Speaker Series a Big Success - Dr. Madeline Lavine

A big thank you goes out to Debbie MacDougall, our Director of Community Relations, for organizing the latest installment of our speaker series at Southridge. If you were at the event, I am sure you appreciated Dr. Lavine's presentation and the perspective she offered on adolescent development, including the struggles our children face in this complex and complicated world. To be sure, the teachers and staff were treated to an excellent discussion just after dismissal at three o'clock.

Dr. Levine drew on some of the key messages of her two bestselling books, *The Price of Privilege* and *Teach Your Children Well*. She helped us think about and explore the reasons why teenagers from affluent families are experiencing such high rates of emotional problems. Dr. Lavine's concerns over the narrow definition of success resonated with many in attendance - especially in the context of how success relates to university entrance.

Outside her clinical practice that emphasizes child and adolescent problems and parenting issues, Dr. Lavine also teaches child development classes to graduate students at the University of California, San Francisco Medical Center. An advocate for youth and how the complexities of maturation impact health, Dr. Levine was a co-founder of *Challenge Success*, a project at Stanford's Graduate School of Education. *Challenge Success* began in 2007 and believes that our increasingly competitive world has led to tremendous anxiety about our children's futures and has resulted in a high pressure, narrow-minded focus on grades, test scores and performance. The highly successful program provides families and schools with the practical research-based tools they need to raise healthy, motivated kids, capable of reaching their full potential.

It was most certainly a pleasure to have Dr. Lavine visit Southridge and I hope you were able to take advantage of the great opportunity to hear her speak.

'Twenty-first Century Learning' in Action - The Exhibition, Wednesday and Thursday, May 13th and 14th

There is a great deal of buzz in educational circles around the term 'twenty-first century' learning. While there are various definitions of the term, basically, what it means is that we are educating young people and equipping them to be successful contributors in their world. There is general consensus on some of the important skills of a 21 century learner - they must be collaborative, creative, critical thinkers, have good character, demonstrate cross cultural competency and be able to communicate effectively (Patrick Bassett, President of the National Association of Independent Schools *NAIS*, 2012). We believe that these skills are being nurtured and reinforced daily in our programming at Southridge. One fine example of this is our Grade 4 Exhibition unit.

In this unit, our students select a real life issue that has relevance to the world. In groups of 4 - 5, they develop their own inquiry into this unit and complete an analysis of the different sides to the issue. Working collaboratively and beneath the guidance of a mentor, they creatively consolidate and communicate their findings to a greater audience. Another component that is required is an action piece, where each group must 'do' something as a result of their learning, in order to make a difference.

Our Grade 4s have been very active these past weeks and are completing the finishing touches on their units of inquiry. We invite you to come and celebrate with us as they communicate their analysis and findings in an engaging, creative manner. The Exhibition will be held the afternoon of May 13th and the evening of May 14th from 6:00 - 7:30 p.m. Again, the skills and research that are consolidated in this six week unit of study reflect those twenty-first century skills which are deemed to be essential for our future. This year's Exhibition has a refined focus on student speaking, quality research, design, and a fine arts component. At Southridge, we are helping to build students who are ethical and successful contributors and leaders in their families, their communities, the workplace, and the world. In summary... someone who makes a difference in the world.

Half-term Holiday on Monday, April 27th

This is a reminder of our half-term holiday break on Monday, April 27th, 2015. There is a regular start time on Tuesday, April 28th, so we will see students for our usual start time of 8:10 a.m.

Summer Uniform - May 1st

The day that many students have yearned for will be arriving soon; summer uniform commences on May 1st! Students are now able to wear black dress shorts or skorts, golf shirts and white socks. Of course, students may still opt for the winter uniform or a combination of the two. Please note that if grey pants are worn, the socks must be grey. Ties are no longer mandatory. Class Lists

At this time of year some parents may be contemplating the upcoming school year. It seems like an appropriate time to restate our procedure for compiling the class lists. At Southridge, we strive to create the best educational groupings that we can. That means that we try to ensure our classes are balanced in terms of leadership ability, academic ability, athletic well-roundedness, gender, and social responsibility. We try to ensure that each student has at least one close friend in their class, and given the fact that we only have 2 classes, we do our best to create the best social dynamics. There is a great deal of thought and care in this process. After the lists are compiled by the present home room teachers, the specialist teachers and primary and intermediate division leaders look at the lists and discuss the groupings. At this time, there are no teachers' names on the class groupings. Once the lists are approved, they are signed by all the teachers and submitted to the Head of the Junior School. At that time, the teacher's names are then assigned to those groupings by the Head of the Junior School.

