From our Junior School, Ms. Middelaer, Ms. Ramji-Motani and Ms. Graham were asked to address the International Baccalaureate cohort in the Faculty of Education at the University of British Columbia (UBC). UBC only recently initiated their IB cohort and Southridge's reputation within the IB community in our province influenced the invitation we received.

Speaking to Faculty of Education undergraduate students is an exciting opportunity for Southridge. It connects us to an excellent post-secondary institution that has the critically important responsibility of shaping the professional outlook, skills, attitudes and dispositions of the future teachers in our province. It also provides Ms. Middelaer with the opportunity to put Southridge on the map for many young teachers who will soon be joining the job market, and as such, the opportunity to speak at UBC will likely have a very favourable impact on our recruitment process later this spring.

From our Senior School, Mr. Palm has been asked to showcase the Senior School Educational Program and the Harkness approach to teaching and learning through the Canadian Accredited Independent School (CAIS). CAIS has very recently developed a unique portal on its website, called CAISConnect, to help provide independent school teachers and educational leaders from across our country with excellent examples of best practice approaches to meeting the challenge of educating students for the 21st century.

The Director of Programs from CAIS recently visited Southridge and noted the commitment our Senior School teachers have made to collectively address the changing dynamic of the educational landscape in a creative way. She thought other CAIS schools could learn a great deal from our approach and Southridge responded by providing background information about the SSEP and links to our website that help illustrate and explain what our Senior School teachers and leaders have dedicated themselves to over the past three years.

Congratulations to Ms. Middelaer, Mr. Palm, their leadership teams and the teachers and staff in our school for the work they have been doing to make Southridge even better!

Our Community Deepens - UBC Connections

Last week Ms. Graham, Ms. Ramji-Motani and I had a wonderful opportunity to speak to a class of teacher candidates (student teachers) at UBC. It was a great experience to be able to speak proudly about Southridge School and how the International Baccalaureate programmes of MYP and PYP are such a perfect fit to deliver our mission and vision to our Junior School students. Just previous to our speaking to this UBC class, on January 30 we hosted 6 student practicum teachers at Southridge for a visit. In May our Senior School will host 3 UBC practicum students, and in June our Junior School will host 3 as well.

After Ms. Graham, Ms. Ramji-Motani and I finished speaking, spontaneously one of the students who had visited our school reported to their cohort that what we said was exactly true about our school. She stated that there is a very unique culture to Southridge - an openness, friendliness, but an absolute professionalism. She openly spoke about anecdotal conversations she overheard in our staff room about teaching and learning and stated that our teachers are very passionate about their craft. She insisted that she had never been to a school like ours, and openly asked about career opportunities.

This open unexpected feedback, of course was welcome, but deep inside, it made me smile. These practicum students visited on one of our busiest days at Southridge - on the opening of the CAIS basketball tournament. However, I watched our teachers embrace these teacher candidates and just immerse them in the Southridge experience. Steve Burrage and Chris Mitchell actually had their teacher candidate playing trombone with them in the jazz ensemble in the gym as Southridge played. Alison Graham took all 3 Junior School candidates under her wing while we hosted the opening ceremonies for the 15 visiting schools. Paul Chiarenza, a known basketball fan, refrained from watching the games so that he could invest time in the English teacher candidate. The modern language teams in our Senior School surrounded their teacher candidate with so many opportunities for learning, and overall they each made an impression and endorsed the reputation of Southridge.

I am acutely aware of my own pride in Southridge, but when I witness the strength of our faculty as they embrace opportunities to mentor others and I hear unprompted feedback from visitors to our school I feel inspired. Southridge just keeps getting better - we are still a young school but as we deepen our relationships with our broader community with partners such as UBC, we will continue to grow and thrive.

Showing Character

In our Personal Growth and Development Program we define character development as follows:

"We believe in the goodness of people and the importance of our relationships with one another. We seek to develop, through experiential learning, the knowledge of what is right and the desire and the courage to do it."

In our Senior School Educational Program (SSEP), not only are there key attitudes such as integrity, honesty and respect but the word 'character' actually surrounds the entire SSEP graphic. It is important at Southridge to build our knowledge, but equally so to develop one's goodness and character. So, whenever I can find a tangible example of showing one's character to share with the students, it helps to make the idea more concrete. These past few weeks, I had not one but three separate examples and want to share these with you. The first two come from an event on the world stage, the final one much closer to home!

