Course Description

Students will have art three days each six-day cycle for 45 minutes.

The Kensington Hall art program is designed to encourage students to experiment with a variety of media and techniques, to use a variety of tools, to make art that they like, in a safe and respectful environment. The lessons are filled with projects and activities that will boost critical thinking habits, improve collaborative participation, grow creativity and develop communication skills through writing and talking about art.

The elements of art (line, shape, form, value, space, color, and texture) are studied in twodimensional and three-dimensional work. Students will begin to apply the principles of design, (rhythm, balance, contrast, proportion, variety, proportion, and harmony) in their art-making practices.

We will cover the following: drawing, painting, ceramics, computer graphic design, sculpture, printmaking, the vocabulary of art, and looking at and discussing works of art.

Course Description

In Language Arts 5/6, students will write routinely for a variety of tasks and purposes over short and extended periods of time. Writing assignments will include regular recording of reflections in a writing journal as well as writing complex sentences, well developed paragraphs and short reports. Grammar skills will be practiced individually through writing instruction and with some practice activities. Students will read novels independently, as a small group and as a class, as well as listening to and responding to novels read aloud. Reading instruction will include foundational skills (word work), fluency and practice reading informational texts and literature. Public speaking will be integrated into the language arts and social studies curriculum. Listening and speaking objectives will be comprised of oral reports, reciting poetry and impromptu speeches. Students grades will reflect their ability to listen to their classmates' ideas during discussions and presentations. Listening objectives also include listening to audio presentations such as podcasts videos or student created recordings.

Class Expectations

Students need to arrive to class on time with needed materials. Technology will be used; therefore, computers will need to be charged each night at home. Students will be writing often in a spiral bound writer's notebook. Homework assignments need to be recorded in the student planner and are expected to be turned in the following day unless otherwise stated. Homework will also be

posted online. Late assignments and will receive half credit. In lieu of faulty technology, paper and pencil created assignments are accepted and expected.

All assignments and assessments will be given a numerical point value. Grades are determined by the total number of points earned divided by the total number of points possible. Percentage of points earned translates to a letter grade in accordance to the scale stated in the handbook.



Language Arts 7/8 Mr. Peter Kelly pkelly@ashmi.org

Course Description

Language arts and social studies are taught in an interdisciplinary block. Major strands in language arts include reading, writing, listening, and speaking.

Language Arts 7/8 class builds upon student's prior knowledge acquired in previous grades at Sacred Heart. Students work to develop their reading, writing, and listening skills through the study of multiple genres including; short stories, novels, poems, folklore, and both fiction and non-fiction. Language arts shares an inner-disciplinary block of time with social studies and public speaking. This allows students to connect with subject material in multiple ways. Reading will include a balance of easy and challenging books with a primary emphasis on comprehension, critical thinking skills, and reading attitude. While reading class novels, students will learn about conflict, character development, point of view, and theme. Students are expected to read independently and will be assessed with regular book presentations. Vocabulary study is drawn from the social studies text, class directed reading, and the, "Some Words," skill builder. Students in Grades 7 and 8 learn public speaking in a variety of formats including; regular presentations of the books which they have read independently. Students research and write reports which dig deep into subject matter, write poetry relating to personal experience and/or classroom subject matter, write essays relating to current events, and learn to summarize their critical thoughts and analysis. Students learn spelling skills and strategies through Rebecca Sitton's, "Some Words." Language usage is regularly taught in mini-lesson format.

Course Description

In Math Course 1/2, students will use their previous knowledge of whole number operations to develop an understanding of ratios and rates, division of fractions and rational numbers, including negative numbers. Students will also work to understand algebraic expressions and to solve one and two step equations. Class members will develop their ability to think statistically by learning about measures of center and variability (mean, median and range) as well as understanding and creating data displays (box plots, histograms and dot plots). Finally, students will build an understanding of geometric concepts including area, surface area and volume.

Course Description

- Students earn 10 points per class period. Two points will be deducted for the following reasons: tardiness, gum/food, failure to have materials, bathroom breaks and behavior/effort.
- After-school performances are valued at 100 points and school day performances at 50 points. Students will receive 0 points for an unexcused absence from a mandatory

performance. Excused absences require written notification from a parent <u>two</u> weeks prior to the event and merit 85 points. In most cases there will be a written assignment for an excused absence. Emergency situations will be discussed on a case by case basis.

- Inappropriate dress at a performance merits 90 points.
- Misconduct during a performance merits 60 points.
