'Tis the Season

This is the season for concerts and performances at Southridge, and I hope you have had (or will take advantage of) the opportunity to see one or two of our many Junior and Senior School performances. For those parents who have students in both schools, you may very well have seen all of our music students perform – right from Kindergarten to our Senior Concert Band. I have been lucky enough over the years to see the variety and diversity of our musical talents and creativity at Southridge, and I have observed a few things about the importance of music at Southridge along the way.

First of all, music at Southridge is important because it places our students at the centre. From an educator's perspective, student-focused and experiential learning opportunities act as a cornerstone for personal growth and development. Not only do our students learn the skills associated with playing a musical instrument, but they also learn about important elements of good character – perseverance, responsibility, truthfulness, taking risks and working as part of a team. Character development is an essential ingredient to a Southridge education and our music program helps guide our students in their growth as good people.

Second, music at Southridge is important because it develops critical skills our students will need to be successful after they leave our school, whether or not they continue to play a musical instrument or sing. Thinking creatively, collaborating with peers in the pursuit of a common goal, communicating effectively in a variety of ways and critically thinking about contributions are all part of the music experience at Southridge. Analysis, synthesis and evaluation, all of which are high level thinking and reasoning skills, are abundantly evident through music – as they are in all of the arts at Southridge.

And third, music at Southridge is important (to me, personally) because it affects me in a deep way. Rather than using the word “deep” to mean profound in this case, I use it here to describe the level that music strikes me physically. It may sound odd, but when I hear our students sing and I listen to them play there is a space in the core my body that lights up and comes alive. Maybe it happens to you as well, but when this space comes alive for me I feel joy and happiness.

I am so thankful to the music teachers at Southridge – Mrs. Winterburn, Dr. Bospflug, Mr. Burrage, Ms. Parker and Mr. Mitchell. From a purely educative point of view, these teachers facilitate a wonderfully student-focused, experiential and collaborative classroom environment where our students are challenged to learn important skills and develop as people. And in a selfish way, I am thankful to our teachers and students for lighting up that space in me that makes me feel so alive and well. As we step into this winter break and we look forward to enjoying time with family and friends, I hope you have the time to appreciate the beauty of the season through music.

Sometimes life at Southridge does feel like a big canvas, absolutely chalk full of activities and events. Frankly, it is this vibrancy and energy I love about our school, and as I was reading report cards this week, I was reflecting about what our students and faculty have already added to the canvas in just four months.

Academics: Our faculty has continued to meet each month to carefully plan our PYP and MYP programmes. The IBO (International Baccalaureate Organization) sets forth rigorous standards which require continual reflection and readjustment. Beneath the guidance of Shanaz Ramji Motani and Alison Graham, our faculty continues to refine our programme and strive to deliver excellence. We have also sent many faculty members for professional development to IBO conferences in Toronto, New York, Portland, and Vancouver. I was fortunate to attend our first international conference in The Hague, Netherlands with Mrs. Raber and it was impressive to share with educators from Europe, Africa and the Middle East. This ongoing, professional training highlights our commitment to providing the best practices in pedagogy for our students. Further to professional training, several field trips cemented important aspects of our academic programming including: the Grade 6 Qwanoes trip, the Grade 7 Outdoor Education trip, the Grade 4 trip to Grouse Mountain, and the Kindies’ pumpkin patch trip. We celebrated our literacy programme through continued involvement in the AR reading programme, author’s visits, as well as through the enjoyable purchasing opportunity of the Scholastic Book Fair. Additionally, student writing was celebrated through the sharing of the poignant pieces completed for Remembrance Day. Our use of technology is infused into our daily lessons and Mr. Steve Anderson, our Technology Coordinator, has been spending time in all our classes. It is quite endearing to see our 6’5” Mr. A working with our youngest five year old students.

As faculty, we also wish to thank our families for your support of our academic programme at home, through daily prep. We understand that our students are very busy, but your support and alignment of our academic goals provide a strong partnership towards student success.

Athletics: Under the direction of Kirby Gallant, Katie Reid, Megan Fretter and Perry Harder, our students have been offered a tremendous athletic program during this first term. Intramurals have been in place for Grades 4 – 7 and with very active participation. Southridge School has offered the following co-curricular athletic sports: Grade 5, 6 and 7 girls volleyball, Grade 3 – 7 cross country running, Grades 3 – 7 swimming, Grade 5 and 6/7 boys soccer, and we are well

underway with our basketball teams. A special recognition to our entire faculty involved in coaching these clubs; the hours that you have dedicated have been noticed and appreciated. We are especially excited about hosting the upcoming U13 CAIS basketball tournament on January 29 – February 1, 2014 as we host 15 other schools to showcase this great tradition in boys basketball. Thank you to our families who are billeting the players from other schools, and showing our western hospitality.

Arts: We continue to operate a strong arts programme at Southridge School including performing arts, music, and visual arts. Acknowledgement is given to Jackie Reyes, Paul Best, and Allison Redies for providing guidance in our art program and filling our hallways with student masterpieces. We also need to acknowledge the extracurricular choir program offered to our students. Under the direction of Mrs. Donna Winterburn, music exudes from the classroom and Dr. Bessflug, Mr. Burrage, and Mr. Mitchell have produced musicians in our Grade 6 and 7 years. Also important, were the wonderful performances for our Christmas concert for all our students from Kindergarten to Grade 7. In our assemblies, we have been enjoying the diverse talents of our student body. We appreciate our student contributions and the difference that they make in each assembly.

