What a fun night at Southridge! On behalf of the entire Southridge community, I would like to thank everyone who attended our annual gala this year. A special and big thank you goes out to our gala co-chairs, parents Karen Dosanjh and Krinder Rai. They put together a wonderful night and their efforts are highly appreciated by all of us. I'd also like to thank Jennifer Smith, Nancy Hutton and Maria Flather who put in countless hours for the kids art projects.

At Southridge, one of our four defining pillars is a genuine commitment to service – service to each other and to the wider community. We see this happen often at Southridge through the relationships we have with the many organizations and communities we support, both locally and internationally. #### **CELEBRATING!**

"There is no such thing in anyone's life as an unimportant day" ~Alexander Woollcott
"The more you praise and celebrate your life, the more there is in life to celebrate" ~ Oprah Winfrey

I began my Monday Assembly remarks with a "*Peanuts*" Cartoon. This particular one had Snoopy sitting upon his red doghouse with his typewriter (remember those in schools?!) and saying, "Sometimes when you are a great writer, the words come so fast you can hardly put them down on paper..." The next frame has him staring

blankly at the typewriter. The final frame has him repeating the word "sometimes..." while looking very distressed. Sadly, on some Monday's this is how I feel with my impending Wednesday submission coming! For this particular week, however, it wasn't the topic that had me perplexed but how to best expand on it and try to clearly explain the idea. As you can see from the title above, my topic is celebrating and the seed of this idea came from a number of places, both personally and from my experiences at school. Perhaps the beginning of this idea came from the wonderful news last year that my aunt, Jocelyn Palm, had been awarded the Order of Canada! This coming Friday marks her celebration at Rideau Hall in Ottawa where the pomp and circumstance of receiving the award occurs. My mother will be travelling with her as her special guest. However, my mom wanted to have a party for my aunt in Toronto, where she lives, afterwards on the weekend. When she first brought forth this idea, my aunt wasn't very keen about the idea, wondering who would want to attend. As my mom persisted and asked some friends and family (who quickly accepted the offer!) my aunt began to warm up to the idea and now is quite excited to have this event. I am fortunate enough to be able to attend as well and I am excited to be able to share in this wonderful accomplishment of a family member I very much admire. It also got me thinking about the topic of celebrating in general.

Over the past few weeks and in my capacity of Head of Senior School I have had the privilege of sitting in some amazing classes that have occurred. A few math classes I observed in particular had the students discussing a number of problems assigned for homework and really working hard to find the solutions together. It wasn't easy and, as the teacher facilitated their efforts and discussion, the students stuck to it for over an hour. In the end, I truly believe that every student understood how to solve these particular problems and use this knowledge for future problems. As their principal, I honestly felt like cheering and clapping for this effort. It was inspirational and made me proud of the class' perseverance, but they weren't nearly as eager to feel this way when I tried to celebrate this. Why? This got me thinking more about celebrating...

Added to these two pensive events is my continued frustration that can sometimes occur during our Senior School assemblies during the year. As many of you will know, we have some pretty amazing students here at Southridge who do some amazing things. In my opinion, this is a description of ALL of our students! We like to acknowledge these great accomplishments and often ask the students to come to the front of the Great Hall. Usually, this is met with a look of terror and a begging of "please don't make me!" As a compromise, teachers will simply ask students to stand up at their seats but they will stand up and sit down so fast that it is hard to even ascertain who participated. Why do adolescents have such a hard time celebrating these great accomplishments in front of their peers when they often represent such dedicated and committed effort? The last piece of my topic arrived on last Saturday morning. After a lengthy illness with dementia, my father-inlaw passed away. As you can imagine, there is a great deal of sadness with this news and he will be dearly missed. Obviously, there is so much more that I could write about this single event; however, within the context of my topic, his life can certainly be celebrated. He was a wonderful role model and man! He was incredibly kind and thoughtful and always had time for the people in his presence and accepted them for who they were. I will always remember him as a great listener and those that were fortunate to spend time with him always came away feeling that they were valued and special because of the focus and attention he gave to them. How do we ensure we can celebrate all of the ways people impact our lives in such positive ways and how can we use their example to pass this on to others around us?

I told the students after expounding on these thoughts that it was important to celebrate and I used the two quotations found at the top of this article in order to give further context my assertion. Celebrating an accomplishment helps to make it meaningful for us and creates momentum to move towards new goals and challenges. It gives us confidence! Even little successes need to be celebrated – not in the same manner as bigger ones but still with a sense that it is acceptable and important to do this. This could be finding the solution to a problem, making sense of lab data, getting a scene just right in drama, or just simply making it through a tough day. I encouraged the students that the next time they came up to the front of an assembly to enjoy their moment! And I asked the students to please help those people to enjoy the moment by clapping and making them feel special.

Here were a few other ways I encouraged them to celebrate:

- Singing O Canada strongly and proudly at assembly (this doesn't always happen very well!) Celebrating the wonderful country in which we all live!
- Attend a home game even if it means maybe calling your parents to ask if they can pick you up a little later, especially a playoff game. Celebrating the students and coaches that have worked hard to represent Southridge.
- Attend productions, movie nights, winter concerts or student initiated service events such as Mini We Day. Celebrating effort and commitment and great ideas initiated!

I tried to sum it up into one word: SPIRIT!

It seems these days that some of these important accomplishments go uncelebrated and we want to try and acknowledge that celebrating is an important part of learning and life and that it is perfectly acceptable to do! I encourage you to help your child(ren) try to find these accomplishments – both big and small and together, celebrate them! You just might see me cheering them on, too! In fact, as they left the assembly I played Kool & the Gang's song, Celebration! "Celebrate good times, come on!"

Enjoy the week and I look forward to sharing my celebration in Toronto with you in the future.

Our 4X50 free mixed relay team made up of Melissa Liu, Isabelle Lei, Karl Rumm and Tony Ma placed 6th while Melissa placed 7th in her 50m free race. The top eight swimmers in Melissa's event were all within less than a second of each other. The highlight of the weekend came at the very end of the day on Saturday in an extremely exciting 4x50 girls free relay.
