No matter the outcome, or who secured a spot on the team, these young men should be proud. I witnessed a level of camaraderie among these boys as they bonded through these tryouts. Although playing in a competitive setting, they were cheering each other on, and giving encouraging hoots or hollers when anyone scored a basket. In sport, the outcome, although important, is secondary to the commitment and heart with which you play. I am so proud of these grade six and seven boys. Playing with heart, with odds not necessarily stacked in your favour, demonstrates true determination and character. Lessons learned in sports often translate to lessons we learn in life. Being part of the International Baccalaureate community, it is important for parents to be active participants in their child's learning. This year, several members of the PYP faculty will be hosting 2 sessions for parents on various areas of the Primary Years Programme. These sessions are meant to create an awareness of the programme, provide a forum for networking and dialogue, and provide tools and ideas on how to support your child's learning in the home. The two presentations will take place simultaneously and you will have an opportunity to choose the one that best suits your needs.

SESSION ONE: INQUIRY AND INQUIRY UNITS IN THE PYP CLASSROOM (presented in previous years)

Target audience: New parents to the PYP and for those who have not attended this session before

Venue: Junior School

- Why is inquiry important in the PYP?

This session will highlight what inquiry is, why it is important, and the process used in exploring a unit of inquiry in the classroom. This session will enable you to gain a greater awareness of the transdisciplinary themes covered in each grade and provide you with techniques on how you can support your child in the home. The session will be hands-on and discussion based.

SESSION TWO: ENHANCING YOUR CHILD'S UNDERSTANDING THROUGH CONCEPT-BASED LEARNING (a new session)

Target audience: Parents who have some experience with the PYP

Venue: Junior School

- Why is my child not learning just facts anymore since they are important? That's how I learned.
- What is concept-based learning?
- What are key concepts?
- How do I ensure that my child remembers and uses what he/she learns?
- How is the new ministry curriculum moving to concept-based learning? How does this affect Southridge School?

- What is transdisciplinary learning or transdisciplinary themes?

Learning from The Wizard of Oz

This past weekend, I was fortunate enough to attend the Broadway production of *The Wizard of Oz* with my family. If you had a chance to attend as well, you will know it was a fantastic show full of those wonderful songs and evoking memories of the book and movie. Upon reflection, it also had me thinking about learning!

Bear with me as I set this up a little to help explain how we can use this story to remind ourselves of what is needed to learn effectively. I am also going to assume that most of you are aware of the story, but if you are not, please forgive the brevity. When Dorothy lands in Oz, and she wishes to find a way home, she is sent along the Yellow Brick Road to see the wizard. Similarly, we all travel a path of learning – our own road of sorts. In her travels, she meets those three wonderful characters: the Scarecrow, the Tinman and the Lion and each is also looking for something they don't have. Ultimately, they feel like going to see the wizard with Dorothy to receive these 'lost' items is a good idea. For the Scarecrow, this is a brain; the Tinman, a heart; and finally, the cowardly Lion wishes to find some nerve.

Once they go through many trials and tribulations to ultimately receive these gifts, they are disappointed to find the wizard is not really the special man that they thought who can grant these wishes. However, he does wisely show them that their actions along the journey should explain that they have always had these things within them and he helps them reflect to see how this is true. He also gives each of them an artifact to acknowledge they do have these characteristics – a scroll for the Scarecrow, a heart to pin on the Tinman and a medal of courage for the Lion. And, for Dorothy, she had always had the power to send herself back to Kansas through her ruby red slippers.

How does this story relate to our students and children learning in general and more specifically at Southridge? Well, I know that in speaking with the students they often think they need something they don't have in order to be successful. The age old, "I'm not good at that subject" comes to mind. But it is true that you need brains (we all have one!), heart (character) and nerve (the ability to risk-take) in order to learn. Our Senior School Educational Program (SSEP) focusses on these key points to provide the opportunities to challenge our thinking and take risks while developing strong character. In the story, it took helping another person or the environment for them to be able to "find" their ability to be successful. At Southridge, we provide a safe and engaging environment for our students to be able to learn. For some this might be simply the opportunity. For others this may be more nurturing to help build their confidence that they do have what it takes to be successful.

