Dear Rising 6th Grade Families,

The school year is rapidly coming to a close, but we are **ALREADY** looking forward to the growth your child will make in the coming year. Summer reading is an **important** part of the ELA curriculum at Girls Prep because it allows kids to escape into amazing stories and ensures that they don't slide back in their reading levels. **Studies show that the amount of time that students spend reading independently is the best predictor of reading achievement.**

We're very excited that, this summer, 6th grade students will participate in Summer Reading Clubs through NewsELA. That's right--all ELA summer homework will be **ONLINE** this year! Please read below for more information.



What is the duration of Summer Reading Clubs?

Start date: Summer Reading Clubs kicked off on Friday, June 1st

End date: Tuesday, August 28th

All 20 articles and quizzes must be completed by Tuesday, September 4th and will count as your first ELA grade of the 2018-2019 school year!

Do your best!

How do I join and how does this work?

All current GPMS students have an existing NewsELA account and should use this throughout the summer. Students are expected to join at least two (2) Summer Reading Clubs. When students join a Summer Reading Club, they will receive ten assigned articles about the club topic, along with Write Prompts asking them to free-write about the topic. Students can join one, two, or all of them!

How do students participate?

Students participate by joining two NewsELA Summer Reading Clubs and by reading assigned articles and taking quizzes/responding to prompts.

Is there a deadline for my child to begin participating?

No. NewsELA Summer Reading Clubs began June 1, but students will be able to begin participating any time over the summer. That being said, students are expected to read and respond to at least 20 articles and should not wait until the last minute to complete the assigned work. Teachers will have all students signed up in a reading club by the end of the school year. All work must be completed by September 4th, 2018.

What is my child's goal in participating in NewsELA Summer Reading Clubs?

Every student's goal for NewsELA Summer Reading Clubs is to read all 20 assigned articles and take all 20 quizzes, scoring a 3 out of 4 or better on each quiz. Students are also expected to complete the writing prompt.

Can students join more than two Summer Reading Clubs?

Yes, students can join as many of the Summer Reading Clubs as they'd like. Please note that teachers will only be grading work from two (2) of the clubs.

Can students read more than they've been assigned?

Yes! Students can always read more than assigned. Any extra articles read will count as extra credit.

How will teachers monitor progress?

Teachers will be able to monitor progress throughout the summer, but a final grade won't be assigned until the first day of the school year. Please remember that this is your child's very first ELA grade for the following year, so it's important that they do their best work.


Artemis Fowl




Stanley Yelnats is sent to a hellish correctional camp in the Texas desert where he finds his first real friend, a treasure, and a new sense of himself.
