- Do you promise to be caring and solve problems in a positive way?

Looking into the eyes of 5 year olds to 13 year olds, and asking for their commitment to these questions is quite a humbling experience. All our students inherently want to keep this promise—they are sincere and honest in their answers. The best part of my day is when I am in the classroom with our students. Working with young people is so refreshing and energizing as they tend to be raw and transparent in their answers. We do reiterate again that Southridge Junior School is a safe place to grow and develop. Through the process of growth, it is inevitable that young people will make mistakes. We believe in starting this journey with a promise indicating that they will 'try'. Then, if a mistake is made, we can redirect back to their promise and know that a moment of growth has occurred for them. Candidly, these young people at Southridge have well developed characters, and we do know them to be respectful, honest students. We are just helping them to be their best—and it is an honour to witness their growth and developing maturity by making a commitment to this promise.

This evening is important in that our teachers have some very specific information about how their class is organized and the routines that are in place. The format will be as follows:

7:00 – 7:10 p.m. - Introductory Meeting in Junior School Great Hall –Mrs. Middelaer will introduce specialist teachers and present a brief overview of our programme. Mr. Anderson will briefly touch on Schoology and school communication.

7:10 - 7:40 p.m. - Formal presentation by class room teachers in your child's homeroom. Please be on time for this as our teachers have a lot of information to convey, and will be as efficient as they can in presenting. We highly recommend that if parents have 2 or more children, they attend the session of the youngest child.

7:40 – 8:00 p.m. - Mix and Mingle in classrooms- if you did not get to attend the formal presentation in one of your children's classrooms, please visit that room during this time. This time is designed to be less formal, and the teachers can provide you with any handouts that you missed. However, it is really important to make that connection with the teacher. Specialist teachers (music, French, PE and art) will also be in the Great Hall at this time for a chat or visit.

8:00 p.m. – Dismissal- Everyone will depart to their respective families, teachers as well.

#### **Cops for Cancer**

On Friday, October 27, 2013 at 10:45-11:15 a.m. Southridge School is honoured to be a stop on the last leg of the 'Cops for Cancer' Tour de Valley. A team of over 20 emergency response workers whom have been cycling for many days and will make a stop at our Junior School before they proceed on to other destinations. The purpose of their cycling trek is to raise awareness and funds for children's cancer research. The team will speak at our assembly that morning, and cycle through our great hall before they resume their journey. It is a casual day that day so let's welcome them in a sea of *blue and yellow* which are the theme colours of their 'Cops for Cancer 'ride. Students may use temporary hair dye, and are encouraged to wear as much blue and yellow as possible. Temporary tattoos will also be provided for the cause. Parents are welcome to come and cheer on this team and support their efforts to raise funds for cancer research.

#### **Head Lice**

This is the time of year when head lice can become an issue. Lice do not pose a serious health risk, but they are unpleasant and a nuisance to deal with. Contrary to popular thought, lice actually prefer clean hair, and although they <u>do not</u> jump, they are spread by head to head contact, or shared items. We strongly urge our students not to share brushes, hats, barrettes and other items that come close to the head. We also suggest that parents check their own children at least once a week. If you are aware that your son or daughter has head lice or nits, it is essential, and our expectation, that this information be communicated to the school. Treatment for lice has improved and we need to eliminate the possibility of head lice spreading. Once we have received information from the parent, and the child has been treated, we ensure the child is clear of lice before they return to class. Our goal is provide the best learning environment for all our students, whilst maintaining the dignity of the individual child. Thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

#### Junior School Terry Fox Run is this Friday!

Terry Fox was a British Columbian who had bone cancer in his right leg; it was so bad, he had to get his right leg amputated. Terry was so sympathetic for the other cancer patients while he was in the hospital that he decided to run across Canada to raise money for cancer research. He trained by running every day. To start his run, he dipped his right leg into the ocean at St. Johns, Newfoundland. He called the run "The Marathon of Hope," and he ran the equivalent of a marathon every day for 143 days until he had to stop near Thunder Bay, Ontario. Unfortunately, the cancer had spread to his lungs and he died less than a year later back home at Royal Columbian Hospital. His hope was that others would continue to run in his name and to help all of those people in the world who suffered with cancer.

Southridge is hosting their 17th Terry Fox Run this Friday, September 20th. The Run will happen on school grounds, and our Grade 7 students are excited to host the event again this year. We will start with a short assembly after lunch, and then the Run will begin about 1:30 PM and go until end of day. You should bring your own water bottle, wear your house colours, and run as many laps as you can. You will also earn points for your house team for every lap you run. Family members are welcome to join us that afternoon, and freezies will be available to Junior School students at the end of the Run. Please bring a minimum \$5.00 donation and hand it in at homeroom before this Friday.

Keep in mind we are running to cure cancer, so remember Terry's spirit and let this be our best Terry Fox Run ever!

#### Grade 3s Learn about Special "Surfs Up for Autism Event"

Friday, September 13<sup>th</sup>, I had the pleasure of introducing an inspirational guest speaker, Dennis Nerpio, to the grade three classes. Dennis spoke about his personal experience of having a child who lives with autism and some of the challenges that his son faced, including social struggles, sensory and communication issues. The Nerpio family was inspired to create a surf camp for children living with autism after a family trip to Tofino. Dennis, an avid surfer, placed his son on his surf board and found he had an immediate connection with the ocean and surfing. Dennis described how he would never forget the smile on his son's face that day. Inspired by his son's incredible connection to surfing and the ocean, Dennis and his family decided to take action to share this experience with other families. He reached out to Rip Curl and Harmony House to help him achieve his dream. Together they planned for over year and found sponsors and volunteers to help. He described how the community of Tofino rallied around his family to help make his dream happen.

