District focuses on school security

Committees formed to review safety protocols, implement change

bout two months ago,
Davis School District Superintendent Reid Newey

stood before a group of about 135 school assistant principals, school interns and school district personnel.

The meeting had already been scheduled, and an agenda was already in place.

But he couldn't ignore what had happened the day before — when 17 people lost their lives in a shooting that occurred at a school in Parkland, Fla.

Even before that day, safety had been top-of-mind with every school and district administrator. During the first principal leadership meeting of the school year — back on Sept. 14 — Supt. Newey, along with Assistant Superintendent John Zurbuchen, talked

about school safety. They discussed aspects like locking school doors that didn't need to be opened from the outside; adding secure vestibules to schools; making the wearing of ID badges mandatory; conducting school lockdown and fire drills; adding more cameras, etc.

School safety has also been discussed by the Davis School District Board of Education. On March 6, board members learned the district has created four separate safety committees. Those groups are reviewing the physical structures of schools, standard response protocols, collaboration with law enforcement, and procedures followed by the Student & Family Services Department and district case management team.

District representatives have met with security officials at the LDS Church and the Ogden Police Department Real Time Crime Center. Supt. Newey and Zurbuchen have met with the Davis County Sheriff and all police chiefs throughout Davis County — all since the Parkland, Fla. shoot-

ing.

The District's director of Architecture and New Construction, Bryan Turner, has been asked to participate in the newly-created Utah School Safety Commission. Its mis-

sion is to "bring community members of varying expertise together to discuss potential policy ideas that could be used to make Utah schools safer."

West Bountiful Police Chief Todd Hixson has made four presentations to the superintendent's cabinet, support service department heads, all 89 school principals and all school assistant principals and interns about re-

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sponding to active killer scenarios. A video of that presentation has been provided to all police jurisdictions throughout Davis County and is being shared with all school faculties.

Three district schools are also currently piloting an addition to an intercom system that has the capability to silently notify the front office when help is needed. The pilot has garnered

attention of other school districts.

The district also continues to encourage use of the SafeUT smartphone app, which because of its existence, has been used by students and parents to report suspicious activities, rumors and threats. A recent threat which originated out of New Mexico — and had nothing to do with the Davis School District or any of its schools — resulted in more than 130 reports to cli-

nicians answering the crisis line.

The district is also committing \$4 million to build more secure vestibules and to enhance video monitoring systems.

Supt. Newey characterizes the district's efforts as ongoing, adding, "We are going ... as quickly as we can, with the recognition that it is going to cost money and involve manpower."
