


Life Lessons




The Rough Faced Girl, by Rafe Martin



Farfallina & Marcel, By Holly Keller





Why the Sun and the Moon Live in the Sky, by Elphinstone Dayrell


Sun and his wife, the moon, lived on Earth and built a large house so that the water people could visit. But so many poured in that they were forced to move to the sky.

Wilma Unlimited: How Wilma Rudolph Became the World's Fastest Woman by Kathleen Krull




Mummies in the Morning (Magic Tree House Series, No. 3), by Mary Pope Osborne

Summer Reading Project Selections

*Select one activity for your assigned summer reading book.

- Write a new ending for your story. This new ending should be at least one page long.
- Write a continuation of your story. What happens in the new 'next' chapter? This should be at least one page in length.
- Write a song that tells about your story. You may sing your song with or without music. This song can be pop, country, rap-- the choice is yours! Be prepared to perform this for the class or have someone video your performance and bring the DVD for us to enjoy!
- Make a 3-minute video recording with a reenactment of one of your favorite events from the story. You may use friends and family members as actors and actresses. Please copy the video onto a DVD, or schedule a time for your parent to bring the camcorder and necessary cables for viewing.
- Write a comic book that tells about your favorite part of the book. The comic strip should have a minimum of six scenes or sections. Include comic style illustrations in either black and white or color. Include dialogue bubbles, too.
- Create a life-size portrait of one of the characters from your book. The
 portrait should include a written piece that tells about the character. The
 piece should also include information about events, or conflicts in the book
 that involve the character.
- Make a shadow box or diorama displaying your favorite scene.
- Write a character diary, writing at least five journal entries as if you are the main character in the story. Write down events that happen during the story and reflect on how they affected the character and why.
- o Write a poem about one of the characters. Be sure it is at least 8 lines long.
- Create a timeline of the major events of your book. Use drawings or magazine cutouts to show the events along the timeline. Label each event.
- O Design a t-shirt that promotes your book.
- Design a poster to advertise your book. Be creative! Include details, elaborate and use color! Try to make it 3-D or movable.
