Remembrance Day Assembly

Our full school Remembrance Day Assembly for Grades 3 through 12 will take place on Friday morning at 10:15 AM. Remembrance Day is an important subject for Canadians because it marks the anniversary of the official end of the World War I hostilities (November 11th, 1918). At Southridge, we are proud of our tradition of gathering as a school community to pay tribute to the Canadian men and women who have served our country in armed conflicts and peace keeping missions.

I would like to invite parents and grandparents to join us at Southridge for our Remembrance Day Ceremony. Our program will include student readings and performances (concert band, brass ensemble, choirs, bagpipes and trumpet) as well as a special address by Mr. Frank Leighton. Mr. Leighton was born in Norwich, England in 1919. He grew up in Britain between two World Wars and felt torn between his anti-war instincts and a desire to restore the injustices of a world crumbling under the threats of three European dictatorships. He signed up for the British Royal Air Force in the Air-Sea Rescue Unit. In the dark days of 1941, he found himself caught up in a life and death battle in the narrow seas between Sicily and North Africa on the islands of Malta. There he experienced living for a year and a half under near daily attack surviving on ever-shrinking food rations. His job on an Air-Sea Rescue patrol boat was to pick up downed airmen from the Mediterranean while dodging enemy fire from ships and aircraft.

After the war, Mr. Leighton graduated from Imperial College, London, in civil engineering. He emigrated to Canada, settling in Vancouver where he enjoyed a successful international career as a consulting civil and marine engineer. He published his experiences from WWII in his book "Frayed Lifelines, A Siege Survivor's Story." Mr. Leighton is the grandfather of Ian and Sean Leighton, current Grade 10 students at Southridge.

Our school community will pause during our assembly for 2 minutes of silence at about 11:00 o'clock, in keeping with the traditional practice of thoughtful remembrance. We hope you will be able to join us in the Senior School gymnasium on Friday morning. I would like to remind you that our students will be entering the gym in silence as they assemble. Please also keep in mind that we will not applaud or recognize our performers and speakers during the program.

Mr. McInnes will live video stream our assembly. If you have family members who cannot join us due to sickness or mobility complications, they will still be able to watch and experience our ceremony by going to our home page and clicking on the button to the video stream. Finally, I respectfully ask that you remember to send a small donation with your child to school on Friday so that Southridge can collectively support our veterans. All students will be wearing poppies during the ceremony – provided through Southridge – and we would very much like to make a donation to the Canadian Legion representing one dollar for every student, teacher and staff member at Southridge.

I am looking forward to seeing you at our Remembrance Day Assembly on Friday.

Junior School Swim Team - Calling All Swimmers!

The Junior School swim team will be starting on Friday, November 15th, 2013 for MYP and Friday, November 22nd for all Grades 3-7 and runs until January 31st, 2014. I would like to invite all students in Grades 3 to 7 who are interested in swimming and competing at all the swim meets for their specific grade. Practices will be on Fridays, 3:45-4:45pm at the Surrey Sport and Leisure Complex on Fraser Hwy. Each swimmer needs to be comfortable and confident in deep water and have taken swim lessons up to level 5. This means that your child is able to complete 25 meters of freestyle (front crawl) and backstroke, and learning to dive.

Our swim meets this year are: Sunday December 8th at St. George's school (Grade 3 - 7), Monday January 20th ISEA Jamboree in Victoria (Grade 3 - 5 only) and February 6th is the ISEA Invitational Championships meet (coach invites swimmers Grade 3 - 7). All swimmers are expected to attend all swim meets at their grade level.

PYP Parent Information Night - Wednesday, November 20th, 2013 from 6:00 - 7:30 PM

Being part of the International Baccalaureate community, it is important for parents to be active participants in their child's learning. This year, several members of the PYP faculty will be hosting 2 sessions for parents on various areas of the Primary Years Programme. These sessions are meant to create an awareness of the programme, provide a forum for networking and dialogue, and provide tools and ideas on how to support your child's learning in the home. The two presentations will take place simultaneously and you will have an opportunity to choose the one that best suits your needs.

Session One: Inquiry and Inquiry Units in the PYP Classroom (presented in previous years)

Target audience: new parents to the PYP and for those who have not attended this session before

Venue: Junior School

- What is inquiry?
- How do I support my child to become an inquirer and a thinker?
- Why is inquiry important in the PYP?
- What is an inquiry unit?
- What is a central idea?
- What are lines of inquiry?
- What is a transdisciplinary theme?
- What can I do once I receive a note from my child's teacher about the new inquiry unit?