Given the extensive work that has gone into developing the groupings, it has always been our policy <u>not</u> to entertain parental requests for certain teachers. We strive to have parallel programming in all our classes, the teachers work collaboratively in their planning and their assessment, and we truly believe that our students will thrive in any classroom setting. Avoiding a Deficit-style of Thinking

Have you ever had the experience that by deciding to attend an event and subsequently participating in it that you realized you made an excellent decision? After re-reading this question, this might not make complete sense. Let me give you an example. I have had this thought a few times when I attend large family events. Sometimes, in order to be with my family, it takes time to arrange travel, working around busy schedules and can be costly. Once I am at the event however, and see the amazing interactions that I have with people I don't always have a chance to be with, I realize that my decision to attend has a lasting effect.

That is how I felt when I attended Dr. Madeline Levine's presentations last Thursday. Not only did I attend the evening event, which was geared more toward a parent perspective, but we were fortunate to have Dr. Levine speak with the faculty in the afternoon. Her talk, titled *Redefining Success: Raising Healthy, Engaged and Good Kids!* provided so many important insights to me as an educator, but more importantly as an individual and parent.

One particular point that Dr. Levine made was the criticism that society today has too much of a deficit focus. In turn, parents focus too much attention on areas and skills that their children are lacking and certainly, at times, schools can be guilty of that focus. Dr. Levine presented this idea by initially asking each of us in the audience to reflect on those things we are really, really good at. I will admit when I did this, I identified a skill or trait in me that might be able to be described as something I did really well; however, I quickly convinced myself that maybe I wasn't really that good at it and dismissed it. I was falling into that deficit thinking right away.

She then switched tactics and asked us to focus on things our children were really good at. I'll admit I found this much easier and was able to identify traits and skills in my children where they show success. But then Dr. Levine asked us if we let our children know this consistently. She wondered if instead, we thought of the areas that weren't their strengths and pointed them as we pushed them to develop these. I felt a little sheepish because I recall focusing too much of my attention on these areas with my two kids at times.

Dr. Levine explained that it is incredibly important for children to know that their parents see their strengths - that this positive encouragement is instrumental in developing confidence and positive coping skills such as resilience and risk taking. She explained that there are many reasons that parents might have this deficit-type thinking. These included worries such as a struggling economy, competition for post-secondary schools, increased global competition and finally, community and cultural pressures. However, even with all of these justifiably defendable reasons, it really was counterproductive to spend time looking at your loved ones through this lens.

I think it is important not to confuse this strengths-focus with that of artificially praising someone. Dr. Levine referenced the obvious example of focusing on the one mark that is lower rather than the myriad of top notch grades on a report card. Spend time looking deeply at the success that your child has exhibited through those very strong marks. There is likely a

real 'passion' amongst these and one you can develop and foster as a parent. As Dr. Levine explained, research shows that doing this has incredibly positive effects towards a child's personal successes later in life.

A colleague relayed a story where a student was feeling overwhelmed about all the various pressures in life - assignment due dates, a part-time job and parental pressure to succeed. It was becoming difficult to cope and feel productive and successful. This student said that the parents realized this and declared that they were very proud of the accomplishments and that there was no need to feel pressure as they loved this student very dearly. In the words of this student, it was the greatest day of their life because they felt affirmed by their parents and that their successes and traits had been noticed and acknowledged.

As part of Dr. Levine's shared parent mission statement reads, "while we all hope that our children will do well in school, we hope with even greater fervor that they will do well in life....and hold a deep belief that they have something meaningful to contribute to the world." This sounds remarkable similar to Southridge's mission statement and affirms that our focus needs to be on helping students identify their strengths to give them the confidence to make a difference in the world.

Have a great week focusing on what your child (and you!) are really, really good at! It is really, really important.

My Experience Making a Zombie Film

A big part of my focus this year in Media 12 has been the making of 'Zomboy', a comedy-zombie film. This is not the first time I have worked on a "long form" film (over 10 minutes). However, with 'Zomboy', my team ran into many challenges along the way. These challenges came with a lot of frustration and stress but, as a team, we found innovative ways to persevere.

Since we had to create a zombie look, the biggest challenge was the makeup. As a group of guys, we were clueless. My team and I spent many hours trying to figure out a way to create the most authentic-looking zombie. Additionally, we also needed to figure out the most efficient method to apply the makeup. It took us about a month to master our makeup techniques, which was impressive considering that this was completely new for us. For each shoot it took approximately 30 minutes to apply and 15 minutes to remove the makeup. Looking back, I've gained a new respect for makeup artists.

One thing my group and I wanted to incorporate into our film was a zombie party. This was an idea that we had been considering for some time. We all knew it would take an extensive amount of planning but in the grand scheme of things, it would be worth it. Our idea seemed simple on paper but soon became a serious organization challenge. First, we needed at least six volunteers to show up on their own time, and also get makeup all over their faces. Second, we needed to keep

everyone on task for over four hours, throughout the entire party shoot, including ourselves. Thankfully, everyone at the shoot was extremely cooperative and things ended up working out fairly seamlessly.

