment of the students.
- 2) Reduce injury to students, staff and other occupants.
- 3) Preserve the integrity of the school buildings or structures.
- 4) Provide the safest playing or athletic surfaces possible.

IPM team

In addition to the IPM Coordinator, other individuals who are involved in purchasing, making IPM decisions, applying pesticides, and complying with the Healthy Schools Act requirements, include:

Operations Supervisor	Work with contractors to maintain current list of possible pesticides that may be utilized to manage pests at our school sites. Update annual letter that does out to parents. Maintain parent notification database. Mail letter to parents requesting notification of individual treatments. Work with contractors to follow AB2260 rules. Coordinate interior treatments with contracted company and school sites. Coordinate annual pesticide training for grounds staff.
Operation Supervisor (Custodial)	Assist with above items. Work with site custodial staff regarding inspections.

Pest management contracting

- Pest management services are contracted to a licensed pest control business.
Pest Control Business name(s): Delk Pest Control (interior) / Animal Damage Management(rodents) Chem Weed (grounds)
- Prior to entering into a contract, the school district has confirmed that the pest control business understands the training requirement and other requirements of the Healthy Schools Act. **Required beginning 7/1/2016.**

Pest identification, monitoring and inspection

Pest Identification is done by: Contracted pest control company

(Example: College/University staff, Pest Control Business, etc.)

Monitoring and inspecting for pests and conditions that lead to pest problems are done regularly by District custodial staff and results are communicated to the IPM Coordinator.

(Example: District staff title, e.g. Maintenance staff)

Specific information about monitoring and inspecting for pests, such as locations, times, or techniques include:

(Example: Sticky monitoring boards are placed in the kitchen and are checked weekly by custodial staff.)

- 1) Routine inspections by site custodial staff.
- 2) Placement of sticky monitoring traps (roaches), mouse traps, rat traps when indication that pests are present.
- 3) Custodial staff cleans up ant trails with disinfectant and searches to eliminate the source (candy, food, plants).
- 4) Custodial staff submits work order to M&O if further assistance is needed.

Chemical pest management practices

- School IPM training course approved by the Department of Pesticide Regulation (Education Code Section 16714; Food & Agricultural Code Section 13186.5). Required beginning 7/1/2016

Submittal of pesticide use reports

- Reports of all pesticides applied by school district staff during the calendar year, except pesticides exempt¹ from HSA recordkeeping, are submitted to the Department of Pesticide Regulation at least annually, by January 30 of the following year, using the form provided at www.cdpr.ca.gov/schoolipm. (Education Code Section 16711)
