Head of School

When there is an Emergency

Your children's safety is our number one priority at Southridge. As such, we regularly practice fire, earthquake and lockdown drills throughout the school year. From time to time, a real incident occurs and, due to our regular practices, we are able to respond in a calm and rational manner. Thankfully, our real incidents have not been catastrophic; however, when we are not in drill mode, and despite our composure, we tend to react to these real situations in slightly different ways than we do in a drill. As a result, we often notice small adjustments we can make to help improve our emergency response procedures.

A few weeks ago, the RCMP advised Southridge of a potential threat in the area due to a report they received of suspicious activity. Our school responded by enacting a lockdown, which remained in effect for approximately 12 minutes. I am very happy to report that the exercises we have practiced for lockdowns paid off extremely well. All of our students were safe and accounted for, the school was effectively secured in a very short period of time and the communication between our Junior and Senior School buildings was excellent.

Within an hour after the RCMP advised Southridge to lift the lockdown – incidentally, the reported suspicious activity was not considered a threat – we met with our teachers and staff to debrief the situation and to gather their feedback. The next week, our Risk Management Committee met to discuss the feedback we received from our employees and to consider ways our school can implement their ideas, which resulted in some modification to our emergency response protocols. For example, we will now use our electronic communication system in future cases of real lockdowns to ensure that our entire community is made aware of the situation.

Our electronic communication system distributes pre-recorded messages via email, voicemail and text. In the future, our pre-recorded messages will notify parents when a lockdown begins and when it ends. Keep in mind that because the messages are pre-recorded and stored in our database, they will not give details about the lockdown. However, Southridge will inform parents by email of the lockdown particulars once the event has ended. In addition, and depending on the situation, we will do our best to keep parents apprised of developments while the lockdown is taking place. These updates will only be distributed via email, though, as we will not be in a position to send texts or voice messages during a real lockdown situation.

I would also like to take this opportunity to remind all of our parents not to contact the school during a lockdown because we will need to keep our phone lines open for communication with the RCMP. It likely goes without saying, but please do not to come to campus during a lockdown. As part of our lockdown protocols, we will not be able to allow you entry into our school buildings; besides, it would be unsafe to visit campus if there is a real threat in our neighbourhood.

Senior School News

Safety is a Priority

Over the past few weeks I have noticed as I complete my daily parking duty at the end of the day, that it would help to remind everyone of the route and routine we have in place for you to pick up your children from the Senior School. In addition, as the weather becomes more winter like (read wet!) along with the daylight receding more quickly, it is important that we ensure we are making safety the most important priority during this time.

To review, if you are picking up or dropping off a Senior School student, please be certain to enter the school from the gate where the traffic light is located. Travel along the roadway around the turf field and towards the Senior School building. You will note that there are two lanes. The lane closest to the fields is designated as a waiting lane. This doesn't mean that we wish you to stop and wait in this lane, but if you plan on waiting on either side of the through lanes once you have arrived at the School, please remain in this lane. The 'inside' lane is a through lane and should only be used if you plan to drive by the school or if your child is ready to "jump" into the car right away. You may loop around the commons area if you wish to remain in the through lane, but please do not stop and wait for a parking stall or an area of the wait lanes to open up.

Once you have turned the corner towards the Senior School, the roadway splits into three lanes. The centre lane remains the through lane. The two outside lanes allow you to wait (only when they are free) for your child to come. If there are no openings here, please wait patiently in the outside waiting lane by the field.

I have noticed that some cars have tried to turn into the waiting lane furthest away from the building from the through lane often when there is not enough room for the entire car to get into the waiting area. As a result, the through lane becomes blocked and this completely stops traffic. Please do not attempt to do this. You may see me walk over to this area to wave you on and I ask that you respect our procedures to ensure an efficient pick up.

As a final thought, please remember that at 3:00 p.m. we have over 600 students being picked up at both schools. Although the time it takes is only roughly 20 minutes, there is a reality that this will take some time even with the most efficient plan in place. Driving cautiously and with a heightened sense that many students are walking out on the roadway to get into cars will help immensely to ensure we are keeping our important people in our community safe. This is especially true on those raining afternoons when the light is dimmer and the windshield can be less clear. I also note that often students try to run to their cars to stay dry!

Reporting Student Marks to Post Secondary Institutions.

Grade 12 can be an anxious time for both students and their parents. Ms. Livingston, Mr. Weaver and I have been talking to our grade 12 students to advise them of the best procedure for ensuring that their marks are reported in an accurate and timely manner. The criteria and deadlines for applying to different institutions and programs have become much more varied and complex, as institutions vie for the very best students, and we need to help our students advocate for themselves in an appropriate manner. To this end I have clarified what is, and is not, appropriate in discussing marks with their teachers. Students should not approach teachers directly for additional marks, or ask for extra assignments to generate better marks. They can, and should, ask for help in developing their skills and understanding , attend additional tutorials, work with a peer tutor – all of which may lead to the desired improvement in performance.

I have advised students that if they need to advocate for an increased mark – they are just shy of an average for a competitive program or a major scholarship for example - then the correct pathway would be to go directly to Mr. Weaver or Ms. Livingston. Similarly we would ask that parents follow the same procedure and approach the University Counsellors with any specific requests. Together Mr. Weaver, Ms. Livingston and I would discuss the legitimacy of the request and approach the teachers concerned. Please be assured that, though we must maintain our integrity as an academic institution, we will always work for the optimum benefit of our students.
