

## PROCEDURES

Parental Involvement

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The Board of Education has adopted Policy 3000.02, Parental Involvement, to express its strong support for the involvement of parents in their children's education. The Policy was adopted, in part, to meet the requirements of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The purpose of this Regulation is to assure that the Board Policy is fully implemented and all legal requirements are met.

For purposes of these Procedures, the School District will follow the statutory definition of parental involvement:

Parental involvement means the participation of parents in regular, two-way, and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities, including ensuring that:

- A. Parents play an integral role in assisting their child's learning.
- B. Parents are encouraged to be actively involved in their child's education at school.
- C. Parents are full partners in their child's education and are included, as appropriate, in decision-making and on advisory committees to assist in the education of their child.
- D. Other activities are carried out, such as those described in 20 USC 6318 on parent and family engagement.

School personnel will partner with parents to develop students' intellectual and vocational skills in a safe and positive environment. It is important to establish an open line of communication so that staff and parents can support students as they learn and grow. In the event there is a question or a concern, parents should first contact the student's teacher. If there are additional questions or concerns, the administrator of the child's school should be contacted.

Should a parent wish to review any curriculum, textbook or other teaching materials, the parent should contact the District's Instruction and Assessment Coordinator. As a general principle, parents are not permitted to observe day-to-day instructional activities. This is to maintain the confidentiality of the other students within the classroom. Parents may ask to meet with a teacher to review activities, and this can be done by contacting the school's principal.
