Jenga

Senior School News

Response From The SSEP Surveys in May

As I referenced a few weeks ago in a previous Wednesday submission, I wanted to devote time to respond to the results of the surveys that we asked faculty, parents and students to complete. I would like to thank each of the individuals that took the time to complete the survey. There were many thoughtful responses to the questions posed. As we implement the Senior School Educational Program (SSEP), we will use this data as one of a number of ways to gain insight into how we are being successful, in what areas we might improve and the effectiveness of our communication about the program. As we carefully analyzed the data that came from these surveys, some key trends emerged.

There is consistent understanding that the SSEP extends beyond purely academics to focus on character, leadership and experiential learning, but the survey results tell us that there is confusion about the term "Harkness". Although there is awareness that student-centred discussion based learning is happening at Harkness tables, more clarity is needed regarding what a student-centred, discussion-based collaborative learning environment actually looks like in different subject disciplines.

If you were able to come to our Harkness evening in May, you would have seen that a socials class, for example, looks different than a science class, even though both are using a student-centred style of learning. And even within a specific discipline, a Grade 8 class will look different to that of a Grade 12 or Advanced Placement (AP) class, given the development of the students and the complexity of the content being covered. Based on survey feedback, departments will continue to clarify and articulate these 'visions' for both students and parents next year.

Overwhelmingly, our faculty noted that student engagement has increased and that there has been development in our students' ability to communicate understanding of curriculum topics more effectively. In turn, faculty feel they can assess student understanding on an on-going basis because students are more involved in the learning process. That being said, we will be continuing to support our teachers in professional development opportunities that focus on a discussion-based classroom. These opportunities will include attending intensive summer institutes and training sessions for both new faculty and those more experienced in student-centred, discussion-based, collaborative learning.

Many of our parents expressed an interest in learning more about the SSEP and its implementation, even though the survey results show that only a few people have connected with teachers and/or administrators to gain this understanding. Next year one of our key goals will be to create more opportunities to share how we are implementing the SSEP and to answer any questions people may have about the program. We will be holding another SSEP evening in mid-October as well as Mini-School Night and other events to explain the important elements of our educational program and how they benefit student learning.

I encourage you to contact teachers, curriculum leaders or any member of our Senior School administrative team to find out more about the SSEP. We are always happy to discuss how we are preparing students to possess the skills, knowledge and attitudes to thrive and make a difference in the world!

I look forward to seeing many of you at our end of year events.

First Annual Competition Produces Stellar Performances

In May, 13 VSO School students took the stage of Pyatt Hall to compete for the chance to appear as a soloist with the VSO next year. The panel of five distinguished judges were astounded at the level of musical accomplishment of all the participants in the competition and though the decision was difficult, three finalists were chosen to compete in a final round: **Albert Seo**, cello, a student of Cristian Markos; **Lucy Wang**, violin, a student of Carla Birston; and **Ben Su**, piano, a student of Bernard Deurkson. Violinist Lucy Wang was declared the winner and will be the featured soloist with the VSO at the Orpheum Theatre on June 13 and 15, 2015.
