#### Thinking and Learning at Southridge

Over the past few weeks I have visited over 130 classes in our Junior and Senior Schools. When I am in classrooms, I am constantly impressed by a number of things, not least of which is the interaction between our teachers and students. I am also captivated by the level of cognitive thought our students demonstrate. For those of you unfamiliar with thinking "levels", it is generally accepted in educational practices that there are six levels of cognition, or reasoning: knowledge, comprehension, application, analysis, synthesis and evaluation.

Classroom interactions, discussions, activities and questions that engage students in the "higher order" skills of analysis, synthesis and evaluation (that is, critical thought) are considered more challenging than skills of knowledge and comprehension. Higher order thinking stretches our students in their ability to develop meaning because the skills involved not only assume knowledge and comprehension, but they also require a more sophisticated ability to make associations and connect concepts across subject disciplines to formulate judgements and draw conclusions based on evidence and a set of criteria.

During my classroom visits, I see this kind of higher order thinking happening throughout Southridge – from Kindergarten to Grade 12 and in virtually every subject area. Regardless of the subject and/or grade level, though, what I have noticed is very little higher order thinking happening in isolation. From what I have seen at Southridge, higher order thinking more often happens in group settings where students are sharing their understanding, explaining their ideas, critiquing one another's methods and supporting each other in developing a more robust conceptualization of subject matter and the world in which they live.

Our third guiding principle at Southridge states that contribution is at the heart of what we inherit and what we pass on. Passing on learning through contributions of thoughts, ideas, opinions and questions in a collaborative, discussion-based classroom environment is something that happens at Southridge every day. And I am proud of our students for their contributions in that regard.

#### **Upcoming Christmas Concerts**

#### Dismissal for Christmas Holidays and Return for Monday, January 13, 2014 - Late Start

On Friday, December 20<sup>th</sup>, 2013, all students are dismissed at 12:00 noon. At this time, all students will receive their report card. Please do not ask for the report card early, as our policy is to not give them out.

Our Christmas break is three weeks this year and please ensure that your calendar is clearly marked for a return date of Monday, January 13<sup>th</sup>, 2014 (Day 2). Please also note that we have a late start that day and students need to arrive between 10:10 and 10:20 for a start time of 10:25 AM. Please do not bring students any earlier as the faculty will be in meetings and unavailable to supervise.

#### **Holiday Extensions**

At this time of year, we just wanted to remind our families about our rationale about extensions to the holidays as written in our family handbook.

#### Section 3.3

"Days in attendance have a direct effect on our government funding. The School does not encourage families to extend holidays beyond the designated dates. Three weeks at Christmas and two weeks at spring break along with the ten weeks of summer allows a full fifteen weeks for family holidays. Adding additional days to these holidays is disruptive to the learning process for the students involved as well as those attending classes since cooperative learning through group work and projects is a regular feature of our instructional program.

Should families choose to disregard this advice, we require a letter for the student's file indicating the dates that students will be out of school. Our annual attendance is audited each year for the purpose of determining government grants. These letters should be directed to the Head of Senior School or Head of Junior School. Families who extend holidays should not expect teachers to plan ahead or make extra efforts or special arrangements to accommodate such absences. Depending on the extent of these absences, it is quite possible that students' marks may be affected."

#### **Grade 2 Action to Support Education for Girls**

It has been very rewarding to watch such young children become both aware and concerned about the need for many girls around the world to access education. Their research skills were also most impressive as they quickly identified reasons for lack of access and suggested helpful plans to provide schooling. Most noticeable was their expressed appreciation for their own education. Through October's Casual Day, student-initiated action outside of school, and a grade project to make and sell popcorn and bracelets, the grade twos raised a total of \$1,185.45. This amount will be donated to the Malala fund at <a href="https://www.malalafund.org">www.malalafund.org</a>. It is wonderful to see such action arise from their learning.

#### Head of Senior School Nelson Mandela

"What counts in life is not the mere fact that we have lived. It is what difference we have made to the lives of others that will determine the significance of the life we lead."

"Those who conduct themselves with morality, integrity and consistency need not fear the forces of inhumanity and cruelty."