The first two came from the Sochi Olympics. If you are like me, it has been hard not to watch the competition continuously! Even those events I am not very familiar with seem mesmerizing as you watch the efforts and focus of the athletes, regardless of country or where they place. The first story centres around Canadian cross-country ski coach Justin Wadsworth. He is married to former cross country ski Olympian, Beckie Scott and an American by birth. As his own athletes failed to make the finals of an event, he was left watching the races without much to do. Near the end of the race, a Russian skier came upon him on the course and he had a broken ski that was in pieces. The skier desperately wanted to finish as it was on his home soil and he was struggling mightily. Without thinking, the Canadian coach leaped over two snow banks and gave the Russian skier the extra ski he was holding. As he said, he wanted to let the skier finish with dignity. The skier finished last in the race but enjoyed finishing strong and with wonderful cheers from many fans. As the Canadian coach explained when asked later about his gesture, "anyone would do this" he said. However, no one else had done so, and the selfless act had a wonderful sense of sportsmanship.

The second example also came from the Winter Olympics and this time had as the central figure Canadian speed skater, Gilmore Junio. Perhaps you heard about this story because of the result of his wonderfully selfless act - a silver medal...for his teammate, Denny Morrison. You see, Gilmore had earned a berth in the 1000m event at the Olympics at the National Championships. Morrison had fallen during the qualification race, even though this was his best distance and he was a medal hopeful for Canada. In looking at the team first and realizing that his friend and teammate should be skating, Gilmore Junio offered his spot for the race. Morrison was overwhelmed by this offer and went out and skated to a silver medal! He even offered to cut the medal in half to show how much he appreciated the gesture.

Finally, the last, and for me the most meaningful example, comes from our own Austin Chang, who is a Grade 12 student in this year's grad class. In a pre-season practice he tore and displaced his left knee meniscus. As a co-captain of the team, he worked hard to try and rehab the knee, went to games, practices and all of the trips, tours and tournaments with the team. His perseverance, dedication and efforts set a huge example for his teammates and this showed amazing character. Last week the team had the last home game of the season and Austin really wasn't ready to play but the coaches wanted to give him a chance to play in his Grade 12 season. They put him out for the last minute of the game. His teammates wanted to give him a chance to shoot a basket for the last time as a Southridge student in competition. It is clear he was a valued member of the team and of our community!

In each of these cases the decisions the individuals made showed their true character. When faced with a decision, sometimes over a long period of time (a whole basketball season), very short (ski coach) or somewhere in between (speed skater), each individual knew the "right" thing to do in showing integrity, respect and empathy.

The best part of all of this is the emotional reaction that comes from these wonderful decisions. People are so supportive when they witness these actions and they value them as priceless! As the saying goes: "People may forget what you did, people may forget what you say, but people will never forget how you make them feel."

It is encouraging to know that developing character is truly important at Southridge and I am continually inspired to see the thoughtful and caring decisions our students make on a daily basis in showing their "true character"!

Anxiety 101: Helping Parents Make Sense of Anxiety

Below is an excerpt for a presentation by Vanessa Lapointe that will occur tonight, Wednesday, February 19th, 2014 at 7:00 pm in the Alan Brown Great Hall for parents of students in Grades 7 to 12 on anxiety.

"About 42,000 children in BC are currently diagnosable with an anxiety disorder. Why? The answers are found in taking the knowledge provided by contemporary neuroscience and combining this with an understanding of how social-emotional development progresses for our children. We will explore in detail where anxiety comes from, what it looks like, and when you might become concerned about anxiety for your child. Finally, we will consider caring approaches to supporting children of all ages struggling with anxiety. Our goal will be to arrive at an understanding of the ultimate answer for finding a way through. An answer that is perhaps the most simple, readily available and affordable answer imaginable..."

Dr. Vanessa Lapointe is a registered psychologist who has been supporting families and children for 15 years. She presently works in private practice and has previous experience in a variety of settings, including the BC Ministry of Children and Family Development and the school system. Dr. Lapointe is a regularly invited professor and educator. She is also actively involved in the provincial community with various initiatives and projects promoting emotional health and development. Dr. Lapointe is known for being a dynamic speaker who brings a sense of nurturing understanding and humanity to all of her workshops. She enjoys presenting to a wide range of professionals and parents throughout Canada. As a mother to two growing children, Vanessa strives not only professionally, but also personally, to view the world through the child's eyes.

Theatre Performance Acting Class Presents Into the Woods

Since September the theatre performance acting class has been working intensely on James Lapine and Stephen Sondheim's 1986 musical, *Into the Woods*. The musical tells the story of our favourite fairy tale characters as they set out on a journey to make their wishes come true. Into the Woods follows the loving baker and his wife and their adventure to lift a spell that a complex and cunning witch has cast on their family.

