Sight-seeing Trip



The first event of the day was sightseeing two of Bucharest's most famous landmarks: the People's Palace and the Village Museum. Split into two groups, one visited the Village Museum first followed by the People's Palace, while the other completed the tour in the opposite order.

Many delegates were astonished when they learned that the People's Palace is the second largest building in the world, preceded only by the Pentagon, and the heaviest in the world. Built entirely of Romanian materials with the only exception being a door (a gift from a former president of today's Congo), the grandiose construction displayed impressive Romanian workmanship. The tour lasted roughly an hour and a half and yet only 3-5% was covered during the visit.

Albeit in freezing conditions, the Village Museum looked a snowy fairyland—a vision made even more complete with the presence of two lovely fat cats. With a passionate tour guide, our visiting delegates were given yet another insight into Romanian culture and history.

These two sites represent two contrasting poles of Romania's rich past and, hopefully, has endowed the delegates with a useful introduction to the country and promoted an international ambiance.
