Head of School Welcome Back

Reminder - Campus Master Plan Open House

As published in the Southridge Wednesday just before the break in December, this is a follow-up reminder that Southridge will be hosting a series of campus master plan open houses during the week of January 19th, and I am hoping that you will have the time to attend one of them.

Since May 2014, our Campus Master Plan Committee has focussed on working with our architects, the faculty and our staff to understand our campus's capacities, our educational program's curriculum scope and particular activities that have grown to exceed original allowances or expectations. In addition, our committee has considered future program options and offerings, provided for emerging learning models and student engagement initiatives, and investigated enhanced school life opportunities. The output of this exploration and analysis is now ready to be shared with our entire community.

To that end, our school has scheduled four open houses for next week to assist the committee in assimilating our internal community's perspectives into the school's planning efforts. All current parents of Southridge as well as our alumni and our alumni parents are invited to join our committee and architects at one of the sessions listed below. Each session is anticipated to last between 2 and 3 hours, but your attendance for the duration of the blocked period of time is not necessary. Simply drop in at any time and stay for as long as you would like. Even though there will not be a formal talk given at our open houses, there will be plenty of opportunity for participants to see, discuss and give feedback about the progress we have made so far.

Open houses are an important part of our campus master plan development process, and we hope you will be able to visit the school at one of the scheduled times. We have planned three of our open house sessions to align with drop-off and pickup; however, for those people unable to make it to the school at any of those times, we have also reserved an early evening opportunity to accommodate busy schedules.

Junior School News The Joy of Reading

One of the many benefits of the extended Christmas break is getting an opportunity to read. Over the course of the term, I do read for pleasure, but having longer extended periods to read is a real treat. We are a faculty who love to read as evidenced by the fact that our Southridge teachers have two book clubs: one is a professional educational book club where we read current journals and books on teaching and learning; the other is a literary, where we read current best sellers or whatever we decide would be of interest to our group. As a result of being in these book clubs, I have read a wide diversity of books - some genres that I may have never chosen on my own. Candidly, I will confess that some books were dark, bland, edgy, confusing, frustrating, or predictable while others quickly seized me and were absolute page-turners. However, after reading each book, I grew as a person. I was exposed to settings, characters, ideologies, beliefs and experiences that I may never have encountered in my life.

Part of the fun in reading is also the social experience of sharing these events that we would rarely encounter in our life. Sometimes as I read something shocking or unusual, I would wonder about Madame Boyle's response to this, or Dr. Bespflug's, or Ms. Winterburn's. When I read something sad, I would always wonder about how reading this affects others that have experienced something similar. When I read a bizarre twist, I know that Madame Kapetanovic is probably finding this turn of events as delicious as I am finding it to be. Overall, the discussions of all the books turn into gatherings that are filled with hilarity, raw emotion, insight and growth. I often underestimate the social aspect of reading, and the growth to me personally as I need to defend and share my perspective on characters and events as well as literary style. It forces me to be open-minded, accepting the viewpoints and opinions of others, given their life experiences and beliefs. And it reminds me that this is exactly what we do in our literary programs at Southridge - our reading program can be social, it does involve varied genre, the material can be challenging and perhaps something that the reader may not readily choose on their own, it demands open-mindedness and debate, but overall it deepens and strengthens the reader. We are a school of readers who love to learn - this is shown by our students in Kindergarten all the way to Grade 12, but more so by our faculty who live the love of reading in their spare time.

Welcome Back!

I certainly hope that the holidays brought time for connecting with your family and friends as well as time to re-charge from the very full, engaging and, at times, draining term 1! As I mentioned in my Wednesday article just prior to the holidays, it is important to take time to do something a little different when given the opportunity away from the routine of school. I also used the analogy that you cannot use a battery and effectively re-charge it at the same time. On December 15th and 16th Southridge students in Grades 9, 10 and 11 had the opportunity to participate in the Safeteen workshops. The boys and girls both participated in separate gender separated dynamic and fun interactive workshops. The workshops have different focuses for each gender. The emphasis for the girls concentrated on the fact that teens can experience tremendous pressure and anxiety both online and face-to-face. SafeTeen offered them strategies to navigate these issues as well as critical safety and harm reduction techniques.

The focus for the boys' workshops included topics that delve into many social and emotional survival issues boys are facing in their day to day lives. SafeTeen offered the boys the strategies to navigate these issues, foster healthy critical

thinking and it also used useful empowerment skills and techniques. Assertiveness skills are beneficial to review with your child.
