

It's held in the Kerr Center, beautifully decorated by volunteer parents and teachers. One-by-one, seniors line up to share their message with the audience. Tears, laughter, joy, memories, and proud moments fill the room as student after student approaches the microphone to talk about his or her years at AACS.

I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you.



For that, I am deeply thankful, both as a principal but also as a father of two AACS students.

The other thing that we saw that night was equally significant. Two days prior, Rick Kempton, Superintendent, had given a challenge to our students in one of our weekly chapels. He exhorted the students to examine their hearts and ask if there were any relationships among them that were not right, if there was anyone with whom they needed to reconcile. At the Outdoor Worship Night, we saw a number of students convicted and reach out to other students seeking reconciliation. Some hugged, some wept, and prayed together celebrating unity in Christ. ALUMNI LEGACY

"There is no other school for my kids"

n Tuesday, May 5, Katie Siddon Raspa, '98, sat in the sanctuary of Annapolis EP Church, the home of the Lower School, watching her son Griffin sing in the Lower School spring program. She thought back to her days as a student at AACS, performing in programs in that same sanctuary. "It's overwhelmingly emotional for me. It was and is a privilege to be able to sing songs of substance. Kids are learning motions and songs that really praise God."

She is not the only alumna to remember the days of Psalty as the cartoonish character that headlined school programs of the past. She is not the only one to relish the legacy of faith that AACS has helped perpetuate.

The school's growing group of second-generation AACS families has similar perspectives on how their children are in the same school that they attended. Mike Foundos, '94, sees a praying faculty and staff as a constant. "That is palpable at AACS." He said, "I credit the environment of AACS that helped those relationships with guys I had lunch with for years in school to grow. I want that, and see that for my children." Mike is not the only one to highlight the strength of relationships at AACS. Meg Romer McClure, '89, said, "My fondest memories come from the friendships." Mike Abramo, '91, spoke of those friendships among classmates and teachers. Bob Mori, '87, considers his friendship with Rick Slenk, "who became my mentor and the best man in my wedding" to be one of his best AACS memories.

Yet Annapolis Area Christian School is not just about friendships or programs. The spiritual foundation undergirds the school and has for many years, as many of the parents of secondgeneration AACS students pointed out. "A Biblically-sound educational focus is still here," said Graham Thorpe, '97, the school's Chief Advancement Officer. Bob Mori added, "Christ is and has al-

ways been its foundation." Niki Nichols O'Herlihy, who attended AACS in her junior high years, before the high school existed, has a sixth-grade daughter. She stated, "I was surrounded by teachers who loved Jesus and therefore loved me. I love that our daughter's teachers love Jesus and point to Him as part of everything they teach." Mike Abramo added, "One of the things that has not changed is the love for students and [the teachers'] desire for their success, both spiritually and academically." Jen Anderson Palumbo, '99, gave her view of the strengths of the school that carry through from her days as a student to her days now as an AACS mom. "The teachers have helped our children identify and use their gifts for God's glory, and to identify opportunities to grow in their areas of weakness. They care about academic growth, but they make it clear that their biggest priority is encouraging the children toward faith in the Lord that reflects a growing love and understanding of who God is and who they are to Him."

Meg McClure summed up the spirit of having second-generation AACS kids. "I consider it a luxury to be able to send my children to AACS, a place where the gospel is celebrated, the grace of Jesus abounds, where my children are free to learn about Christ in every aspect of their lives, and where the teachers love God and love the children." Even more succinctly, Graham Thorpe said, "There is no other school for my kids." ‡

academically challenging, rather it was challenging socially and emotionally. I often refer to my initial college of choice as a "suit-case" school because more than half of the students would leave campus on the weekend. Of course, I did not understand this about the school when I applied and accepted. Most of the freshmen were relatively local and already had acquaintances throughout the student body, but I was an outsider. I also did not sense a Christ-like community on the campus. The campus community was more focused on attaining immediate satisfaction through fulfilling worldly desires. I found a way to get involved by joining the club soccer team and becoming involved in a campus interdenominational ministry group. However, even after taking advantage of some of the campus-wide opportunities, I realized that God was calling me to try applying to Wheaton a second time. I did and I cried when

I was accepted. I was going to be a transfer student, and I was so excited. 
