Wiseburn High School Project Update

This is a letter from Tom Johnstone Ed.D., Superintendent WUSD and Chris Jones Ed.D., Deputy Superintendent WUSD. They have drafted this letter in regards to questions that were raised that the Del Aire Neighborhood Association meeting on 10/21/2014.

It reads as follows:

October 24, 2014

Dear Ethan,

Thank you for the providing us an opportunity to outline some of the progress that we have been making over the past several years and to clarify any misinformation that might be out there regarding the Wiseburn High School project. The work that has been accomplished in Wiseburn and Da Vinci Schools has been a labor of love for our students. We are thoroughly appreciative of the dedication of teachers, administrators, parents and community members in building the foundation for a K-12 educational program that is centered on what is best for our students. We would be happy to provide a more in-depth presentation about our progress to date, and decision points along the way.

In response to your specific questions:

1. We will need at least \$27 million to complete the high school project by 2017?

The actual amount of money that will be needed to complete the Wiseburn High School building at 201 North Douglas is \$21.7 million. This includes the \$6 million that Wiseburn is putting into the competition swimming pool, but does not include the cost of the gym. As all of you may recall, this course of action (the inclusion of the competition swimming pool) was taken to avoid spending millions of dollars and spending several years in litigation with the City of El Segundo over our desire to place Wiseburn High School in the City of El Segundo. The commercial section of El Segundo has been in the Wiseburn (Unified) School District for 118 years, since we were established in 1896.

As a point of understanding and clarification, all Wiseburn school construction projects have been accomplished with State Matching funds. Since Anza was rebuilt in 2002, Wiseburn has received nearly \$17 million (\$16,639,538) in State Matching funds to help us complete the construction projects at Anza, Dana, Cabrillo, and Burnett. Wiseburn has some of the most beautiful school facilities in the State of California to go along with our outstanding education program and our community should be very proud of them. Wiseburn residents have been very supportive and generous and have also been blessed by the fact that the residential portion of our school bonds is only 20% of the total, with the commercial (El Segundo) assessed valuation covering the other 80%.

What makes the Wiseburn High School Project unique in our recent history (since the 1950s), is the fact that Wiseburn Unified School District did not own the land to build a new high school. Furthermore, at the strong urging of our three neighborhoods (Del Aire, Hollyglen, and Wiseburn) we have been committed to finding a high school location that is not in the middle of one of our residential neighborhoods. After nearly a two-year search and exploring countless options, we purchased a property at 201 North Douglas in El Segundo. The nearly 14 acre site is in the heart of the aerospace sector in a beautiful and prime location for a high school and "repurposes" the building where the B2 bomber was designed in the 1980s. Land in El Segundo does not come inexpensively - - at \$3.4 million an acre. The cost of the property at 201 North Douglas was \$46 million. We would like to acknowledge that the \$87 million approved by Wiseburn voters for Wiseburn High School back in November of 2010 was more than enough funding to build the actual high school facility. However, the purchase of the land at 201 Douglas expends more than half of the \$87 million of Measure AA bonds.

This is where the State Matching funds come into play. Since Wiseburn has never had a high school campus and the cost for land in our district is so expensive, the State provides funding for land acquisition. However, the bond funds that were passed by the State in 2006 for school construction under the State School Facilities Program have been exhausted for K-12 school districts (the \$1.58 million that we received for the Peter Burnett Construction was some of the very last bond funding awarded by the State from the 2006 bond). Said in a slightly different way, we had every reasonable expectation that the State would once again provide matching funds, as they had for all of our previous construction projects at Anza, Burnett, Cabrillo and Dana, In the summer of 2014, the Governor's Propositions 1 and 2 (Water Conservation and Rainy Day funds) were deemed a higher priority and the Governor rejected a bipartisan bill to place a State General Obligation Bond for school construction funding on the November 2014 election ballot. However, there is still \$88 million of State funding allocated from the 2006 bond for charter school facilities and we submitted an application for \$53.6 million back in April 2014. We have been closely monitoring this application and we respond immediately to all requests for further information. We are very cautiously optimistic of receiving this funding which provides us with more than enough funding to complete the entire Wiseburn High School Project, Including the gym and sports venue at 135th and Aviation.