If you have been wondering about these questions, please join us on Wednesday, November 20th from 6:00-7:30 PM in the Junior School for a parent information session on inquiry and inquiry units. This session will highlight what inquiry is, why it is important, and the process used in exploring a unit of inquiry in the classroom. This session will enable you to gain a greater awareness of the transdisciplinary themes covered in each grade and provide you with techniques on how you can support your child in the home. The session will be hands-on and discussion based.

Session Two: Enhancing Your Child's Understanding Through Concept-based Learning (a new session)

Target audience: Parents who have some experience with the PYP

Venue: Junior School

- Why is my child not learning just facts anymore since they are important? That's how I learned.
- What is concept-based learning?
- What are key concepts?
- How do I ensure that my child remembers and uses what he/she learns?
- How is the new ministry curriculum moving to concept-based learning? How does this affect Southridge School?
- Why is concept-based learning so important?

- What is transdisciplinary learning or transdisciplinary themes?
- How do I encourage my child to be a thinker and an inquirer?
- How do I ensure that my child is connecting to the central idea?

If you have been wondering about these questions, please join us on Wednesday, November 20th from 6:00 - 7:30 PM in the Junior School for a parent information session on concept-based learning and understanding. This session will address the questions above and will present ways that you can strengthen your child's thinking and understanding. The presentation will also be hands-on and discussion based.

In order to allow us to prepare for the sessions appropriately, please send an email to your class mom by Thursday, November 14th and indicate what session you are interested in. Your class mom will forward the information to Ms. Ramji-Motani who will ensure that you are registered for your session. We are hoping to have about 30 - 35 participants in each session and promise you an informative evening with opportunities to network and interact with fellow parents and teachers.

Senior School News

Remembrance Day Relevance

As we approach another Remembrance Day, there is often discussion of this important date and whether or not its relevance is still present for students. Through articles in blogs and other media sources, many wonder if a student just sees this day as a holiday and fail to make a clear connection to the creation of a "Remembrance Day". While I can appreciate this perspective and understand that there are fewer people that can fully understand the sacrifices that so many soldiers and families made during war, I don't agree with this sentiment. I believe that this day continues to be extremely relevant in our society and we have a responsibility to ensure that young people today understand why this is so. At Southridge we provide the opportunities to help our students reach this type of understanding.

On Friday, November 8th from 10:15-11:15 AM, the school produces and participates in a Remembrance Day ceremony that includes guest speakers, readings, videos, musical selections, and time for reflection to understand the reason we must remember why this day is on our calendar. In fact, in speaking with a number of students and faculty this week, I am reminded that many of them see this assembly as one they look forward to the most in the year. Paraphrasing their various comments, it is due to its uniqueness and the respectful reaction it brings to everyone that participates in it. We are dressed in our Number 1 Uniform and enter with quiet and thoughtful respect so that we may absorb the messages that the various parts of the ceremony impart.

In our curriculum, and especially in the Social Studies 11 class, students look at major world conflicts and all of the ramifications that they have brought to life following war. Often times, faculty teaching these classes will bring real people into focus to help see the difficulties that the great wars had on regular people such as us. In addition, the current conflicts that are occurring in the world and the Canadian presence in these from a military and peacekeeping point of view continue to show that we are still seeing soldiers and families making enormous sacrifices to help maintain equality and peace in the world.

The final opportunity provided to our students is an amazing Battlefields Tour that just occurred this past summer. Twenty-five students and 3 faculty organized by Mr. Dale Kurylyk had the opportunity to visit 8 different gravesites and battlefields across Europe. At each site, the students were given time to visit the graves, museums and talk to people about these events from the past.

Other tour experiences involved donning the clothes of the soldier and walking in the stifling heat while bearing a heavy pack and other items of a regular kit in order to understand what it might have felt like. Or, to learn details about a particular soldier's life and family and then have a chance to see the actual gravestone of this person and take a rubbing of it to have as a keepsake.

Lastly, our Junior School students created Canadian flags with messages of what they were thankful for. These flags were then placed at a number of Canadian gravesites by our Senior School students while on the tour. Throughout the trip the students kept journals and took photos to reflect on their thoughts during the experience.

