Southridge Grit

I tend not to get too caught up in buzz words. And when it comes to education, getting caught up in buzz words and buzz changes can easily steer a school in all sort of unpredictable directions ultimately affecting its overall success. That is why I find it somewhat ironic that a big reason for the success of our school can best be described by the word "grit"... one of today's educational buzz words.

Recent research in psychology has identified the influence of grit in determining success. By grit I mean the ability to focus on a specific goal and to stick with it for years despite distracting influences, tough times and failures. Tenacious, dogged perseverance in the face of adversity is grit. Grit is not another word for work ethic, and it is not just about commitment. Interestingly, grit is a better predictor of success than having a special talent or scoring high on a battery of aptitude tests, be they academic or otherwise.

Of course, to demonstrate grit, you first need to be clear on the goal or the purpose of what it is you should be concentrating on. When it comes to schools, there's a plethora of programs and initiatives to get excited about and set your sights on. Unfortunately, schools (and the education system in general) are notorious for jumping from one initiative to the next without a clear goal or a well-defined purpose – despite the exceptionally hard work of talented teachers and caring administrators.

Southridge is different. The purpose of Southridge is crystal clear – to make a difference in the world. Making a difference has been our goal since day one. We have stuck with it for close to two decades – even when the lure of other "hooks to hang our hat on" may have seemed really attractive and other independent schools may have been going down a different pathway.

The secret to our success at Southridge isn't to be found in a special talent or a measured aptitude that is necessarily higher or better than other schools. It is not defined by how we measure up. No, the secret to our success is in our character. Turns out, the buzz around grit actually helps us make a difference in the world.

Reflections of LEW (Leadership Experience Week) for You!

This will be my third straight Wednesday submission about our SS Leadership Experience Week (LEW). I realize that this is somewhat unique, especially with a dynamic environment such as Southridge. However, I believe this week that we have created for our students is such a positive and beneficial experience that it demands such time.

Often, when we communicate activities, such as the beginning of a Provincial tournament or an event that is upcoming, we try to show the reasons and excitement for its inclusion in our program. My first Wednesday submission explained the 'why' of our LEW experience. However, we can forget to follow-up with this initial explanation and not include a 'during' or 'after' explanation. Hence, my Wednesday submission from-the-field tried to give a feel for what the week was like for our students in the moment.

As the title implies above, I wanted to give a final reflection upon the completion of this highly successful week. From my vantage point during the week, which mostly connected with our current Grad Class, there were so many positive aspects to the experience. First an foremost, the week away from classes allowed the students to speak with professionals in careers of interest, visit Universities to see what programs might interest them and finally, an opportunity to spend quality time together as a class deciding on how they wish to leave their legacy in June.

But it was so much more!

I was able to experience the kindness of this group as they supported each other in activities such as a high ropes course. Share a great deal of laughter with and hear aspirations of these intelligent youth and difference makers in their clear ability to communicate. In each new venue or location we visited, I watched their character and attitude impress and win over the people they were interacting with in a natural and positive manner!

Upon my return to school on Friday, I learned about similar stories that had occurred with our Grade 11's during their Restorative Action workshops, the Grade 10's and their myriad of service opportunities in which they immersed themselves and our Grade 8's and 9's taking advantage of all that Strathcona Park Lodge had to offer. I know that many faculty members came away from these experiences having gained new insights into the students they teach and like me, they were inspired! It was a pretty positive experience for most of our students.

In some cases though, and perhaps this was the case with a student under your roof, the experience had some rough edges to it. As I asked a few Grade 8 students on Monday how Strathcona was, their response was a bit more mild. While I always hope that each student's experience is wholly positive, this is not possible or realistic. However, sometimes these rough experiences are even more important learning experiences. As our long canoe trip participants can attest, they now have a shared experience of making it through some pretty impressive rain. And even a few days after they have finished some students were seeing this as learning what they are capable of accomplishing in tough conditions.

The well-known cognitive psychologist Eleanor Duckworth said that, "Learning is messy." That the route towards a person's understanding of an idea is not often uniform and organized. They sometimes will go backward before finding the way forward. I think our LEW experience allows students to be a little more 'messy' as they experience their learning by trying and perhaps taking a calculated risk while they are supported by those around them — peers and teachers alike. In a 2012 Commencement Speech to the Harvard Graduate School of Education Ms. Duckworth commented that, "I have found that helping people learn involves allowing time for messing about." It is through this that students can think about what they know and what question they wish to ask next to help them make sense of new information.

Finally, I tried to ask students to take their experiences from this past week and continue to build the momentum that they had created in themselves. Just because the environment is not on a canoe trip or in service learning they can use the methods in which they learned in their English or math class. I did say; however, that it still will likely mean they need to work hard! I shared two quotations with the students to attempt to explain my thinking and I will do the same here. The first is from a favourite musician of mine, Dave Matthews about momentum and the second is about opportunity from one of the most famous inventors ever.

"If I find something I like, I'll chase it and see what comes out the other side. Once a song gets momentum and gets away from you, that's a good sign." ~ Dave Matthews

"Opportunity is missed by most people because it is dressed in overalls looks like work" ~ Thomas A. Edison

Reflections on Leadership Experience Week - Southridge Students Shine in Restorative Action Sessions

Our recent week of experiential learning opportunities across all grade levels was masterfully organized by Mr. Daryl Weaver and fully supported by our energetic and committed faculty. It really was a team effort from students, staff and parents alike and tapped into the rich layers of talent and expertise that we are fortunate to have in our community. The Career day, orchestrated so elegantly and efficiently by Ms. Livingston, was further testimony to the capacity within our school and the reach of our wider networks.

There are many stories emerging from the week: stories of 'daring do' on the high ropes course, of patience and diligent service to others in many community settings, of self-discovery and learning in new and challenging environments. So much to celebrate, but my reflections are on the three days I spent with Grade 11 students in their restorative action workshops.

The students were respectful, engaged, and active learners in all aspects of the three day course, which on the opening day involved a lot of sitting and listening, but when given the opportunity to get involved and lead they didn't look back. I was struck by their level of sophisticated responses and questioning, and by their ability to lead the small group interactions as they practiced what they had learnt. Other teachers also noticed their comfort in speaking and directing these dialogues and I was really "blown away" by the consummate ease with which they engaged each other in thoughtful conversations to achieve mediated solutions. They were quick on the uptake, articulate and accomplished in leading the discourse, confident and compassionate in manner. Watching them work was, in a word, impressive.

On reflection I believe that the work we have been doing with the student-centred, discussion based learning approach is paying dividends. For me the restorative action workshop provided overwhelming evidence of our students' increasing confidence and capacity to assume positions of responsibility, to think creatively, to reason quickly, and to communicate clearly and empathetically. It was a really rewarding, and humbling, experience to see these young people working together, demonstrating effective problem solving techniques and using such nuanced communication skills. Bravo a tutti!