In 2012, the first Surfs Up Event – A Day to Hang Ten for Children and Families living with Autism started with twelve families. The 2013 Event doubled in size and included a young girl who was blind as well as having autism. Along with Rip Curl, Harmony House, and the community of Tofino, they provided volunteer surf instructors, behaviour interventionists and consultants to support the children, equipment and wet suits, and even supplied medals at the end of the day. Dennis described how the whole community came together to support these amazing children and how it was a life changing experience for not only the children, but all involved in the event. His story was a great example of the innovation that can come from challenging personal experiences and of people joining together to take action.

#### Senior School News

#### **Senior School Code of Ethics**

This week during our Monday Assembly, our Head Boy and Head Girl, Harris Wong and Serena Bonneville unveiled our newly refreshed Code of Ethics in Senior School. They adeptly showed the changes and explained the collaborative process that allowed these to be completed. In this week's Long Advisory on Thursday, each Advisory will fulfill a promise to abide by this code for the year. I wanted to use my Wednesday submission to give some further detail to you about this important aspect of our School.

Historically, the original Code of Ethics was created by the students to give a framework and an agreement on how students would act as members of the Senior School at Southridge. This was done through a collaborative practice a number of years ago that allowed every student the opportunity to be a part of this creation and through the process, helped to instill a responsibility and ownership to abide by it. However, the last of the students involved in this process had graduated and we felt that it was important to ensure that the current students felt the Code was relevant to them during their time as Senior School students. So, we felt an opportunity to 'refresh' the current Code would help in this regard. We felt, however, that we should begin with the current Code as a framework to respect the efforts that the past students had made.

Each Advisory group was surveyed to ask whether the five main ethics: respect, integrity, compassion, honesty and responsibility still resonated with them along with the descriptors that help to further explain these ethics. In addition, the students were asked if there were any other 'ethics' that were missing from this group and to submit these. We then had grade representatives, the current and future school captains and the Advisory Committee (faculty) meet to analyze all of the this data. From this process, a smaller group met to edit the current Code and bring back a drafted and refreshed Code for approval by the students through the representatives. As you can see it was a very collaborative process and allowed each student in the Senior School a chance to have real input.

I found it very interesting to see what changes the students made and, as usual, they continued to show me that youth are incredibly intelligent and capable of amazing insight! They felt the five ethics should remain and did some tweaking to the descriptors especially in areas where the student body gave feedback that there was either redundancy or lack of clarity. However, most of the student body felt overwhelmingly that there was a missing ethic to which they added: perseverance! To help explain this, the students added these five descriptors.

#### Perseverance means to us:

- Showing determination
- Having the courage to overcome obstacles
- Following your passion
- Being resilient and bouncing back after failure
- Fulfilling commitments

Current research in education shows that perseverance (studies have used the terms resilience and grit as well) is a vital skill to have in learning and success beyond high school. Our own students (and your children) showed that they already realized this importance and felt that they needed to ensure that it was on the Code they abide by! I couldn't be prouder of the students and feel it shows they are keenly aware of what will give them success in terms of character.

Finally, during this Thursday's Long Advisory, the students will sign a large poster of the Code of Ethics that will be posted in their Advisory location. In addition this year, the students will sign a pledge found in their Student Handbook that promises they will uphold this Code. They will sign it, their Advisor, their parents and finally I will sign each student's pledge. It was very apparent throughout this whole process that the students take great pride in their Code of Ethics and the importance of each student's responsibility to live by these ideals.

I also wanted to ensure that Senior School parents are aware of our Mini School Night on September 25<sup>th</sup>, 2013 beginning at 6:30 PM and take advantage of this great opportunity. You will be able to meet your child's teachers and Advisor and hear about the courses that they will be involved in this year. This is always a highlight for parents and I urge you to attend if at all possible. I look forward to seeing you there! Have a great week!

#### **New Cases of Measles in Fraser Health**

Since August, there have been four confirmed cases of measles across the Fraser Valley. Measles has been circulating in the Abbotsford/Chilliwack area for likely the past two months. More recently, cases have also been identified in Burnaby and Surrey, which means the risk of exposure to measles is more widespread.

#### Why is Measles a Concern?

Measles is a serious infection caused by the measles virus. Measles can cause severe illness and complications such as pneumonia, brain damage, blindness, and deafness. Among the most serious potential complications is brain inflammation (encephalitis), which occurs in approximately one in 1,000 cases. Approximately one in 3,000 cases will die from measles.

#### What are the symptoms of Measles?

People infected with measles have symptoms of fever, cough runny nose, and red and inflamed eyes. These symptoms are followed by a rash, which starts first on the face and neck, and spreads to the chest, arms and legs, and lasts at least three days. Spots may also appear inside the mouth and look like small grains of sand on a red base.

#### How is Measles Spread?

Measles is a very contagious disease. It spreads easily through the air when an infected person breathes, coughs, or sneezes, and can survive in the air for several hours. An infected person can spread the measles virus even before they know they are sick, and can spread the virus from four days before their rash until four days after their rash.

#### What should you do if you/your child develop(s) symptoms?

If you or your child develops a fever and cough or other symptoms that may be measles, you or your child should stay at home and keep away from others who may not be immune. You or your child should be examined by a doctor. It is best to call ahead so that you or your child can be seen quickly and not expose other people by sitting in a waiting room for any period of time.

#### **Protection**

The most effective protection against measles is two (2) doses of MMR (Measles, Mumps and Rubella) vaccine after one year of age to all those born after 1957.

If you or your children have not received 2 doses of measles vaccine after one year of age we encourage you to contact your Family Physician or local Public Health Unit to book an appointment. The vaccine is also available at some local Pharmacies and can be given there to adults and children over five years old.
