The Importance of Trust and Self-Regulation

When founding Headmaster Emeritus Alan Brown set the foundation for some of the key messages Southridge would stand behind, he also spent considerable time intentionally cultivating our school's culture. While Southridge is a light-hearted place of serious purpose (as Mr. Brown described it), our school is also a place rooted in values. One of the key values that Mr. Brown purposefully integrated into Southridge's fabric is truthfulness. Mr. Brown knew that truthfulness and trust go hand in hand and that any successful community has a supportive network of trust that provides a special structure for its members.

Mr. Brown truly knew what he was doing. In a recent *Teachers College Record* article, authors from the University of Oklahoma reported on their study of school climate and its impact on student achievement in 80 elementary and secondary schools in a large urban district. The researchers compared schools that controlled student behavior and regulated performance to schools that worked to create a self-regulatory climate emphasizing student autonomy, competence, and relationships.

The authors thought that a school with a self-regulatory climate would lead students to be more active learners who could take ownership of their own academic goals, and thereby, improve academic achievement. The researchers found that a self-regulatory climate produced significantly higher student achievement, and that these schools successfully balanced four important ingredients:

- Collective faculty trust in students
- Collective student trust in faculty
- · Students' perception of a strong academic emphasis
- Self-regulated learning

The study found that "schools organized in ways that build collective trust and emphasize academic excellence can regulate student learning in ways that leverage the natural capacity of students to flourish... A self-regulatory climate establishes predictable and cooperative interactions through shared influence and risk taking, reducing the dependence on external controls that constrain behavior and undermine autonomous action... Schools with high collective trust and strong academic emphasis can use these conditions to their advantage as they implement new curricula, assessments, instructional technology, and other improvement strategies."

A school based on strong visible signs of trust has an impact on student achievement. Certainly, bottom lines in terms of behavioural expectations and values are extremely important. It's one thing to say we trust one another at Southridge, but it is quite another when we take it a big step further and demonstrate our trust by not putting locks on our lockers. No wonder Mr. Brown would *always* ask me whether or not we still had no locks on our lockers whenever I spoke with him before he passed away. He knew it was *that* important to perpetuate the notion of trust in and for our students.

Playing Host to a Great Sport- BC Provincial Girls 'A' Soccer Tournament here at Southridge School

On Thursday, May 28th in our senior school gym, we commence the opening ceremonies of the Provincial Girls 'A' Soccer Tournament. Sixteen teams will enter the gym in a procession and be introduced as they walk in and then take their seats. As is the tradition of soccer, younger players have the honour of escorting the players. Our grade four girls have been asked to accompany each one of these visiting teams, walking in with the captain of the team. Our grade two girls have been asked to escort our Southridge Team, each grade two girl holding hands with one of our senior girls. The Honourable Mr. Gordon Hogg, MLA for Surrey/White Rock will be the opening speaker, followed by the Mayor of Surrey, Ms. Linda Hepner, and the Head of our School.

This a 16 team event "A" Girls Soccer Provincial Championship, featuring teams represented from around the province, including the Fraser Valley region, Lower Mainland, Vancouver Island, Okanagan, North Central, Kootenays and the Northwest (Queen Charlottes). In total, there will be more than 300 student-athletes and coaches competing, each playing 5 games over a 3 day period. It is coming up on the 20th year of the tournament. The "A" designation refers to the size of the schools participating. These teams are the 'smallest' schools in the tiered competition. (There are also "AA" and "AAA" versions of the same tournament that feature progressively larger schools).

50 teams began the season, and these are top 16 that have done extremely well just to qualify. Besides the games, there is a tournament banquet on Friday, May 29th that is always a fun event with awards for Fair Play, Top Scorer and MVP's presented on Saturday at the conclusion of the tournament.

The opening round of games begin at 9:30 a.m. right after the Opening Ceremonies including our team taking on Fort St. James. Please come and enjoy some excellent soccer on our campus. We are proud of our facilities, and

appreciate the contributions of so many that allow us to host an event of this calibre. Many hands over these past twenty years have led to the campus that we have today, and it is an honour to share or host this with others on a provincial scale. At this time of year, some parents may be contemplating the upcoming school year. It seems like an appropriate time to restate our procedure for compiling the class lists. At Southridge, we strive to create the best educational groupings that we can. A 'Bookends View' on Year-end Events

Grade 8 - Explaining Expectations for End of Year (Reminders for all!)

The end of the year calendar contains many different events and activities. Along with formal classes finishing, the routines and expectations change significantly. Below is a helpful synopsis to aid Grade 8 and new students and families to understand when attendance is expected (and when it is not!). For all of our 'veteran' families, it is a friendly reminder.

Thursday, June 4th - Final Day of Classes

The day will follow a regular Day 2 schedule. During Long Advisory in the morning, students will spend time completing the first of two locker clean-out's.

Friday, June 5 - Thursday, June 11th - Southridge Exam period

Students are expected to be at school for all examinations they are required to sit (please see schedule in the Wednesday). Students are expected to be in summer uniform with a blazer and will not be permitted to enter the exam hall without proper uniform. Specific expectations about each exam in terms of calculators etc. will be explained by each teacher prior to the exam period. Textbooks will be collected on the day of each student's exam; please remember to return these on this day. After students have completed their exam, they are asked to return home for the day. If students do not have an exam on a specific day, they are not expected at school.

