Into the Woods

Congratulations to the cast and crew of *Into the Woods*. Ms. Kelly and the Senior School deserve a huge round of applause for the incredible production of this year's musical. With a demanding score, a high level of technical precision and a storyline that took true talent to deliver, our students and teachers deserve high commendation for rising to the challenge and offering our community a fantastic journey . . . *Into the Woods*.

Collaboration, Creativity and Design Thinking

Collaboration and creativity are two important skills that our educational programs address. Often they are approached as separate entities but there is strong evidence to consider how they interact with one another. Creativity is too often relegated to the domain of the arts alone, but in reality there are numerous opportunities to open our students' minds to creative thinking in many other subject areas as well.

In the Junior School for example, MYP students take a course called technology and design. In it they are taught how to apply the design cycle to solve problems and to think in creative ways. When Mr. Anderson plans the projects his students will tackle, he most often establishes them in ways that allow the boys and girls in his classes to collaborate with one another. Collaboration is an important step in the design cycle because it helps to surface creative ideas while taking into consideration a diverse set of perspectives.

In the Senior School the problems and projects set by teachers within the SSEP allow students to think in creative ways as well. Although design thinking is not a specific course taught in the SSEP, the processes involved in thinking through projects such as the catapult in physics and the crystal growing challenge in chemistry require students to collaborate with one another to help surface different ideas and innovative solutions to problems.

Throughout our educational program at Southridge, students engage in these kinds of collaborative, experiential learning opportunities because we want them to work with one another to help stimulate creativity and foster their innovative confidence. When our students discover something new for themselves, even if it is not truly ground-breaking or pioneering, they begin to think like innovators. And when they understand that innovators think creatively across the curriculum - from science to physical education to English and the humanities - they have a better chance to shift their thinking to be more design-oriented.

According to many economists, design-oriented thinking will play a significant role in the evolving world economy where skilled jobs are predicted to continue to go to the "lowest bidder", regardless of geographical location. The innovative forces needed to drive the world in the future, however, will be more available to those individuals who have the predisposition and creative confidence to embrace uncertainty and find comfort in ambivalence knowing that a creative solution is often just a step or two away.

How to Launch Creativity

There has been a great deal of talk lately about the 21st Century Skills required so that our present generation of students will be able to contribute effectively once they graduate. Being able to think creatively is one of those skills that seems current, but as one can see from the above quote, creativity has been valued and appreciated for many generations. In fact, it is reaffirming to note that the mission statement of Southridge School, written over 19 years ago, states that we produce 'creative and independent thinkers' Simply put, creativity is valued and has withstood the test of time.

The real question comes in how to teach or foster creativity at Southridge School. Teaching through an inquiry methodology promotes an atmosphere for creative thought - one where questions are encouraged and strategies to question are actively taught. Additionally, having to contemplate a tangible action piece at the end of each unit in PYP prompts our students to creatively decide how they can make a difference.

This year in our exhibition in Grade 4, rather than an action piece at the end of their unit of study, we are implementing an aspect of design as their culminating activity. This encourages students to build and create something based upon their learnings. In MYP we have an entire course for all Grade 5-7 students entitled "technology and design". In this course, students learn the design cycle and are asked to follow a design protocol in creating many different items over the course of the year. Design is actively taught using the steps of investigate, design, plan, create and evaluate, as the design cycle. Mr. Anderson, as our MYP Technology and Design instructor, would be more than happy to discuss our program with you. In other MYP core subjects, creativity is nurtured through asking provocative questions and ensuring that all concepts are taught with a global perspective. In addition, the students are often asked for an action component which draws on a great deal of creative thought.

Throughout the implementation of our program we are always looking for ways to enhance and foster greater creativity. By attending professional development opportunities, investing time in reading educational journals and articles, and by networking with our colleagues in other settings, we seek to bring the best practices to our students here at Southridge. We do believe that we are working with a generation of young people who are, and will, make a tangible difference in this world. Fostering that creative spirit is one way we can help them grow to do so.



A Creative Learning Week!

Last week I was fortunate to attend the National Association of Independent Schools (NAIS) Annual Conference in Orlando, Florida. It is a very well attended conference - more than 3,500 people - and always has a key theme that runs throughout the conference. This year the theme was "Dare to Explore and Discover". There are always a number of inspiring and engaging key note speakers, hundreds of workshops and the chance to network with other educators from all over Canada and the United States. I wanted to share a couple of key learnings that I took away from the conference in a unique way.