2. With the State money not available, bonds most likely will be in our future to fund the project?

We have always been expecting State Matching funds to be a part of the equation for all of our facilities projects. The application for

We have a strong expectation that we will qualify and receive approval for this funding though the State Allocation Board. If this funding were not to come through, we would need to consider all possibilities for bridge funding until State Matching funds do come through. These would include a re-setting of the current timeline, a capital campaign for private donations, and/or traditional borrowing/loans. As a last resort in this instance, we would look to our community for a bond to bridge the financing until State Matching funds come in. Again, our expectation is that this will not be an issue once the charter school facilities funding is approved in early December by the State Allocation Board.

- The application for \$58 million through charter school programs will be known by December 14?
 The application for \$53.6 million in charter school funding is expected to be known by mid-December.
- 4. There is no public school alternative with Wiseburn High School? Its strictly Da Vinci curriculum and programming? I don't think the Community knew this part.

"Lessons learned over the past six years and the steady, positive evolution of the Da Vinci Schools have profoundly affected our thinking about what constitutes a successful world-class high school program. With Wiseburn Unification only a distant glimmer of hope back in 2008, the Wiseburn Board of Trustees took a bold step in the fall of 2008 and established Wiseburn 21st Century Charter Schools which launched Da Vinci Science and Da Vinci Design in August 2009. The original charter applications stated that "in the event that the Unification effort was successful, Wiseburn School District reserves the right to "adopt" the Da Vinci Design Charter as the "seed" for a comprehensive Wiseburn High School. The specific timeline and conditions of this addition will be developed collaboratively between Wiseburn School District and Wiseburn 21st Century Charters (now Da Vinci Schools)."

The past six years have spotlighted the benefits of partnership and taking advantage of the best of both worlds – school district and charter – In developing the most outstanding program possible for all of our students. Rather than dismantle what has been so thoughtfully created, we intend to continue forward in the successful partnership between Wiseburn and the Da Vinci Schools." In line with this thinking, the Board of Trustees chose not to take over Da Vinci Design, but rather incorporate all the Da Vinci high schools into the plans for Wiseburn High School – "Home of the Da Vinci Schools". Da Vinci Design, Da Vinci Science and Da Vinci Communications will be the small learning communities that make up Wiseburn High School. Each high school remains as an independent charter, while comprehensive programs for CIF sports, music and the arts will be available to all students under a single Wiseburn-Da Vinci banner. The foundations for sports and music are already underway during the 2014-15 school year.

Since the start-up of the Da Vinci Schools, we have been keeping a close watch on important metrics that guide our decisions about programs. To gauge parental satisfaction with the program, extensive surveys have been administered twice yearly which have yielded results showing overwhelming support by parents for all three high schools. At Wiseburn and Da Vinci we are careful to reflect on all feedback and work towards continuous improvement of each organization. In working collaboratively, we are blazing a new trail that we believe greatly benefits both organizations, and more importantly the Wiseburn Community. We will continue to monitor our progress on our path towards providing the best high school experience possible for our students.

As a closing thought, we would like to share a comment sent to a Da Vinci principal that was sent recently (this week) by a 2014 Da Vinci graduate who is now attending the University of California, Berkeley:

I hope this message finds you well. Recently I wrote a paper for my sociology class and it was about how educational experience is influenced by the socio-economic conditions of an individual's home community/ high school. In writing the essay I had to look up data for the city of Hawthome and Da Vinci Science and then compare it to two schools in the bay area; one In a very affluent neighborhood and one in a low-income area in Oakland. When looking at things such as such as median income, highest level of parent education, demographics, students eligible for free/reduced lunch, etc etc I saw that DV and Hawthome were extremely similar to the school in Oakland, but when looking at percent of graduates, students eligible for UC/CSU's, API score, our school matched the school in the rich area and in some areas surpassed that school! I, of course, have always known how Da Vinci is an amazing school but seeing these statistics, and seeing how DV gave students coming from low-income families and communities the resources and opportunity to succeed is honestly jaw-dropping and makes me feel so proud and honestly honored to have gone to such an amazing, progressive school. So thanks, to you and the rest of the DV administration and teachers for doing this for all of us. Who knows if many of us could have ended up in the great places we are today had it not been for Da Vinci.