Thursday, June 11th - Athletics Banquet (lunch)

Students that have participated in athletics during the year are encouraged to attend this luncheon banquet in the cafeteria and Alan Brown Great Hall. Details can be found through the Athletics department.

Friday, June 12th & Monday, June 15th

Both days are marking days for faculty to mark examinations - students do not attend school on these days.

Tuesday, June 16th - Exam Return Morning

The day begins at 8:00 a.m. and students will visit every class they have taken this year in a modified schedule. If they have written an exam, students will be able to review it during this time. In other classes, final projects or other work will be returned. Please note, if a student wishes to have a longer opportunity to review his or her exam, an alternative appointment may be made with that specific teacher. Students will be dismissed for the day at 11:40 a.m.

Wednesday, June 17th - Senior School Awards Ceremony (2:00 - 4:00 p.m.)

This ceremony will celebrate and acknowledge our Grade 8-11 students. All students in the Senior School are expected to attend (Grades 8-12) wearing their Number 1 Uniform. Students should arrive at 1:30 p.m. and go to their Advisory locations for attendance. We have spent considerable time modifying this ceremony after gaining important feedback from students, parents and faculty. Our hope is that it better aligns with our view of acknowledging all facets of our SSEP. Parents are invited and encouraged to attend!

Thursday, June 18th

Students are not required to be at school on this day with the exception of our Grade 12's that have a mandatory Grad rehearsal in the gym at 1:00 p.m., along with those Grade 11's that are part of the ceremony (next year's Head Boy, Head Girl and Spirit Captains).

Friday, June 19th - Senior School Commencement and Closing (7:00 p.m.)

This is the final event of the school year (unless there is a Provincial exam still to sit - see below). As you will know, this celebrates and acknowledges our Grad class of 2015. All Grade 12 awards will be presented, commencement exercises will occur, and the Valedictorian address will be heard. All students in the Senior School are expected to attend (Grades 8-12) wearing their Number 1 Uniform. Students should arrive at 6:30 p.m. and go to their Advisory locations for attendance. Parents are invited and encouraged to attend.

Provincial Exams - From Friday, June 19th through to Wednesday, June 24th

There are five provincial exams that occur during this time and students in Grades 10-12 are required to attend. Please note the schedule distributed in the Wednesday. **Students are expected to be in summer uniform <u>with a</u> <u>blazer</u> and will not be permitted to enter the exam hall without proper uniform. Specific expectations about each exam in terms of calculators etc. will be explained by each teacher prior to the exam period. Textbooks will be**

collected on the day of each student's exam; please remember to return these on this day. Students are expected to go home after their exam is finished each day.

Grade 12's - Looking Ahead - Grad Transitions Interviews

If you have a Grade 12 student, you are very aware that their focus has turned to their future. Although there are important events and summative evaluations still to occur, last week there was a wonderful opportunity provided to give our Grads a look ahead and some excellent feedback to help them prepare. As part of the Ministry required Graduate Transitions program, Grade 12's were asked to prepare for a formal interview. A number of parents acted as the interviewers and the students introduced themselves, explained their post-secondary plans and career aspirations. In speaking with a number of students and our parent interviewers after the event, both explained the benefits of the process. Students were provided feedback on strengths and areas where they might be able to improve in a subsequent interview. It allowed our Grade 12 students an opportunity to prepare for an event that will definitely occur in the future - either in a post-secondary institution or for a career opportunity. Our interviewers also explained it was wonderful to see the skills and abilities our Grads exhibited and how many of the activities they have participated in over their Southridge career have shaped their confidence. I was proud to see how much effort the students put into the preparation and thank our volunteers for providing such a useful experience for them. Have a great week and I hope to see many of you at the girls' soccer provincials we are hosting that officially begin Wednesday, May 27th and run until Saturday. Go Storm!

University Counselling Exit Interviews

Last Wednesday and Thursday afternoon the Senior School Library was transformed into a multi-interview room and for both days we welcomed Junior School parents to participate as interviewers for the Grade 12 students. These "exit" interviews are the capstone activity for the Ministry-prescribed Graduation Transitions Program (GTP), which is a guided journey in researching career and post-secondary options and preparing for life after high school. The components of the GTP are built into Grade 10 Planning, Grade 11 Planning and Portfolio 12 classes and the program is assigned 4 credits which are required for graduation. The four components of the GTP are:

- 1. Who am I? (personality and learning style assessments, understanding of skills and abilities)
- 2. What have I done? (academics, service, athletics, performing/visual arts etc.)
- 3. Where am I going? (research on colleges and universities and career exploration)
- 4. How am I going to get there? (post-secondary application preparation, budgeting, resume development, cover letter writing and interview skills)

The interview is centered on these four components and not only gives Grads an opportunity to discuss their accomplishments and goals, but also provides a practice opportunity for a formal style of interview experience in preparation for job, internship and cooperative education options at the post-secondary level.