Over the past few weeks, prior to the conference, I was introduced to the concept of Sketchnoting. This specific term is fairly new but what it describes is not. In fact some may actually know it as doodling! Put simply, it is taking notes from a speech, meeting, or lesson by way of sketching words, symbols and drawings to capture the main themes. Unlike taking lines and lines of detailed notes and then returning to the notes synthesize them into concepts, this practice enables the note taker to do both of these things as they take the notes. On a purely personal level, and with my particular challenge of a hearing impairment, sketchnoting seemed to present an amazing solution to the trouble I sometime have with getting down details and listening at the same time.

So, I dedicated myself to note taking during the conference in this form-in a digital form. It was very successful and I wanted to share one page of notes taken from an engaging speaker. Lyn Heward is the current Director of Creation at Montreal's Cirque du Soleil. She has written a book titled: *Spark: Igniting the Creative Fire That Lives Within Us All.* During her key note address I took the sketchnotes below:



I will explain a few points to help make sense of this drawing because the notes were taken to help remind me of the main points of her talk. Some of the points might not make complete sense to everyone.

From the centre image of the sparking fire of creativity leads to the arrow explaining the mission of this amazing company: Invoke (Imagination), Provoke (Senses) and Evoke (Emotions), while always maintaining the human element of a performance. From here you will notice the essential attributes of this creativity, which Ms. Heward termed "the 7 doors of creativity". This is why I have a sketch of a door with a number in front of each key point. There was a story or description that went along with each and I have added these nearby. If you want to hear more about these I will be happy to share! I was able to take away many of her points and connect them to the idea of schools and how we can develop creativity in our students. As you will know, creativity is a key aspect of our Senior School Educational Program (SSEP).

In addition, the ability to reflect and synthesize ideas from texts, speakers and fellow students is a key skill that will enable students to succeed. One way for those more inclined to a visual representation might see merit in this type of sketchnoting. Ironically, there is a creative aspect in the choices that one can make in symbolizing the ideas through words and images.

Again, I would welcome the opportunity to share more about the conference, creativity specifically or the idea of sketchnoting. As I stated in the title, it has been a real creative learning week for me!

As our March break comes nearer, I hope you have a creative week as well.

In Praise of Into the Woods

Last Friday evening I had the great pleasure of attending the Southridge production *of Into the Woods* and I just wanted to comment on the incredible feat of our students and faculty in delivering such complex musical material over the course of five truly outstanding performances. The whole community has been enthralled and amazed by these seemingly simple and well known tales. The production ran so seamlessly from one tale to another, animated by a cast so assured in their lines, notes and actions that we were transported into the rather dark heart of this deep wood, and confronted by serious moral truths and questions. Life, it seems, is not a fairy tale.

But oh the joy in the music! I was in awe of the pace and intricacies of the rhythmic timing, the clever lyrics, and the facility of the cast in sounding all the right notes in their solos and in the dynamic choral numbers. We were treated to some poignant, nuanced acting, characters so changed in their wonderful costumes that we totally believed in them. From the expressive "milky white" to the terrifying, knife wielding grandmother, to our handsome, roguish princes, voracious wolf, and wicked witch these performers mesmerized their audiences. Cinderella danced in dazzling white and the ugly sisters, beautiful actually in their colourful gowns and tall wigs, were deliciously haughty and selfish. Abby Wells and Bryan Redies as the hapless, childless couple underpinned the entire show with their mature, emotionally resonant characterizations.

Equally amazing was the unbelievable technical trickery of some 300 lighting and sound cues, masterfully programmed and orchestrated by Avery Laird and Malcolm Nguyen, who were both absolutely integral to the stunning success of this production. Nick Tennant was the back stage hero and our in-house artistic talent in the persons of Ms. Baransky-Job and Mr. Khera brought their expertise to the creation of Rapuzel's tower and the central fireplace that brought authenticity to the home of the Baker and his wife. Mr. Barnim and Mr. Sterelyukhin are considering a change of career, but I am currently resisting approaches from Broadway agents. They, too, were an invaluable addition to the ensemble.

There is no question that Ms. Kelly set the bar immeasurably high, but to a person the entire cast leapt over it and exceeded all expectation. As I wrote in an earlier email of congratulation, I have taught in many schools in the UK & Canada and I have not seen a high school production that reached this level of professionalism in performance. It was simply the best I have seen. Many, many congratulations to all faculty and students, who gave of their time and energy to bring this ambitious production to fruition.

Finally a heartfelt 'thank you' to the indomitable Ms. Kelly for giving us a show to be proud of and a stunning example of what a committed team with inspiring leadership can do. As Mr. Kevin Bespflug remarked to me a couple of days ago, "It was a marvel!" Marvellous indeed to see this group work together to pull off such a spectacularly difficult musical; leaving me with the lyrical but relentless melody of "Agony", running like an unbroken soundtrack in my head. Thanks guys!
