The Last Straw

I am not sure if you have noticed but Southridge is an attractive place for seagulls. Dismissal for Christmas Holidays and Return for Monday, January 13th, 2014 - Late Start

On Friday, December 20th, 2013, all students are dismissed at 12:00 noon. At this time, all students will receive their report card. Please do not ask for the report card early, as our policy is not give them out.

Our Christmas break is three weeks this year and please ensure that your calendar is clearly marked for a return date of Monday, January 13th, 2014 (Day 2). Please also note that we have a late start that day and students need to arrive between 10:10 and 10:20 for a start time of 10:25 AM. Please do not bring students any earlier as the faculty will be in meetings and unavailable to supervise.

Holiday Extensions

At this time of year, we want to remind our families about extensions to the holidays as written in our family handbook.

Section 3.3

- 1) "Days in attendance have a direct effect on our government funding. The School does not encourage families to extend holidays beyond the designated dates. Three weeks at Christmas and two weeks at spring break along with the ten weeks of summer allows a full fifteen weeks for family holidays. Adding additional days to these holidays is disruptive to the learning process for the students involved as well as those attending classes since cooperative learning through group work and projects is a regular feature of our instructional program.
- 2) Should families choose to disregard this advice, we require a letter for the student's file indicating the dates that students will be out of school. Our annual attendance is audited each year for the purpose of determining government grants. These letters should be directed to the Head of Senior School or Head of Junior School. Families who extend holidays should not expect teachers to plan ahead or make extra efforts or special arrangements to accommodate such absences. Depending on the extent of these absences, it is quite possible that students' marks may be affected."

An Attitude of Perfection vs. Excellence

I wanted to touch on the topics of perfection and excellence this week. Looking at these two ideas comes partly because the Term 1 reports will be coming out later next week and partly due to some really encouraging happenings that have taken place in a number of classes I have observed over the past weeks. By no means is this meant as a comprehensive look at either subject, but rather as a reminder of how these two words are used in schools and learning and how they are often used synonymously (wrongly, I believe) with each other.

As our Term 1 reports are being culminated over this week and next, the focus often moves to the percentages that are on these reports. These grades are a representation of where a student's particular level of achievement is at a certain time – a snapshot in time. There are a number and a variety of assessments that help to inform the teacher as to how the student's learning is progressing in a particular course. Our goal is that every student is successful, has shown a strong achievement and improvement over the term. This is different for each student and it is important to look at how a student's standing has changed from their own a term before. However, I wouldn't want to state that we hope that a student is perfect in this regard. Let me elaborate to explain this thought.

Having an attitude of being perfect can cause a student to move away from many successful traits towards maximizing their learning. Someone whom looks to be perfect actually becomes cautious and often doesn't want to do something until they are perfect at it. In essence they become risk-averse in terms of trying to answer a question or thinking critically. A view to perfection causes a person to feel they need to be in absolute control. This can cause the student to become incredibly hard on oneself and lose perspective of growing and making progress. Every result is never good enough and even when a person has had exceptional success, they are disappointed! Finally, this attitude can cause a person to be focused on the numbers and how to push to get one more mark – not on the learning but rather on the 'trick' to get the grade.

The word excellence is often used synonymously as perfection, but doesn't imply the same thing at all. At a recent seminar I attended, the terms were compared and here is how they explained the difference. Perfection is only being right; excellence is a willingness to be wrong. Perfection is fear; excellence is taking a risk. Perfection is doubt; excellence is confidence. To have an attitude of excellence allows a student the confidence that taking a risk in trying to solve a problem and being wrong is the opportunity to see where they are in their learning. As I have stated before: learning is messy. It needs an attitude of acceptance to 'get down and dirty' in one's challenges and be okay when we stumble and fall. It gives a student the confidence that they will be supported and has an environment that lets them show their imperfections and desire to work towards improving.

In my observations of classes over the past number of weeks, I am seeing students embracing this notion of excellence. As they put up a math problem that was attempted the night before, they state that they got to a certain point and now they need help moving forward. In response, their peers and teacher help them work through the block and they are able to see the solution and hear the explanation to be able to apply it to a new problem. In another class, a student asks for clarification to a statement so that they are clear in their understanding rather than remain silent in the fear of others knowing they don't "get it". This lets them add to their existing knowledge and be able to be ready for the next concept to

learn rather than being confused and causing the next piece of content to not make sense. In each of these examples students were taking an attitude of excellence. They were incredibly focused on doing well and learning efficiently but without the worry of perfection and getting it right every time.

The Senior School faculty continues to remind students to let them know when they don't understand. They work extremely hard to build an environment of safety to do this in their classes. This is one of the benefits of a student-centred discussion-based approach to learning. It allows continual opportunities for students to check their understanding during the class and to seek clarity immediately. I ask you to continue to encourage your child to strive for excellence and not perfection. Allow them to make mistakes and let them know it is acceptable; to look for the opportunity for learning in the struggle. In their future, an attitude of excellence will lead to success in any post-Secondary institution they attend and also any field they wish to explore.

Though this wasn't the way school was for many of us, research shows that this practice maximizes one's success.

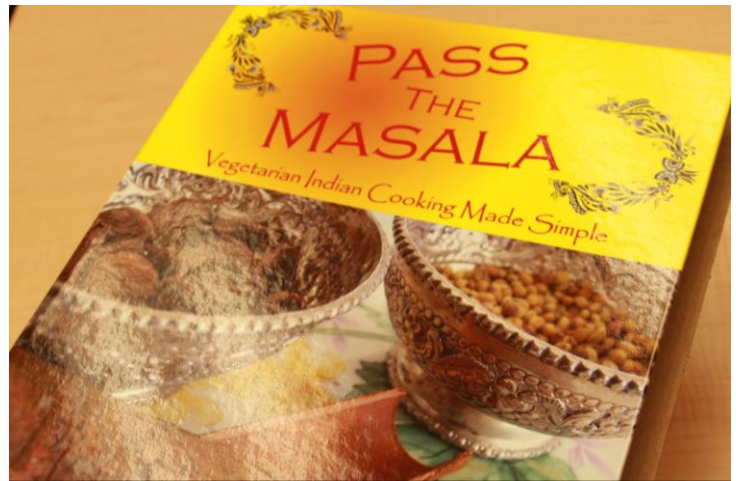
