Course Description

The art curriculum for Grades 5-8 is planned to encourage creative growth in an open yet structured environment with an emphasis on 21st century skills. Critical thinking, collaboration and communication are key factors in the art program. Students are encouraged to use their imagination and reasoning powers to investigate, experiment and problem solve.

Areas of focus include: art history, ceramics, digital media, drawing, fibers, mixed media, painting and sculpture. Specific projects for each media vary from grade to grade. We will discover and analyze the Elements and Principles of Art and apply them throughout the year. Fifth and sixth grade projects are typically shorter in duration, while seventh and eighth grade projects allow for more in depth study.

Text & Resources

Grades 5 and 6 students are required to bring a pencil and their computer to class every day.

Grs. 7 and 8 students are required to bring a sketchbook, pencil and their computer every day. (Gr. 8 is required to purchase their own sketchbooks. Gr. 7 is requested to bring their own sketchbook, or one will be provided.)

Students may bring their own supplies if they choose to not use the classroom supplies. These supplies include but not limited to markers, sharpies, colored pencils, pastels and watercolors.

Class Expectations

Students respect themselves, their classmates and their teachers. Positive attitude and behavior is required; students are expected to be open to learning and to not disrupt learning, for themselves or others. Respectful behavior also includes listening attentively and respectfully to classmates and teachers.

Effort – Effort includes preparedness, participation, responsibility, and willingness to stretch.

- Preparedness: Students arrive on time to class with necessary materials, including all work that is due.
- Participation: Students will actively participate in class activities, discussions and projects. The comments or questions will be valuable and positive. Following directions is also part of being an active learner.
- Responsibility: Students assume responsibility in the classroom by communicating with teachers and classmates if they are absent. Seeking help and advocating for one's self is also part of a student's responsibility.
- Willingness to stretch: Students stretch their abilities, even at the risk of setbacks or failures.

Students in Grades 5 and 6 are assessed on a pass/fail basis.

Students in Grades 7 and 8 receive a letter grade. Grades 7 & 8 art students are expected to use their sketchbook daily and turn in sketchbook assignments as assigned.

Language Arts 5/6 Lynette Nixon

Course Description

The Language Arts 5/6 curriculum integrates reading and writing within the Reading and Writing Workshop approach. Students will explore a variety of genres including narrative, short story, and poetry this year. In addition, there is a word study component which provides students the opportunity to learn, practice and reinforce the skills taught in class.

Independent reading is tracked by book cards which students fill out as they read. Students are expected to read at least one book a month and complete a short activity when they finish the book. Group reading involves both Read Aloud and Book Club. Read Aloud is a time when the teacher reads a novel to the class. It provides students with modeling of how a good reader sounds, offers demonstration of reading strategies and is a time for group discussion of literature. Book Club is an opportunity for the students to collaborate in small groups and reflect on a common novel. By doing so they are reinforcing literacy skills, improving independent thinking and practicing teamwork.

Using a Writer's Workshop approach students are actively engaged in all aspects of the writing process from brainstorming, to proofreading, to sharing their published pieces. The process is as important as the finished product and enables all students to work to their full potential. Writer's Workshop also allows time for teaching and practicing skills such as knowledge of words and rules for language usage. The Writer's Notebook will be used to practice skills introduced in class, as well as writing independently. Students will be expected to write in their notebooks a minimum of three times per week on any topic they choose.

Vocabulary, word usage and spelling are taught, developed and reinforced throughout the year through mini-lessons, *Some Words* booklets, vocabulary/spelling quizzes and individual conferencing with students. Students will also be responsible for identifying vocabulary words as a part of their book club reading

Evaluation

Each assignment is worth a set number of points. Assignments and report card grades are calculated by dividing the points the student earned by the total possible points. Report cards will show the corresponding letter grade for that percentage as outlined in the handbook.

Most homework will receive a five to ten-point grade for completion and effort. Weekly Writer's Notebook independent entries are worth 15 points total. Homework and tests that are a review of material previously learned will be worth more, depending on the assignment. Larger projects are assessed with a rubric which is shared with students before the project is due. Late work will receive

a 10% deduction in the grade for the assignment. Work is considered late if it is not ready or available to be turned in at the start of class on the day it is due.

Academic integrity is of the utmost importance. Any case involving copying the work of another person, either a student or published material, will result in a decrease in the grade for the assignment. Typically, the grade will be decreased at least 10%.

Course Description

Language Arts 7/8 is a two-year loop focusing on the development of reading, writing and thinking skills that will help students become life-long learners.