To arrive back at the question of relevance one only has to speak with the students and faculty that went on the Battlefields Tour. In fact, when I asked them to articulate the experience and how important Remembrance Day had become, many had a difficult time due to the emotions that it brought up. Even though the tour was nearly 5 months ago, the impact it had on them was significant. As one student said, to be there standing in an enormous graveyard and see the numbers of soldiers killed was something that they felt deeply and an image that they won't soon forget! They understand the purpose of this important day set aside to remember these men and women that sacrificed so much.

If you are able to attend our ceremonies this year, you will hear Battlefields participants reflect on their experience. In addition, our Battlefields participants will be speaking to our prospective parents and families as they tour the school at Open House on Wednesday.

Enjoy the week and help keep this day reflective by sharing personal experiences that connect with Remembrance Day with your family. I am certain that your children will be interested and find it very relevant.

Bidder Alert! Limited Edition Elvis Presley Fender Kingman Guitar – Signed by Canadian Music Icons!

Here is a sneak peek at one special item that will be available for bid at the ONE Gala. It is a limited edition Fender Elvis Presley Kingman guitar and it has been signed by some music legends of the Canadian music scene. Canadian musician signatures on the guitar include:

- Brian Adams
- Michael Buble
- Sarah McLachlan
- Jann Arden

The signatures were gathered and the guitar was donated by Bob Rock, a Canadian Rock Producer, who is celebrated for his producing talents and credited on multi-platinum selling albums ranging from heavy-hitting metal rock to pop and adult contemporary, Bob Rock has been a fixture in the Canadian music industry and coveted producer for international superstars. He has produced and engineered albums for Aerosmith, Bon Jovi, Cher, Metallica, Mötley Crüe, The Cult and Bryan Adams to name a few, and most recently produced this year's JUNO Award-nominated album, *World Container*, for Canadian rock legends, The Tragically Hip (Universal Music Canada). Bob began his music career as an original member of the 80's rock band, The Payolas, and has won seven JUNO Awards to-date.

Here is Fender's description of this fine guitar: *Fender hails the King of Rock 'n' Roll and transports you back to 1967 with the introduction of the Elvis Kingman acoustic guitar-a sharp looking, rich-sounding, hip-swaying evocation of the*

freewheeling Fender acoustic that Elvis Presley wielded with consummate cool in '67 cinematic romp Clambake. In addition to honoring the King, the Elvis Kingman dreadnought also recreates Fender's famous mid-'60s "Wildwood" finish, in which living beech trees that provided the backs and sides of the unusual instruments were dyed in several elegantly striking colors before being harvested. Highly distinctive features include Presley's signature on the front of the Wildwood-style headstock, solid spruce top with scalloped X bracing for full and resonant tone, laminated Wildwood-style back and sides, Ivoroid neck and body binding, stylish dual checkerboard rosette, maple neck, 20-fret rosewood fingerboard with block position inlays and bone nut, Fender "Viking" rosewood bridge with cream-colored pins and compensated bone saddle, chrome hardware and gloss neck and body finish.

Everything you ever wanted to know about pumpkins:

- Pumpkins are usually orange but can sometimes be yellow, white, green or red.
- The name pumpkin comes from the Greek word 'pepon', meaning 'large melon'.
- Pumpkins have thick shells which contain pulp and seeds.
- Scientifically speaking, pumpkins are a fruit (they contain seeds) but when it comes to cooking, they are often referred to as vegetables.
- Pumpkins are usually shaped like a sphere (ball).
- They vary in weight but an average sized pumpkin might weigh around 13 pounds (6 kilograms).
- Giant pumpkins can be grown for competitions, with some weighing over 1000 pounds! (450 kilograms). In 2010, the world record was 1810 pounds! That's huge!!
- Pumpkin plants feature both male and female flowers, with bees typically being involved in pollination (the transfer of pollen).
- Over 1 billion pounds (450 million kgs) of pumpkin are produced in the US every year.
- As a food, pumpkin can be baked, roasted, steamed or boiled.
- Pumpkin soup is popular, as are roasted pumpkin seeds.
- Pumpkin pie is a sweet dessert that originates in North America and is traditionally eaten during harvest time and holidays such as Thanksgiving and Christmas.
- Pumpkins are popular decorations during Halloween. A carved pumpkin illuminated by candles is known as a 'jack-o-lantern'. The tradition is believed to have come from Ireland, where they used to carve faces into turnips, beet and other root vegetables as part of the Gaelic festival of Samhain.
- 100 grams of pumpkin produces around 26 calories of energy.