Another idea we wanted to develop was a chase scene following our zombie party. Not surprisingly, this idea came with its own unique challenges. The most prominent one would be the way it was shot. The Director and I, the Producer, had very different ideas about what this scene should look like. We decided to collaborate by watching chase scenes together to see if we could arrive at a consensus. It didn't take us long to figure out how we wanted to approach this scene.

Making this film definitely came with new challenges. However, through teamwork and organization, we were able to come through with a project that we are proud of. I am looking forward to seeing this project on the big screen at Film Nights. It was a lot of fun to make and I hope you all enjoy it. My Experience Making a Biking Film

In Media 12 this year I was able to work on a directed study, which means that I was able to create a film about something I am interested in. My long-term passion for trials biking inspired me to create a film about this passion. The film was a new experience, as I had to work as a one-man team, which meant I had to write, act, film, and edit the video by myself.

One of the most difficult parts of this film was getting complex camera shots. As I am used to filming with a full crew, I had to problem-solve to be able to create the shots I was going for. After some trial and error, I realized I could get the complex shots by cheating them out and riding the obstacles multiple times.

Another difficulty I encountered was creating a story for my film. Most bike films or riding compilations contain no stories to go along with them, and are instead focused purely on the act of biking. However, I thought adding a storyline would add an extra dynamic and help the audience to become more engaged. I chose to focus on the preparation before a ride and the decompression after riding, as the anxiousness shown by the rider is relatable across all audiences. I believe that the storyline helps tie my film together and made it more enjoyable. The film was created by Anthony Hernandez and edited by Tatjana Cox.

Though it was a challenge, I had a lot of fun creating this film and I had the opportunity to enter my film in the BC Student Film Festival. My perseverance and dedication led me to win first place in the Extreme Action Lifestyle category. I am happy to have had the opportunity to work on this project and I owe a big thanks to Mr. Westendorf for all the help. Operation Smile

Here at Southridge, under the careful education of an institution whose motto is "we are all one," it can be assured that all our children get the equal rights and privileges they are entitled to. However, for many children suffering from cleft palate/cleft lip, the same cannot be said; cleft palate and cleft lip is a gap on the lip that can extend into the patients nasal cavity. These children not only can't talk, eat, drink, or breathe properly, but they are segregated by others. Due to lack of education, children suffering with cleft palate/cleft lip are often regarded as evil and shunned in third world countries. I decided that I wanted to change that.

In Grade 11 I founded the organization *Operation Smile* as one of the few non-profit medical organizations that help children in foreign countries get good oral health care. *Operation Smile* goes to poorer countries and does free cleft palate and cleft lip surgeries for children. These surgeries help transform the lives of many individuals as they are able to eat and talk properly but most of all they find a new place in society (after being sequestered as abnormal). Through an ice cream fundraiser and a casual day I was able to raise \$580.00 dollars; enough to conduct two free surgeries.

Now ladies and gentlemen a newer opportunity arises, one where we could possibly raise ten times as much as the funds I raised. Dr. Mahsa Soraya (a practicing dentist) is hosting a Gala for everybody on April 25th at the Aria Convention Centre; at this Gala people will enjoy a sumptuous dinner with lively entertainment. Some of the entertainment includes a comedy show by the hilarious Amir K who is coming from Los Angeles and a DJ and dance. There will be live and silent auctions, free parking, a jewellery show, and some promotional products. If you are looking to advertise your business at all, you can rent a promotional table at the event. All the funds collected from this event will go to surgeries for cleft palate and cleft lip.

- 3. Start typing the person's name and you will see a list appear as below. Click on the name of the person you are tagging.





This year the scheduled date for the English 12 examination in June is on June 19th which is the same afternoon as the Southridge Commencement ceremony. In consultation with the English **Curriculum Leader, Ms. Gail Robinson, and the English department we have decided to have ALL our students write on Thursday, May 14th Students who achieve a satisfactory grade will NOT need to write on the 19, but those who wish to strive for an improved grade will have the opportunity to write for a second time on Friday, June 19th starting at noon. Southridge School Examinations: Friday, June 5th - Thursday, June 11th

The last day of classes for Southridge students will be **Thursday**, **June 4th**. Grade 8 final science tests will take place on Wednesday, June 3rd and for Grades 9 and 10 on Thursday, June 4th during classroom time. School examinations, which take place in the Senior School gymnasium, will begin the following day on Friday, June 5th and end on Thursday, June 11th Full details of the schedule for each grade level will be published early in the third term.