Language Arts 7/8 is characterized by the following:

- A focus on strong classroom activity
- Teaching into students' lives both academically and personally
- Designing lessons based on students' needs
- Mini-lessons which involve direct teaching on specific skills or strategies, particularly usage and sentence structure
- Independent work time in which students work at an individual pace using strategies taught
- Conferencing between teacher/student, student/student and teacher/group
- Student sharing of their work, tips and areas of need

Text & Resources

- A variety of novels to be determined throughout the year based on the students' needs and interest
- Various short stories and poems, fiction and non-fiction
- A variety of web-based tools and resources

Class Expectations

WRITING - The goal of the writing component of Language Arts 7/8 is to guide students toward the ability to *explain why they think what they think*. To reach this goal, students will learn to analyze literature, develop their own opinions about it and support their opinions with evidence from readings. In this process, they will engage in:

1 - Brainstorming
 2 - Developing ideas
 3 - Drafting
 4 - Revision
 5 - Editing
 6 - Publishing

During class, students will spend time working constructively on each stage of the writing process. Spending class time working both independently and collaboratively on writing skills will provide opportunities for guidance, instruction and input from the class community of writers. All students

will participate in peer conferences and student-teacher conferences. Students will also explore the connections to other academic areas (e.g. science, social studies, art, etc.).

In addition to writing about literature, students will write nonfiction, including memoirs and nonfiction narratives.

<u>Journals</u>

Students will regularly write responses to a prompt that is related to class discussions, readings, or writing projects. Each assignment will dictate whether students will write these entries in their notebooks they bring to class. Journal entries provide opportunities for students to practice their handwriting and think through a question independently, while explaining their thoughts on paper. Thorough, complete responses will help students build on their writing and analytical skills.

READING

Independent Reading

Independent Reading is a key element of the reading program, when students are reading books of choice, practicing a strategy learned in the read-aloud, conferring with teachers, talking with others about books and writing about what they are reading. All students should have an independent reading book at all times.

Read-Aloud

In addition to independent reading, students will be studying various novels as a class, reading the majority of each text aloud in the classroom. Mini-lessons presented in these read-aloud sessions stem from the needs of the readers and those strategies which help enhance their lives, making meaning from text and the social aspect of reading. Collaborative discussions will provide opportunities for students to work together as they develop reading abilities, such as analysis and critical thinking.

VOCABULARY & SPELLING

In connection to reading and writing units, students will study vocabulary words. They will learn how to spell the words, definitions, parts of speech, and most importantly, usage of the words, in order to incorporate them into their daily vocabulary. Quizzes will assess students' knowledge and ability to use the vocabulary words. Vocabulary words from across the curriculum may appear on these assessments.

Homework

Reading and writing independently outside of class provides students with the opportunity to further explore the craft of writing and to develop deeper thinking skills. This practice is critical to their growth. Students are expected to read and write for class assignments regularly.

Preparation for vocabulary quizzes will require regular review at home. Students will also have small homework assignments to develop writing skills and competency.

Evaluation

Grading is organized around a cumulative point system. The sum of points earned on assignments will be determined and a percentage based on the total number of points possible will be computed. This percentage determines the letter grade in accordance with the scale stated in the handbook. It should be noted that, in general, major projects, tests, and quizzes are worth more points than note-taking or homework assignments. However, keeping up with assignments and note-taking are essential to good preparation for assessment events.

Grading is organized around a cumulative point system. The total possible points for any given assignment will be determined based on the expectations for that assignment. Grading rubrics will be given to students at the onset of each assignment. The sum of points earned on assignments will be found and a percentage based on the total number of points possible will be computed. This percentage determines the letter grade in accordance with the scale stated in the handbook. Grades will be posted on the PCR Gradebook. Students will be informed about when the gradebook is open for them to review their scores. In addition, students will receive a grade for effort and conduct.

Late Work:

Late work will be reflected in a student's grade. Late work will receive a 10% deduction in the grade for every day an assignment is late. Assignments will only be accepted up to 3 school days after the due date. Work is considered late if it is not ready or available to be turned in at the start of class on the day it is due.

Course Description

- Class meets daily from 9:05 9:52
- Daily homework will be assigned.
- Students will have "Bellwork": a challenging non-graded problem-solving activity that is meant to develop risk-taking and computational confidence.

The acquisition of fraction and decimal concepts and skills is emphasized in this class. Other areas of math include geometry, measurement, integers, ratio, percent, probability, statistics, and mental math. Students will develop increasing levels of proficiency and confidence in both computation and mathematical explorations. Making sense of problems and persevering in solving them form an important part of the fifth grade experience.

Students will participate in five Math Olympiad Competitions (November through March) and the Michigan Math League Contest (Grade 6 in February and Grade 5 in May)



A performance for the Middle School for Girls students and faculty is the culminating activity. Each student will have this experience for one quarter.

