Living in the Following Area: All that portion of the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, lying generally west of the north-south line established by Junipero Serra Boulevard, Worchester Avenue, and Nineteenth Avenue, and lying generally north of the east-west line established by California Street, to the intersection of Market Street, and thence on Market Street

All Japanese persons, both alien and non-alien, will be evacuated from the above designated area by 1200 o'clock noon Tuesday, April 7, 1942.

No Japanese person will be permitted to enter or leave the above described area after 8:00 a.m., Thursday, April 2. 1942, without obtaining special permission from the Provost Marshal at the Civil Control Station located at:

1701 Van Ness Avenue

San Francisco, California

The Civil Control Station is equipped to assist the Japanese population affected by this evacuation in the following ways:

1. Give advice and instructions on the evacuation.

2. Provide services with respect to the management, leasing, sale, storage or other disposition of most kinds of property including: real estate, business and professional equipment, buildings, household goods, boats, automobiles,

- 3. Provide temporary residence elsewhere for all Japanese in family groups.
- 4. Transport persons and a limited amount of clothing and equipment to their new residence, as specified below,

The Following Instructions Must Be Observed:

1. A responsible member of each family, preferably the head of the family, or the person in whose name most of the property is held, and each individual living alone, will report to the Civil Control Station to receive further instructions. This must be done between 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., Thursday, April 2, 1912, or between 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m., Friday, April 3, 1942.

A Devastating Precedent

These people also claimed that the Imam set to run the mosque was a dangerous radical, with ties to Al Qaeda. The truth is, none of these claims are accurate. First of all, this building on Park51 developmental complex is not even a mosque. It is an Islamic Community Center with several prayer rooms, including spaces for Christians and Jews. Politicians and pundits on the right have tried to spin this issue to help their agenda, but what the community center comes down to is a meeting place for people of all religions to gather, not just Muslims. Next we come to the claim that Imam Feisal Abdul Rauf, the man who will be running the community center and is currently overseeing its development, is a dangerous radical. The year was 1776. We were officially at war with the British Empire, Benjamin Franklin was seeking an alliance with the French, and a radical new document had just been written: the Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was written by Thomas Jefferson and edited by Benjamin Franklin and John Adams along with himself and two others. The text stated that the thirteen British colonies had seceded from the Empire to form their own nation, the United States of America.

Most of these facts are commonly known. But what isn't is the age at which Jefferson finished the Declaration: a young 32 years old. James Madison, the father of the Constitution, was 36 when it was written, and George Washington was 43 when he became Commander in Chief. It is simply amazing how there was such a high concentration of extremely intelligent people at this unique time in history. Frankly, we were extremely lucky to have them.

Jump ahead 250 years. Instead of Jeffersons and Madisons, we have Palins and O'Donnells. Instead of Franklin, we have Beck. Instead of Paine, we have Olbermann. What happened to the people that believed so passionately in the well being of a people and a nation, not just themselves, and more importantly, what will the future entail for us? In four weeks the people will elect the 112th United States Congress.