We also meet Cinderella, a girl bullied by her stepmother and stepsisters, who wishes to go to the King's Festival. Little Red Riding Hood, an outspoken and confident girl, is also introduced to the audience. Finally, we meet Jack from Jack and the Beanstalk; an adorable aloof boy who exchanges his beloved cow for five beans. With various appearances from other much-loved fairy tale characters such as Rapunzel, Snow White, Sleeping Beauty, and Prince Charming, *Into the Woods* is sure to bring audiences the familiarity and joy of all of your favourite childhood friends while conveying the mature morals of the story.

Led by Ms. Kelly, the class has been working endlessly to achieve our goal of a professional theatre production. Having been involved in the drama program since Grade 7, I am personally no stranger to the amount of work that is required to deliver an excellent portrayal of great characters. This year I can say with certainty that the amount of work that we have put into this performance will positively reflect the calibre to which we perform. I would even say that this production is among the most engaging productions that Southridge has executed.

Throughout the year, each person in the class has grown in their own way. People that felt that they could not sing now perform some of the most beautiful and unforgettable songs in the musical. Cast members that also felt that they were weak actors now own the stage with such confidence that can only be achieved with months of practice. The relationships that have grown in our class due to colossal amounts of time spent together are among the strongest friendships I have ever felt. As for the level of acting at which we are taught, I speak for the class when I say we feel honoured to have such an experienced performer directing us.

I encourage all Junior School students to give the drama program a try. In addition, to absolutely abolishing my dire fear of public speaking, it has taught me an enormous amount about communication, interaction, how to critique and analyze, and how real theatre works. As part of our course, we have constructed blogs that reflect us, and our experiences with *Into the Woods*. Great Canadian Olympic Moments

RAY LEWIS

Ray Lewis was the first Canadian-born (Hamilton, ON) black athlete to win an Olympic medal. He won bronze in the 4x400m relay at the 1932 Los Angeles Olympics.





DONOVAN BAILEY

Donovan Bailey is a retired Canadian sprinter, who once held the world record for the 100 metre race following his gold medal performance in the 1996 Olympic Games. He was the first Canadian to legally break the 10-second barrier in the 100 m with a time of 9.84 second.



Lennox Claudius Lewis is a retired boxer and the most recent undisputed world heavyweight champion. As an amateur he won gold representing Canada at the 1988 Olympic Games after defeating future heavyweight champion Riddick Bowe. Lewis is regarded by many as one of the greatest heavyweight boxers of all time.





ROBERT ESMIE, GLENROY GILBERT, BRUNY SURIN AND DONOVAN BAILEY

Robert Esmie, Glenroy Gilbert, Bruny Surin and Donovan Bailey were the nucleus of a formidable 4x100 metre Canadian relay team that won gold at the 1996 Summer Olympics.

JENNIFER ABEL

Jennifer Abel was the first to put Canada on the medal table in London 2012 with 3-metre synchronized springboard partner Émilie Heymans. The pair earned bronze on Day 2 of the Games.







JAMAICAN BOBSLED TEAM - 1988 CALGARY WINTER OLYMPICS

The ultimate underdog story of the 1988 Calgary Olympics was four men from Jamaica competing for bobsledding. These men had very little practice going down a bobsled track and even had to borrow spare sleds from other countries. With the support and guidance from other bobsledders they managed to qualify and compete, inspiring people all over the world to achieve what seemed to be the impossible.





Learning how to ski on an indoor ski slope in Milton Keynes, Ghana's first professional skier Kwame Nkrumah-Acheampong qualified and competed in the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics. Kwame, fondly known as the 'The Snow Leopard', had to overcome many struggles to be able to live his dream including establishing the Ghana Winter Olympic Association and raising the money to compete. Since his debut at the Olympics, Kwame promotes winter sports in Ghana and is working with the government to build Ghana's first artificial ski slope.

"If I don't win a medal then so be it, but if by qualifying for the Olympics I inspire one or two more kids to chase their dreams, that will be good enough for me." Kwame Nkrumah-Acheampong

COMPASS

KIRANI JAMES – 200 AND 400 METER SPRINTER, 2012 LONDON SUMMER OLYMPICS

A 200 and 400 meter sprinter from Grenada, Kirani won the first ever Olympic medal for his country in the London 2012 Olympics. Not only did he receive gold, he set a national record in 400 meters and is the first non-American to break the 44 second mark. After that victory Grenada's police commissioner, James Clarkson, authorized street celebrations with the explanation that "this is to my mind the most important event that ever happened to our country."

"I just go out there and just try to do my best in terms of representing my country in a positive way. As long as I do that, they are going to be proud of me, and as long as they are proud of me I'm happy with that." Kirani James