- Students earn 10 points per class period. Two points will be deducted for the following reasons: tardiness, gum/food, failure to have materials, bathroom breaks and behavior/effort.
- After-school performances are valued at 100 points and school day performances at 50 points.
 Students will receive 0 points for an unexcused absence from a mandatory performance.
 Excused absences require written notification from a parent two weeks prior to the event and merit 85 points. In most cases there will be a written assignment for an excused absence.
 Emergency situations will be discussed on a case by case basis.
- Inappropriate dress at a performance merits 90 points.
- Misconduct during a performance merits 60 points.
- Students are given one week to make up class work or a test. Failure to do so will result in a failing grade.

Homework

Additional Materials Needed

- **Choir students** are expected to have the following: pencil (pens are not acceptable), two-pocket folder (yellow-Advanced Choir; red-Beginning Choir) and music.
- **Band students** are expected to have: pencil (pens are not acceptable), advanced band folder and music (which is provided by school), *Essential Elements 2000* band method book and instrument. Clarinet and alto saxophone students also will need extra reeds. All students are also expected to bring their computer to class when instructed to do so by Ms. Unrau.

All students are required to have a concert uniform consisting of a **solid-black** knee-length or longer skirt or dress pants (no jeans, dance/yoga pants, or corduroy material), **white** buttoned down, school oxford blouse (long-sleeved), **black** nylons or tights, and **black** dress shoes.

Course Description

Public speaking essentials enable students to become more effective communicators by using verbal and non-verbal communication in a variety of situations. Students will have numerous opportunities to perform and speak in front of a supportive audience. Through these class exercises, students improve their eye contact, physical movement/gestures, posture, confidence and vocal characteristics. Fundamental to a child's education is the ability to write and speak clearly and with proper usage.

Confidence in communicating with a group of listeners, and developing listening abilities as an "audience" are essential skills that the students will utilize throughout life. Opportunities to learn and practice the art of public speaking include performing in class plays, conducting monologues, and writing and delivering speeches in a variety of formats. Students are expected to integrate credible sources into their research for presentations, as well as properly cite resources in informal and formal speaking situations. Students need to critically listen to and evaluate oral communication in a variety of settings.

Course Description

The Social Studies 5/6 curriculum incorporates critical thinking, collaboration, and creativity while studying the Ancient World and the Middle Age civilizations of the Eastern Hemisphere. The history of the civilizations will be explored as several stories or themes including movement and trade or religion and culture. The focus this year will be: early people, which includes the stone age; Greece and Rome, the Byzantine Empire, China, and Japan. Using a combination of reading, note taking, class discussions, simulations, projects and tests, students will explore and compare the history and culture of these civilizations. Course Description

Social Studies 7/8 will be a two-year loop focusing on the study of European and American history as several stories with a beginning, middle and end. The 7/8 loop picks up with the post-Ancient world.

Initially, students will begin the year by discussing the concept of historical thinking. Historical thinking is a complex, multi-faceted way of thinking with five components: utilizing multiple accounts and perspectives, analyzing primary sources, sourcing (considering a document's origin to help us make sense of it), considering context and recognizing the claim-evidence connection (the knowledge that historical arguments and stories rest on evidence). This way of critically thinking about history will be used as the lens through which each story will be studied, examined, and written about throughout the year. As these stories are studied and learned, geography and map skills will be taught in the context of each story.

This year the focus will be on:

- Historical Thinking
- The Story of Slavery
- The Industrial Revolution
- The Story of the Civil War

Throughout the year students will be expected to follow the news to understand the current social, political and economic issues. By studying and discussing current events students will be able to make connections between current events and history, be able to articulate arguments using appropriate evidence, enhance their understanding of world events, and encourage students will become informed and engaged citizens.

Grading is organized around a cumulative point system. The sum of points earned on assignments will be determined and a percentage based on the total number of points possible will be computed. This percentage determines the letter grade in accordance with the scale stated in the handbook. It should be noted that, in general, tests, quizzes and projects are worth more points than note-taking or homework assignments. However, keeping up with assignments and note-taking are essential to good preparation for assessment events.

In addition to tests, quizzes, and projects, students may be assigned a variety of homework tasks. Some of those tasks will be to preview a topic in readiness for an activity or discussion, to read a portion of text and record questions and thoughts, or to complete an assignment to show level of mastery with the material. Please note that studying is frequently assigned as homework. This is to build study habits, strategies, discipline, and technique. Pop quizzes, both graded and ungraded, give students and teacher a way to gauge how independent studying and learning is progressing and give time for "course correction" as needed. In order to encourage risk-taking and develop the confidence to try different strategies for learning, some assignments will receive a completion grade while others will receive an accuracy grade. Students will also receive a grade for effort and conduct.