Service: Contribution is at the heart of what we inherit and what we pass on. Southridge students believe in making a lasting difference in the lives of others. Our list of service items this year is impressive and humbling: The Terry Fox Run, the Grade 7 shoreline cleanup, casual days each month supporting a charity, Unicef contributions through pumpkin carving and donations, students making sandwiches for the less fortunate, Food Friday initiative spearheaded by a few Grade 7 girls, the collection of winter clothing for W. E. Kinvig, the Christmas ornaments made in support of G.F. Strong, the popcorn bags and bracelets sold by Grade two students to support fairness in education, the lemonade stand and Jelly Beans for Philippines to help those devastated by Typhoon Haiyan, and ultimately, the food hampers provided by each classroom to Options. The generosity of our community is humbling; the initiative of our students is noteworthy, and the belief of contribution and making a difference in the lives of others, truly resonates with our students.

The aspect of leadership has been underscored through our Grade seven ambassador programme—at this point in the year, all 44 Grade seven students have had a formal leadership role as either a tour, birthday, sports, fairplay, or house captain ambassador. We have also augmented the technology team with a mentoring component, giving Grade seven students a chance to train and mentor upcoming Grade six students. The photo team are capturing amazing images that will also complete our canvas of activities for the duration of this whole year. We are proud of giving our young people tangible opportunities to lead and affect life in their school.

Thank you for a great start to a wonderful year and a promising continuation in 2014.

It Has Been a Very Busy Term!

How Are We Doing? 'Harkness' Update

As we move forward with our student centred, discussion based model, I would like to share a few reflections from two current students, and from a visiting colleague, Andrew Jones, who heads up the Math department at St George's School. Amid the weariness that settles on the school like winter weather at this time of the year, I think these observations breathe light and life into us and allow us to celebrate our achievements to date and reenergize for next year.

Andrew Jones, Head of Math at St. George's School visited Southridge a week or so ago and visited many of our math classrooms. Cam Seib commented that their discussions ranged from the value of introducing Foundations 11 & 12, to our use of technology, to a consideration of our student centred classroom approach. One comment that Mr. Jones repeated over and over again with obvious passion and sincerity was paraphrased by Mr. Seib as follows:

I am completely blown away by the level of mathematical language and discussion being used by your students. Our kids (St. George's) can do all "the stuff" (referring to being able to do the math problems/skills on paper or on a test), but in terms of being able to explain and discuss it, your students are far beyond ours."

Our students, too, have felt the power and possibilities of being immersed in communicative, collaborative, based learning and, in their personal essay submissions for entrance to UBC, have written about it. Sarah Grimm offers a candid and convincing argument for her positive experience with this approach:

At my school a new system of learning has been implemented called Harkness. It is where students come together to collaborate and learn through each other's knowledge, while the teacher facilitates, adding little input. This has been my most significant group work experience because the entire class is a group working towards a better understanding of concepts. It really helped me to break out of my shell more and gain the confidence to talk and express my thoughts. It is an open space to ask questions and give answers, receiving a better understanding of concepts. I have noticed a major difference in not only my grades but my performance in class because theories are explained in terminology that I understand, not a textbook definition but a fellow students understanding of it. This is a really valuable thing for me

because this year I am taking AP Calculus and I get such a stronger grasp on the concepts now that they are explained in words that I can understand and interpret. It is such an open environment to ask questions and learn. This is by far the most significant group work experience that I have ever partaken in.

And Avery Kan, another current Grade 12 writes of his struggles in the AP English Language & Composition course which he took last year:

The class also brings back great memories of working through discussion, collaboration, highs and lows, as we tackled problems, bonding strongly around the Harkness table. Our tight knit class of thirteen fought hard, striving to, not only help ourselves but also our group improve, as we tackled higher level rhetorical analysis and in-class essays. The energy that kept us motivated and experience challenging ourselves will stick with us for the rest of our lives.

Of course, these are selective experiences and we have many students at various grade levels and stages in their intellectual and social development for whom this approach remains challenging. It is challenging for faculty too. The idea of the teacher as the sole purveyor of knowledge imparting his or her wisdom to open eyed, but essentially passive students creates the image for me of a censorious adult pouring thin gruel into Oliver Twist's empty bowl. It is a familiar but not very satisfying image, and it is literally a picture from another time. We are asking our teachers to do so much more today. We are asking our teachers today to lead without dominating the discourse, to facilitate rather than control, to help students to collaborate and communicate, to allow students to participate and gain understanding at their own pace, to discover rather than be told. For me it goes to the heart of what education is about. The Latin root of the word, educere, emphasizes the leading out, and drawing forth that is at the heart of the educative process and I hope that we have begun to shift our practice to create a more vibrant, meaningful and dynamic classroom environment in order to better serve the needs of all our learners.

I believe we are on our way.
