Salvatore visited Northwestern to talk about his dream which motivated our students to continue the ripple effect. Our school's FFA chapter donated \$500 as well as the KIM grant to Mr. Barone for his project.

Keychains for Cancer: McKenna Oberheim, Emma Jerram, Fiona Mulhair: These changemakers revived a successful project from their past to create this year's Keychains for Cancer. The girls made lanyards and are selling them to raise money for Smilow Cancer Center at Yale-New Haven Hospital. So far this group has raised approximately \$200 for the center.
