The Arts and their Place in Education

Not so very long ago, there was a time when the arts were considered "soft" subjects – less important to getting a "good" education. The idea was that subjects like art, music and drama were important in helping to provide a well-rounded education, but they lacked the same value attributed to the academic disciplines such as reading, writing, math and science.

Well, have things ever changed. With the growing awareness of how the brain works and the demands facing our economy, creativity and problem solving are now recognized as critical skills for the 21st Century. Without question, the importance of the arts in education has been elevated for many reasons, not the least of which is that the arts provide experiential opportunities for students to pursue reasoning skills well beyond knowledge and comprehension. Time and time again, the arts have provided our students with multiple and diverse opportunities to apply their skills in unique situations, synthesize information and analyze and evaluate their performances, creations and products.

Without question, there is an aesthetic element to art education, and honouring the arts for their own sake as part of our cultural heritage has not lost any value, but it is now evident that the arts are part of, and not separate from, other educational disciplines. Visual art is connected to science, there is a strong relationship between music and math, and elements of the humanities are strongly supported by drama and other performing arts, like the speech arts.

I have always been proud of the arts program at Southridge, and I am thankful for the role they play in the holistic development of our students' minds and skills. The place for the arts in education is right beside the other disciples, not only because they are so much a part of them, but also because they develop important skills to help our students experience success after they leave Southridge. But perhaps most importantly, as Sir Ken Robinson puts it, the arts speak to parts of students' being that are otherwise left untouched.

Board of Governors

I thought it was about time I write something for the Wednesday to provide an update from the Board of Governors.

First, I am happy to report that at our last AGM in November, Wendy Lei was elected as a new Governor. I thank her and look forward to her valued contributions to the Board as we move forward. Also, in last week's Board meeting, Nick Nuraney was appointed our new Treasurer to fill the large shoes of our long standing Treasurer, David Alderdice, who stepped down recently for personal reasons. As many know, Mr. Alderdice was a driving force behind the creation of the school, a founding Board member, a Chair of the Board for several years, and has remained on the Board since its inception, the last several years as Treasurer. The school has accomplished great things under Dave's tutelage and his contribution to the achievements of Southridge will long be remembered and admired. He leaves the Board with all of us understanding the vital role we play in the long term success of the school and in the great importance of each and every decision we make. We sincerely thank Dave for his many years of tireless, and often thankless, involvement in Southridge and wish him well for the future. Now the challenge of essential financial oversight falls to Mr. Nuraney, as Treasurer, and from what I have seen over the past three years working with him, Nick is definitely up to the task.

Secondly, by now many of you will have received the 2014-2017 Strategic Plan document outlining the priorities and key initiatives of our new Strategic Plan, Working to Make Southridge Even Better. I hope you will take the time to review the document so you are aware of what will guide the school over the next few years. Our strategic priorities being programs, accessibility, campus planning, stewardship and a connected community resulted from countless hours of collaborative consultation between board members and school senior management and I would sincerely like to thank everyone involved for their commitment of time, energy and thought into the strategic planning process. From these priorities flow a multitude of key initiatives and action items that ensure we are following the strategic direction set in order to make Southridge an even better school.

Thirdly, and tied to the accessibility priority of our Strategic Plan, by now you are aware of our tuition levels for the next school year. In the independent school realm, a 2% year over year tuition increase is considered incredibly low due to the pressures of constantly increasing operating costs, faculty stepping up annually on their pay grid, and general contractual wage increases (keeping in mind our faculty is paid in direct proportion to the Surrey School District pay grid – hence when there is a contractual pay increase our faculty also gets the same percentage increase.) That being said, the Senior Management and the Board of Governors are acutely aware of our accessibility strategic priority and have, once again, maintained a very tight rein on the budget in order to achieve such a low increase. At the same time, there is a concerted effort to continue to pay down debt and to build endowments to ensure the long term sustainability and financial health of the school. I certainly applaud all involved in supporting this most important strategic priority.