We also try and give students those artifacts like the three characters received from the wizard. This could be a kind word of encouragement, a Most-Improved athletic award or maybe something like earning a place on the Board of Stewards. This helps them to continue to feel confident to build on their existing knowledge.

Finally, the story reminds us that we need others to help us reach our potential – without the other three people, I wonder if each of the characters would be successful in finding their "lost item? The focus our SSEP has on collaborative, discussion-based learning helps to promote this important aspect in one's learning.

Finally, we will always feel there is a "Wicked Witch of the West" somewhere along our journey. To think that learning or life won't be filled with pitfalls and difficult moments is impractical. But to reflect on how to overcome these obstacles and to remain positive and persevere is key. Perhaps the next time your child faces his or her "witch" you can draw on the story of the Wizard of Oz to help!

Senior Boys' Soccer 2013 Season

The Senior Boys Soccer Team capped off a successful season with a 5th place finish at the "A" Boys' Provincials held November 6-8th in Abbotsford. This was a bittersweet culmination to the season as the team left Abbotsford with a 4-1 record, but was hampered by the injury and absence of 3 key players down the stretch. The 5th place was truly a team effort, even from the boys who were injured (Amit, Azwa) coming along and bringing a positive spirit to the pitch for every game. The team featured 11 new players from last year's provincial team including three grade 9 student-athletes. Despite the low number of returning players and grade 12's (3), the Storm was the Fraser Valley League champions with an undefeated record.

The training program was augmented this year by mental training classes with Sport Psychology consultant Niki Lacey as well as early morning strength and conditioning sessions led by Mr. DiPietro. The team has just barely scratched the surface in these two vital components of high performance.

The short season poses a real challenge to teambuilding and roster consolidation. The grade 12 group of Nick Collett, Tim Stephens, and Aaron Basi led by example and fostered a very inclusive team atmosphere. In speaking to Mr. DiPietro and Mr. Sterelyukhin, we agreed that this was one of the most enjoyable coaching experiences we have had and is a credit to the attitude and effort of the entire team.

In many ways, the 2013 season was a transition year for the program as 2014 will have a high number of players returning and great potential going forward (and backward, if we use our support players and switch play through the backline....). There is cause for further excitement as the school will be offering a Soccer Tour to Spain for the boys in the spring of 2015. More details will be forthcoming shortly on this amazing opportunity.

A special thanks to Mr. Sterelyukhin and Mr. DiPietro for all their hard work both on and off the field to support and develop the team and the soccer program in the senior school.

Southridge Café Menu for the Week of November 18th – 22nd Everything you ever wanted to know about potatoes:

- Potatoes are vegetables but they contain a lot of starch (carbohydrates) that make them more like rice, pasta and bread in terms of nutrition.
- Much like rice, wheat and maize (corn), potato crops are an important part the world's diet.
- The word potato comes from the Spanish word patata.
- Potato plants are usually pollinated by insects such as bumblebees.
- Potatoes contain a variety of vitamins and minerals.
- There are thousands of different potato varieties but not all are commercially available, popular ones include Russet, Yukon Gold, Kennebec, Desiree and Fingerling.
- While the role of genetic modification is up for debate, research has led to genetically modified potato varieties that have potential benefits such as increased protein and resistance to viruses.
- Based on 2010 statistics, China is the leading producer of potatoes.

- Potatoes don't store very well after purchase but they are relatively easy to grow.
- Potato storage facilities are kept at temperatures above 4 °C (39 °F) as potato starch turns into sugar and alters the taste below this temperature.
- Potatoes are prepared and served in many different ways, including boiled potatoes, mashed potatoes, baked potatoes, French fries and hash browns.
- French fries contain a lot of fat so don't eat too many!
- Potatoes are usually served hot, but sometimes cold in the form of potato chips or potato salad.
- Despite health concerns, potato chips are one of the most common snack foods in the world with billions of packets being consumed every year.
- One of the main causes of the Great Famine in Ireland between 1845 and 1852 was a potato disease known as potato blight. The shortage of potatoes led to the death of around 1 million people who were dependent on them as a food source.
