Strategic Plan Refreshed

Best practice recognizes the importance of annually reviewing your school's strategic plan. I am very glad to say that Southridge did just that during a dedicated six hour session last Tuesday afternoon and evening. Members of our Board of Governors worked in close collaboration with our Senior Management Team to review the progress we have made toward achieving our strategic action plan for the year, and to make amendments to our priorities and initiatives, where required.

Under the careful assistance of a strategic planning professional facilitator who is very familiar with our community through past work with our Board of Governors and our school, our agenda took us through a comprehensive review process. In the past, the school has chosen to complete this kind of refresh retreat in October but because the Senior Management Team wanted to be more pro-active in their approach to establishing their annual team and individual goals, the Board was in agreement with adjusting the placement of the retreat and scheduling it for May. The spring date allows the Senior Management Team to have a crystal clear view of the priorities of the school for the upcoming academic year in a timely manner, which allows for more effective planning at their summer and fall retreats.

Goals, priorities and action items that are identified at the strategy day in May are transferred to individual goals of Senior Management Team members who hold responsibility in specified areas. This alignment process allows the school to function in a unified way so that the priorities of the school can be actualized through both a team approach and on an individual basis. Every month, members of the Senior Management Team prepare a written report to the Board of Governors describing and highlighting important steps made toward achieving key initiatives and strategic priorities. As you can imagine, this accountability measure (put in place by the Board) ensures that the school is moving forward in a strategic way and it positions the Board to effectively fulfill its role as it relates to strategic oversight.

Within the next month, the Senior Management Team will be presenting their annual strategic action plan to the Board for approval. Once that is done, our website will be updated so that, if interested, you can keep abreast of any developments in the strategic orientation of the school. I can tell you now, however, that the strategic priorities and key initiatives remain unchanged. What has changed, however, is the action steps the Board and Senior Management Team will take to ensure that the initiatives and priorities are being actualized. Over the course of this year, the school was successful in achieving close to forty points of action, and next year we anticipate being in the position to be just as successful.

An "Exhibition" of Collaborative Learning

Collaboration is a skill that has been getting a lot of attention in the professional realm and particularly in the field of education. As an IB school, it is an expectation that we provide opportunities for collaborative learning for our students and for our teachers. I believe that the PYP exhibition is an excellent culmination of the collaborative learning that takes place in PYP at Southridge. Exhibition is a unique unit in the sense that students not only collaborate with their peers, but also with their mentors, and with other members of the community.

This year the Grade 4's explored the central idea that "global citizens protect the rights of others." Each group focused on a basic human right such as the right to medical care, or the right to food. They developed their own inquiry, and completed an analysis of the different sides to the issue. Working collaboratively, and beneath the guidance of a mentor, they creatively consolidated and communicated their findings to a greater audience. Another component that is required is an action piece, where each group must 'do' something as a result of their learning, in order to make a difference. I can certainly say from attending Exhibition that each group has made a positive contribution to protecting the rights of others just by raising awareness about the issues surrounding some basic human rights.

The ability to work together toward a common goal can be very rewarding and very challenging at the same time. I think the fact that our Grade 4 students rise to this challenge at such a young age is a testament to all PYP teachers and parents. On that note, I want to extend thanks to the Grade 4 students for their expertise and enthusiasm, the PYP mentors for their effective and constructive guidance, and to the parents for their patience and support throughout the unit. Finally, I wanted to acknowledge the tremendous organization, dedication and leadership of Mrs. Shanaz Ramji-Motani, Ms. Jackie Birch, Mrs. Rowena Raber and Mrs. Joyce Chong. MYP Junior School Term Tests

This year, all MYP students will write only one term test: math on Friday, May 30th. Study schedule will run from Friday, May 23rd - Thursday, May 30th. No new material that is taught after Friday, May 23rd will be on the math term test, and regular homework will not be assigned during this time period. Study guides will be distributed by math teachers by the beginning of study schedule time.

Please see below for answers to frequently asked questions.

- 1. **What are study guides?** Study guides outline the content and skills students are responsible for on the test. They help students identify what they should be studying and may offer suggestions about how to study it.
- 2. What will students do at home during the study schedule? Some study blocks will be self-directed with students choosing how to review content and practice skills. Others may be teacher-directed with teachers assigning specific exercises designed to reinforce concepts that will be on the math term test.
- 3. What will students do in class during the study schedule? Students will continue to learn new material as they move through their units of study in accordance with the Southridge curriculum.
- 4. **When and where do students write term tests?** Students write the term test in their homeroom during the *first two periods* of class on Friday, May 30th. Please do not schedule any appointments for your child during this time.
- 5. How much time do students have to complete their math term test? They have 90 minutes to write their test.
- 6. **How will term tests affect student learning?** The primary goal of term tests is to help students learn how to prepare for tests and exams. Effective study and time management skills become increasingly important when students proceed to the Senior School. Term tests also provide students and teachers with valuable feedback about their learning. Combined with unit tests, quizzes, assignments, projects, and observation, term tests form one part (between 10-20%) of the student's overall evaluation for Term 3.

Reflections From The Harkness Evening

Last Thursday, May 15th, 2014 we hosted an information evening in the Senior School that we termed the Harkness Evening to share with parents the student-centred, discussion-based collaborative learning we have been implementing in many classes over the past few years.

When parents arrived, we asked them to sign up for two 'classes' in which to participate - math, science, social studies, English or modern languages. Prior to the classes, everyone gathered in the library where we provided an overview of the Senior School Educational Program (SSEP), and the reasons why this particular discussion-based approach fits the skills and attitudes we wish to develop in our students. For each class, parents became participants in a 30 minute lesson similar to what their children are experiencing. I want to thank those parents that attended, participated with great engagement and also provided helpful feedback.

Based on feedback from our recent survey about the SSEP, we wanted to provide an opportunity for parents to learn more about the SSEP and specifically the student-centred, discussion-based collaborative approach we are taking in the Senior School. We were excited to offer this practical, ``learn-by-doing`` opportunity for our parents, and we will have another similar evening in mid-October next year. The teachers, leadership team and I are all hoping that even more parents will come out to the school to take advantage of this opportunity to learn about the SSEP and how we are striving to create an excellent learning environment for your children. We will be certain to remind you of the exact date during our annual Mini-School Night at the end of September and through the *Southridge Wednesday*.

Another interesting point that was gleaned from the survey was the fact that many parents hadn't contacted a teacher or administrator to learn more about the SSEP and the implementation that is occurring. I encourage you to speak with any of the teachers or administrators about any of the programs or offerings we are providing to Senior School students. We are happy and eager to help clarify any questions or concerns you may have.

In the future we will continue to share some key findings and trends from the survey results and I want to thank each of you that took time to provide your ideas, thoughts, questions and concerns so willingly. We are committed to providing a program that gives Southridge students the knowledge, skills and attitudes to be prepared to make a difference in their post-secondary choice and beyond. Your help is an important part of this success.