— Nelson Mandela

There is no doubt that you heard the news of Nelson Mandela's passing late last week and while this is in part due to the amazingly wide network that is the media today, it is more due to the extraordinary impact that he had on a global scale. Over the past number of days and the literally thousands of articles, stories and reflections written about this amazing man, I wanted to add one more as part of my Wednesday submission. I do want to begin by stating that this is just a sliver of the immense impact and obvious effect that he has had to so many. However, I couldn't help but see how some of the wisdom that Mr. Mandela imparted connects so perfectly to Southridge.

If you go to the Nelson Mandela Foundation webpage, you will find a number of quotations that he made over his long life. Just looking at the different places and groups to whom he spoke is quite the testament to his wide reaching effect. One such quote is the one found above on making a difference. As I read this, I couldn't help thinking it was really what our school's mission statement endeavours to accomplish. During our Senior School assembly this Monday I touched on this fact. I did clarify that I wasn't thinking that each student's goal should be to make a mark like Nelson Mandela's (although if they could I certainly support them in trying to reach such a height!). But if you read his quotation carefully, he encourages people to judge the significance of their life on helping others. If we focus on this fact, then the number of people we help isn't the qualifier, but more so to the focus we take on helping in general. I told them that I was going to put this quotation upon my office door to help remind me where my goals each day needed to rest.

The second connection that I made with the school in reflecting on Mr. Mandela's life was on the importance we place on character development and the obvious importance it had in his message. As Mr. Stephens so often states, that along with knowledge one must have goodness. In looking at all of our educational programs at Southridge, the development of sound character is extremely important to us in the development of the students' education. Nelson Mandela's quotation above struck me as a reminder of this very fact. Another one of his famous quotations is, "that a good head and good heart is a formidable combination!"

I finished the remarks of my assembly with a few reflective thoughts about this remarkable human being. I share these below:

- I wonder how many people's lives have been touched by the life of this single human?
- In our lifetime, will there be another person that has such an effect?
- I feel blessed to have been alive during his lifetime!

I encourage you to share your own reflections and personal impact that this man had on you to your child(ren). Seeing how the people we care about and look up to are affected positively by people's impact teach to an effect that few other ways

can reach. I, for one, have felt a renewed sense of reason for trying to make a difference in the world as a testament to his life.

As former British Prime Minister John Major so eloquently wrote about Mr. Mandela. "He had an enormous personal presence, but it was not created by power or position; it was created by the sheer force of his character."

#### Reports out later this week

On Friday of this week, your child will be bringing home their Term 1 report. This is always a "big deal" for the students and I know that we all place importance on these formal reporting times. I encourage you to review these carefully with your students at home and please read through the comments as well as the grades. The teachers and I are always available to communicate with you about any question or concern you may have. Over the final week of school, a good plan would be to set some goals for Term 2 with your child. These could be about a specific course, overall approach such as organization or effort given. I ask you to then share these with the teachers and Advisor so we can help to support in reaching these over the Winter Term.

## Debunking myths about Oxford interviews

OXFORD applicants are being asked to outline the difference between the words "lie, deceive and mislead" and explain why humans have eyes, as part of the university's notoriously tough interview process.

The university is increasingly relying on interviews to encourage students to think rather than "recite specific facts or answers".

As the deadline to apply to Oxford passed, the university.

which regularly receives more than 17,000 applications for around 3,500 places, released a series of sample questions to debunk well-worn "myths" about the interview process.

In the past, students applying to study biological sciences were shown a cactus by one academic and told: "Tell me about it."

Students attempting to get on to a biological sciences course were also asked: "Ladybirds are red. So are strawberries. Why?"

Other questions include:

"If you could save either

reefs, which would you choose?" – zoology interview;
□ "Why do you think an English student might be interested in the fact that Coronation Street has been running for 50 years?" – English literature interview;

This follows a surge in the number of applications from students living outside the UK who do not take A-levels.

Oxford has seen a 62 per cent rise in applications from outside the UK since 2008, from 3.378 to 5.409.

Mike Nicholson, head of admissions at Oxford, said of the sample questions: "Interviews are designed to give candidates a chance to show their real ability and potential, which means candidates will be pushed to use their knowledge and apply their thinking to new problems in ways that will both challenge them and allow them to shine."