We hope this information provides you with some clarity and answers any questions that you might have. Thanks for giving us this opportunity! We are always willing to accept an invitation to meet with anyone in the Wisebum Community and our schools are your schools. They are always open to you and we would love to have our students give you a tour and explain what we are proudly doing at our schools! Please feel free to disseminate this information as widely as you see fit!

The original charter applications stated that "in the event that the Unification effort was successful, Wiseburn School District reserves the right to "adopt" the Da Vinci Design Charter as the "seed" for a comprehensive Wiseburn High School. The specific timeline and conditions of this addition will be developed collaboratively between Wiseburn School District and Wiseburn 21st Century Charters (now Da Vinci Schools)."

The past six years have spotlighted the benefits of partnership and taking advantage of the best of both worlds — school district and charter — in developing the most outstanding program possible for all of our students. Rather than dismantle what has been so thoughtfully created, we intend to continue forward in the successful partnership between Wiseburn and the Da Vinci Schools." In line with this thinking, the Board of Trustees chose not to take over Da Vinci Design, but rather incorporate all the Da Vinci high schools into the plans for Wiseburn High School — "Home of the Da Vinci Schools". Da Vinci Design, Da Vinci Science and Da Vinci Communications will be the small learning communities that make up Wiseburn High School. Each high school remains as an independent charter, while comprehensive programs for CIF sports, music and the arts will be available to all students under a single Wiseburn-Da Vinci banner. The foundations for sports and music are already underway during the 2014-15 school year.

Since the start-up of the Da Vinci Schools, we have been keeping a close watch on important metrics that guide our decisions about programs. To gauge parental satisfaction with the program, extensive surveys have been administered twice yearly which have yielded results showing overwhelming support by parents for all three high schools. At Wiseburn and Da Vinci we are careful to reflect on all feedback and work towards continuous improvement of each organization. In working collaboratively, we are blazing a new trail that we believe greatly benefits both organizations, and more importantly the Wiseburn Community. We will continue to monitor our progress on our path towards providing the best high school experience possible for our students.

As a closing thought, we would like to share a comment sent to a Da Vinci principal that was sent recently (this week) by a 2014 Da Vinci graduate who is now attending the University of California, Berkeley:

I hope this message finds you well. Recently I wrote a paper for my sociology class and it was about how educational experience is influenced by the socio-economic conditions of an individual's home community/ high school. In writing the essay I had to look up data for the city of Hawthorne and Da Vinci Science and then compare it to two schools in the bay area; one in a very affluent neighborhood and one in a low-income area in Oakland. When looking at things such as such as median income, highest level of parent education, demographics, students eligible for free/reduced lunch, etc etc I saw that DV and Hawthorne were extremely similar to the school in Oakland, but when looking at percent of graduates, students eligible for UC/CSU's, API score, our school matched the school in the rich area and in some areas surpassed that school! I, of course, have always known how Da Vinci is an amazing school but seeing these statistics, and seeing how DV gave students coming from low-income families and communities the resources and opportunity to succeed is honestly jaw-dropping and makes me feel so proud and honestly honored to have gone to such an amazing, progressive school. So thanks, to you and the rest of the DV administration and teachers for doing this for all of us. Who knows if many of us could have ended up in the great places we are today had it not been for Da Vinci.

We hope this information provides you with some clarity and answers any questions that you might have. Thanks for giving us this opportunity! We are always willing to accept an invitation to meet with anyone in the Wiseburn Community and our schools are your schools. They are always open to you and we would love to have our students give you a tour and explain what we are proudly doing at our schools!