Finally, in keeping with the school philosophy of superior professional development for faculty and staff, I would like to congratulate Mr. Stephens for being awarded a fully-funded fellowship to the Klingenstein Center for Independent School Leadership at Columbia University in New York. He is currently in The Big Apple for this prestigious two week program that is awarded to only twenty heads of school from around the world annually. Quoting from the letter sent to me from the Klingenstein Center, "The Center attracts and selects educators who have demonstrated outstanding accomplishment or potential for excellence and equips them with the knowledge, skill, and values necessary for informed and effective practice." I know Mr. Stephens will return with a wealth of knowledge from this opportunity and I believe Southridge will be the ultimate beneficiary.

We have recently heard news from Ms. Hilary Lehn, Director of University Counselling, that she has decided not to return to Southridge upon the completion of her leave scheduled for August 31st, 2014. Ms. Lehn joined our school back in 2002 and during her tenure, she played a key role and was critically influential in developing two significant programs at Southridge – our admissions program and our university counselling program.

In her role as Director of Admissions, Ms. Lehn ensured that admissions at Southridge was extremely well organized and executed in a very effective manner. During her time as Director of Admissions, Ms. Lehn also advised a number of students in their university application process. Here, too, her background and knowledge of the university application system (both Canadian and American) helped to shape our school in this important area leading to a change in her portfolio of responsibilities and she assumed the role of Director of University Counselling. It's a testament to Ms. Lehn and her many contributions to Southridge that the foundation she created in both admissions and university counselling is still very much a part of our programs today.

On behalf of all of us at Southridge, we would like to thank Ms. Lehn for everything that she has done for our school and we wish her all the best.

Social Studies 8 World Religions Project

Just over two weeks ago I had the opportunity to accompany the Grade 8s on the field trip that forms an integral part of their World Religions project. This project is a wonderful example of how classroom learning is enriched and augmented by this really engaging and meaningful day. It was a beautiful, blue-skied winter morning and we set out early to ensure that we could fit in five diverse places of worship. We began with mass and a personal greeting to our students in the Good Shepherd Catholic Church, moved on to the Beth Tikvah Synagogue and an animated presenter speaking of the importance of the Torah, sat on the floor of the Jamea Mosque and learnt about Islam and its respect for all religions, and completed our fascinating morning at the Nanaksar Sikh Temple. We had to cover our heads and remove our shoes before entering this bright, glittering world. The generosity of spirit that characterized all the places we visited was abundantly clear here as we ate a delicious lunch of curried vegetables and drank the sweet, fragrant Chai tea that is a favourite of mine. I think the lunch was the definite highlight of the day and really allowed us to see this incredible community at work providing spiritual and physical sustenance to all who enter its doors.

Reenergized we completed our tour with a visit to the Buddhist temple, so beautiful in its red and golden colours, and watched as people lit the fragrant incense sticks in homage to the lavish figures of the Buddhas. It was a fascinating day which I, Mr. Shaw, Mr. Dods and Ms. Alexander enjoyed just as much as our students.

I was very proud of our students and their enthusiastic, curious and respectful behaviour throughout the day. If you have not seen it I would encourage you to view the excellent video that Mr. Seib created last year, which explains in detail how this project meets our stated objectives for our Senior School Educational Program; how our students critical reflection and understanding of their own religion, and those of other faiths, will allow them to become more globally attuned citizens. Peru Expedition, July 2015 - Rainforest Conservation Research & Outdoor Education

In July 2015 there will be an opportunity for Grade 10-12 Senior School students to travel up river in the Pacaya-Samiria National Reserve, one of the largest protected areas of Amazonian Rainforest in Peru, contributing to ongoing research in rainforest biodiversity and conservation. The science part of this trip takes place over two weeks, upon a large research boat with several decks containing bedrooms, bathrooms, lecture and dining hall. As the boat travels up river, students are

engaged in Amazonian Wildlife and Conservation courses. During the course students will also get the opportunity to visit a Cocama Indian community. Once moored, students will be engaged in biodiversity monitoring and data collection to contribute to long term sustainability studies. Students will have the opportunity to take part in the following projects: Primate, large mammal and game bird transects, macaw and wading bird surveys, river dolphin transects, fish surveys, and night time caiman surveys.

As a potential addition to this trip, we will spend a third week to hike the Inca trail and visit Machu Piccu. After leaving the Amazon, we will travel within Peru from Iquitos to Cusco, spend 2 days to acclimatize, and then follow a 3-4 day hike along the ancient Inca trial, visiting many ruins along the way, to end in the Lost City of the Inca's!
